RESOLUTION 06-18-19 FINDING THE PROPOSED VILLA PARK HIGH SCHOOL MODERNIZATION PROJECT EXEMPT FROM THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT, APPROVING THE FILING AND RECORDATION OF A NOTICE OF EXEMPTION, AND APPROVING THE PROJECT

DESCRIPTION:

As part of the Measure S Bond Program, the District proposes modernization improvements at Villa Park High School (VPHS). The proposed project consists of the following campus improvements in two phases:

Phase 1

- 1. Development of a two-story, 45,000-square-foot science center that would replace the existing one-story 300 Building near the northeast corner of the campus
- 2. Provision of nine portable interim housing classrooms and one portable restroom on the hardcourts south of the swimming pool
- 3. Reconfiguration of the parking lots (Lots 1 through 4) and two eastern driveways serving these lots

Phase 2

- 4. Modernization of the existing buildings including but not limited to interior remodeling and utility improvements, and for the 100/200 Building, the modernization includes relocation of the staircases from the north elevation to south elevation
- 5. Reconfiguration of the parking lots (Lots 1 through 3)
- 6. Improved drop off/pick up area with additional queuing
- 7. Removal of the nine portable interim housing classrooms and restroom

Projects undertaken by public agencies are subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as outlined in Public Resources Code (PRC) Section 21000 et seq. and the State CEQA Guidelines (California Code Regulations, Title 14, Section 15000 et seq.).

The proposed modernization improvements at VPHS are a "Project" under CEQA. Staff has evaluated the Project in whole and has determined that the proposed improvements are categorically exempt from further environmental review and the provisions of CEQA under CEQA Guidelines Section 15314.

Staff has determined that the Project is not subject to any exceptions to the categorical exemption (CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2). Therefore, the District may file a Notice of Exemption (NOE) for the Project, which exempts the Project from further environmental review and the provisions of CEQA.

Adoption of Resolution 06-18-19 provides the required acknowledgements and findings with respect to the Project at VPHS to enable the District to:

- 1. Find the Proposed VPHS Modernization Project exempt from CEQA.
- 2. Approve the filing and recordation of a NOE,
- 3. Approve the Project, and
- 4. Authorize staff to file the NOE for the Project with the appropriate public agencies.

The Notice of Exemption will be filed with the County Clerk and the State Office of Planning and Research (OPR). The filing of a NOE with the County Clerk starts a 35-day statute of limitations period on legal challenges to the agency's decision that the project is exempt from CEQA. The NOE is available for review in the Business Services Office.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no direct fiscal impact as a result of adopting Resolution 06-18-19.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution 06-18-19: (1) Finding the Proposed VPHS Modernization Project Exempt from CEQA; (2) Approving the Filing and Recordation of a NOE, (3) Approving the Project, and (4) Authorizing staff to file the NOE for the Project.

RESOLUTION NO. 06-18-19

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FINDING THE PROPOSED PARK VILLA HIGH SCHOOL MODERNIZATION PROJECT EXEMPT FROM THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT, APPROVING THE FILING AND RECORDATION OF A NOTICE OF EXEMPTION, AND APPROVING THE PROJECT

- WHEREAS, the Orange Unified School District ("District") owns and operates Villa Park High School at 48041 Taft Avenue, Villa Park, Orange County, California, Assessor's Parcel Number 372-232-02 ("Site"); and
- **WHEREAS**, the District proposes to modernize Villa Park High School ("Project"); and
- WHEREAS, the proposed project consists of demolition of the 300 Building and development of a new science center; provision of interim housing classrooms during construction; modernization of various school facilities, including but not limited to 100/200 Building; reconfiguration of parking lots; and new landscaping and lighting, security improvements, and aesthetic improvements; and
- **WHEREAS**, prior to commencement of the Project, the District must comply with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"); and
- WHEREAS, categorical exemptions to CEQA are set forth in Article 19 of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations ("CEQA Guidelines"); and
- **WHEREAS**, the Project is categorically exempt under CEQA Guidelines Sections 15314 and 15301; and
- **WHEREAS**, CEQA Guidelines Section 15314, Minor Additions to Schools, sets forth an exemption from CEQA for minor additions to existing schools within existing school grounds where the addition does not increase original student capacity by more than 25 percent or 10 classrooms, whichever is less; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Project would meet the criteria set by CEQA Guidelines Section 15314, as the Project would not change the existing number of 84 classrooms or existing enrollment capacity of 3,360 seats; and
- WHEREAS, CEQA Guidelines Section 15301, Existing Facilities, sets forth an exemption from CEQA for operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures and facilities, including school facilities, involving negligible or no expansion of use beyond that existing at the time of the lead agency's determination; and

- WHEREAS, the Project would meet the criteria set by CEQA Guidelines Section 15301, as the Project provides various improvements throughout the campus including parking lot reconfigurations, driveway and access modifications, utility, landscaping, lighting, and aesthetics improvements to modernize the existing school facilities on the same existing campus without expanding or changing the existing school uses; and
- WHEREAS, the District has determined that the Project is not subject to any of the exceptions to categorical exemptions set forth in CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Site is not in a sensitive environment of hazardous or critical concern; and
- WHEREAS, the Project's environmental effects when combined with the environmental effects of known successive projects of the same type in the same place at the Site, and the environmental effects caused by other District projects, including at Orange, Canyon, and El Modena high schools, over time are not environmentally significant and cumulatively considerable; and
- WHEREAS, the District is unaware of any unusual circumstances that would result in a reasonable possibility that the Project will have a significant effect on the environment; and
- WHEREAS, the Project will not damage scenic resources within a highway officially designated as a state scenic highway; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Site does not appear on a list compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5 due to historic contamination; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Project will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource.
- **NOW, THEREFORE,** the Board of Education of the Orange Unified School District hereby finds, determines, declares, and resolves as follows:
- **Section 1.** That all of the recitals set forth above are true and correct, and the Board so finds and determines.
- <u>Section 2</u>. That the District has considered whether the Project may have a significant effect on the environment.
- <u>Section 3</u>. That the District has concluded, after reviewing the Project through its own independent review and analysis, that the Project will not have a significant effect on the environment.

Section 4. That the District adopts the analysis and conclusions in the Notice of Exemption (NOE) as its findings and incorporates the NOE by reference as fully set forth herein.

That the Project is subject to CEQA Guidelines Sections 15314 and 15301 and is not subject to any exception to exemptions found in CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2 and is therefore exempt from CEQA.

That the District approves the Project. Section 6.

That the District's Superintendent, or the Superintendent's Section 7. designee, is instructed to file and/or record a Notice of Exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act, consistent with this Resolution and available for review at the District Office, Business Service department located at 1401 N. Handy Street, Orange CA 92867 with any and all appropriate public agencies or entities, subject only to minor, non-substantive revisions, if necessary.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption. Section 8.

Philosophy

Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities

The Board of Education is committed to providing equal opportunity for all individuals in education District programs and activities. District programs, activities, and practices shall be free from unlawful discrimination, including discrimination against an individual or group based on race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity or gender expression, or genetic information; the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

All individuals shall be treated equitably in the receipt of district and school services. Personally identifiable information collected in the implementation of any district program, including, but not limited to, student and family information for the free and reduced-price lunch program, transportation, or any other educational program, shall be used only for the purposes of the program, except when the Superintendent or designee authorizes its use for another purpose in accordance with law. Resources and data collected by the district shall not be used, directly or by others, to compile a list, registry, or database of individuals based on race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, ethnicity, national origin, or immigration status or any other category identified above.

District programs and activities shall also be free of any racially derogatory or discriminatory school or athletic team names, mascots, or nicknames.

Annually, † The Superintendent or designee shall annually review District programs and activities to ensure the removal of any derogatory or discriminatory name, image, practice, or other barrier that may unlawfully prevent an individual or group in any of the protected categories stated above from accessing District programs and activities. including the use of facilities. He/she shall take prompt, reasonable actions to remove any identified barrier. The Superintendent or designee shall report his/her findings and recommendations to the Board after each review.

All allegations of unlawful discrimination in District programs and activities shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with the procedures specified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify students, parents/guardians, employees, employee organizations, applicants for admission and employment, and sources of referral for applicants about the District's policy on nondiscrimination and about related complaint procedures (34 CFR 104.8 and 34 CFR 106.9.). Such notification shall be included in each in the annual parental notification distributed pursuant to Education Code 48980 and, as applicable, in announcements, bulletins, catalogs, handbooks, application forms, or other materials distributed to these groups by the district. As appropriate, such The notification shall be posted in District

schools and offices, including staff lounges, student government meeting rooms, and other prominent locations and shall be posted on the District's web site and social media, when available, District supported social media and in District schools and offices, including staff lounges, student government meeting rooms, and other prominent locations as appropriate.

In addition, the annual parental notification shall inform parents/guardians of their children's right to a free public education regardless of immigration status or religious beliefs, including information on educational rights issued by the California Attorney General. Alternatively, such information may be provided through any other cost-effective means determined by the Superintendent or designee.

District programs and facilities, viewed in their entirety, shall be in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and any implementing standards and/or regulations.

The District's nondiscrimination policy and related informational materials shall be published in a format that parents/guardians can understand. In addition, when 15 percent or more of a school's students speak a single primary language other than English, those materials shall be translated into that other language.

Access for Individuals with Disabilities

District programs and facilities, viewed in their entirety, shall be in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and any implementing standards and/or regulations. When structural changes to existing District facilities are needed to provide individuals with disabilities access to programs, services, activities, or facilities, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a transition plan that sets forth the steps for completing the changes.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the District provides appropriate auxiliary aids and services when necessary to afford individuals with disabilities equal opportunity to participate in or enjoy the benefits of a service, program, or activity. These aids and services may include, but are not limited to, qualified interpreters or readers, assistive listening devices, assistive technologies or other modifications to increase accessibility to district and school web sites, note takers, written materials, taped text, and Braille or large print materials. Individuals with disabilities shall notify the Superintendent or principal if they have a disability that requires special assistance or services. Reasonable notification should be given prior to the school-sponsored function, program or meeting.

The individual identified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures as the employee responsible for coordinating the District's response to complaints and for complying with state and federal civil rights laws is hereby designated as the District's ADA coordinator. He/she shall receive

and address requests for accommodation submitted by individuals with disabilities, and shall investigate and resolve complaints regarding their access to District programs, services, activities, or facilities.

Community Relations

<u>Uniform Complaint Procedures (UCP)</u>

The Board of Education recognizes that the District has primary responsibility to ensure compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The Board encourages early resolution of complaints whenever possible. To resolve complaints which may require a more formal process, the Board adopts the uniform system of complaint processes specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 and the accompanying administrative regulation.

Complaints Subject to the UCP

The District's uniform complaint procedures (UCP) shall be used to investigate and resolve the following complaints

- 1. Any complaint alleging District violation of applicable state or federal law or regulations governing adult education programs, After School Education and Safety programs, migrant agricultural vocational education, American Indian education centers and early childhood education program assessments, bilingual education, peer assistance and review programs for teachers, career technical and technical education and training programs, child care and development programs, child nutrition programs, special education programs, compensatory education, consolidated categorical aid programs, Economic Impact Aid, English learner programs, federal education programs in Title I-VII, migrant education, Regional Occupational Centers and Programs, school safety plans, special education programs, State Preschool Programs, Tobacco-Use Prevention Education Programs, and any other district-implemented program which is listed in Education Code 64000(a) (5 CCR 4610)
- 2. Any complaint alleging the occurrence of unlawful discrimination, (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying) against any student, employee, or other person participating in District programs and activities, including, but not limited to, those programs or activities funded directly by or that receive or benefit from any state financial assistance, based on the person's actual race, or perceived characteristics of race or ethnicity, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, **immigration status**, ethnic group identification, age, religion, marital **status**, pregnancy, or parental status, physical or mental disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information as or any other characteristic identified in Education Code 200 or 220, Government Code 11135 or Penal Code section 422.55 or based on his/her association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics (5 CCR 4610)
- 3. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with the requirement to provide reasonable accommodation to a lactating student on school campus to express breast milk, breastfeed an infant child, or address other breastfeeding-related needs of the student (Education Code 222)

- 4. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with the prohibition against requiring students to pay fees, deposits, or other charges for participation in educational activities (5 CCR 4610)
- 5. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with legal requirements related to the implementation of the local control and accountability plan (Education Code 52075)
- 6. Any complaint, by or on behalf of any student who is a foster youth, alleging District noncompliance with any legal requirement applicable to the student regarding placement decisions, the responsibilities of the District's educational liaison to the student, the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or district, school transfer, or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 48853, 48853.5, 49069.5, 51225.1, 51225.2)
- 7. Any complaint, by or on behalf of a homeless student as defined in 42 USC 11434a, a former juvenile court school student, or a child of a military family as defined in Education Code 49701 who transfers into the district after his/her second year of high school, alleging District noncompliance with any requirement applicable to the student regarding the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in another school or District or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 51225.1, 51225.2)
- 8. Any complaint, by or on behalf of a former juvenile court school student who transfers into the District after his/her second year of high school, alleging District noncompliance with any the requirements of Education Code 51228.1 and 51228.2 that prohibit the assignment of a student in grades 9-12 to a course without educational content for more than one week in any semester or to a course the student has previously satisfactorily completed, without meeting specified conditions (Education Code 51228.3) applicable to the student regarding the award of credit for coursework satisfactorily completed in the juvenile court school or the grant of an exemption from Board-imposed graduation requirements (Education Code 51225.1, 51225.2)
- 9. Any complaint alleging District noncompliance with the physical education instructional minutes requirement for students in elementary school (Education Code 51210, 51223)
- 10. Any complaint alleging retaliation against a complainant or other participant in the complaint process or anyone who has acted to uncover or report a violation subject to this policy
- 11. Any other complaint as specified in a District policy

The Board recognizes that alternative dispute resolution (ADR) can, depending on the nature of the allegations, offer a process to reach a resolution to the complaint that is acceptable to all parties. ADR such as mediation may be offered to resolve complaints that involve more than one student and no adult. However, mediation shall not be offered or used to resolve any complaint involving sexual assault or where there is a reasonable risk that a party to the mediation would feel compelled to participate. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the use of ADR is consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

The District shall protect all complainants from retaliation. In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved shall be protected as required by law. For any complaint alleging retaliation or unlawful **discrimination** (such as discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying), the Superintendent or designee shall keep the identity of the complainant, and/or the subject of the complaint if he/she is different from the complainant, confidential when appropriate and as long as the integrity of the complaint process is maintained.

When an allegation that is not subject to the UCP is included in a UCP complaint, the District shall refer the non-UCP allegation to the appropriate staff or agency and shall investigate and, if appropriate, resolve the UCP-related allegation(s) through the District's UCP.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to District staff to ensure awareness and knowledge of current law and related requirements, including the steps and timelines specified in this policy and the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of all UCP complaints and the investigations of those complaints in accordance with applicable law and District policy.

Non-UCP Complaints

The following complaints shall not be subject to the District's UCP but shall be referred to the specified agency: (5 CCR 4611)

- 1. Any complaint alleging child abuse or neglect shall be referred to the County Department of Social Services, the County Protective Services Division, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
- 2. Any complaint alleging health and safety violations by a child development program shall, for licensed facilities, be referred to Department of Social Services and shall, for licensing-exempt facilities, be referred to the appropriate Child Development regional administrator.
- 3. Any complaint alleging fraud shall be referred to the Legal, Audits and Compliance Branch to of the California Department of Education.

Any complaint alleging employment discrimination or harassment shall be investigated and resolved by the District in accordance with the procedures specified in AR 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment. Shall be sent to the California Department of Fair employment and House and the compliance officer shall notify the compliant by first class mail of transfer.

In addition, the District's Williams Uniform Complaint procedures, AR 1312.4, shall be used to investigate and resolve any complaint Any complaint related to sufficiency of textbooks or instructional materials, emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health or safety of students or staff, or teacher vacancies and misassignments shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with the procedures in AR 1312.4 - Williams Uniform Complaint Procedures. (Education Code 35186)

Debt Management Policy

The purpose of this Debt Management Policy is to provide functional tools for debt management, capital planning, and cash flow management in a conservative and prudent manner.

The Board of Education intends that the District establish and maintain a framework for public finance borrowings such as general obligation bonds ("GO Bonds"), lease financings, community facilities districts ("CFDs"), tax and revenue anticipation notes ("TRANs") and other forms of indebtedness by the District.

- 1. The issuance of debt by the District is an appropriate and necessary method of financing capital projects, providing working capital and financing certain capital equipment purchases over time.
- 2. Careful and consistent monitoring of such debt issuance is required to preserve the District's credit strength, budget and financial flexibility.

3. POLICY

- a. The purpose of this Debt Management Policy is to provide functional tools for both short term and long-term debt management and capital planning and objectives, as well as to enhance the District's ability to manage its debt and lease financings in a conservative and prudent manner.
- b. In following this policy, the District shall pursue the following debt management goals.
 - i. When funding capital improvements, working capital, or equipment, the District will review all funding sources and determine the best source based on need and use of items being financed. For capital projects the District will review the capital improvement program to determine if debt issuance is the best source of funding given the overall capital improvement program and budget.

For publicly offered debt the District shall endeavor to attain the best possible credit strategy for each debt issue (with or without credit enhancement) in order to reduce interest costs, within the context of preserving financial flexibility and meeting capital funding requirements. For some of the District's debt, in particular CFDs, the District may not pursue credit ratings if doing so does not lower the cost of borrowing.

- iii. The District shall remain mindful of debt limits in relation to assessed value changes within the District and the tax burden needed to meet long-term capital requirements.
- iv. The District shall consider market conditions and District cash flows when timing the issuance of debt.
- v. The District shall determine the amortization (maturity) schedule, which will best fit with the overall debt structure of the District at the time new debt is issued.
- vi. The District shall give consideration to matching the term of the debt issue to the useful lives of related assets whenever practical, while considering repair and replacement costs of those assets to be incurred in future years as an offset to the useful lives, and the related length of time in the payout structure.
- vii. The District shall, when planning for the issuance of new debt, consider the impact of such new debt on overlapping debt and the financing plans of local, state and other governments that overlap with the District.
- viii. The District shall, when issuing debt, assess financial alternatives to include new and innovative financing approaches whenever feasible, such as categorical grants, revolving loans or other state/federal aid, to minimize the encroachment on the District's general fund and the tax burden.

4. AUTHORIZATION AND TYPES OF DEBT AUTHORIZED TO BE ISSUED

a. <u>Authority and Purpose of the Issuance of Debt</u> – The laws of the State of California authorize the issuance of debt of the District and confer upon it the power and authority to make lease payments, contract debt, borrow money, and issue bonds for public improvement projects. Under these provisions, the District may contract debt to pay for the cost of acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, rehabilitating, replacing, improving, extending, enlarging and equipping District projects and or facilities, or to refund existing debt or to provide for the cash flow needs of the District.

b. Short-Term Debt (maturity of 13 months or less)

i. The District shall generally manage its cash position in a manner so that internally generated cash flow is sufficient to meet general operating needs.

ii. However, the District may issue fixed-rate and/or variable rate short-term debt, which may include TRANs, when such instruments are needed to meet the District's cash flow requirements for operations (working capital).

c. Long-Term Debt (maturity of greater than 13 months)

- i. Debt issues may be used to finance capital facilities, projects and certain capital equipment where it is appropriate to spread the cost of the projects over more than one fiscal year.
- ii. Projects, which are not appropriate for spreading costs over future years shall not be debt financed.
- iii. Under no circumstances, shall long-term debt be used to fund District operations.
- iv. The District may issue long-term debt that may include, but is not limited to GO Bonds, CFDs Bonds, lease financings, including Lease Revenue Bonds, Certificates of Participation, and/or other capital lease-purchase structures for capital facilities, projects and certain capital equipment.
- v. In the event the District has outstanding long-term debt in the form of lease financing structures if and when referendum-approved debt proceeds become available, the District may, if authorized, use a portion of such proceeds to redeem or defease such outstanding debt. In doing so, the District recognizes that voter-approved long-term debt is generally the lowest cost borrowing available to the District.
- vi. Before ordering a bond election, the Board shall obtain reasonable and informed projections of assessed valuations that take into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made by the county assessor. (Education Code 15100)

5. LIMITATION OF DEBT

a. The District intends to comply with California Education Code Section 15106, which limits the District's total outstanding debt (i.e., principal portion only) to 2.50% of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the District. TRANs and lease payment obligations in support of lease financings generally

do not count against this limit except as provided in California Education Code Section 17422.

b. Limitations on the size of a TRANs issue shall be based on a conservative calculated cash deficit as best known at the time of issue.

6. STRUCTURE OF DEBT ISSUES

- a. <u>Relation of Debt to District Budget</u> The District shall review and consider its existing capital improvement/facilities plan when issuing debt.
- b. <u>Maturity of Debt</u> The District shall structure debt to mature in compliance with Section 147 (b) of the Internal Revenue Code (or any successor thereto) and the applicable provisions of both the Education Code and Government Code.
- c. <u>Debt Service Structure</u> The District shall design the financing schedule and repayment of debt so as to take best advantage of market conditions, provide flexibility, and, as practical, to recapture or achieve its best credit rating for future use. Annual debt service payments shall generally be amortized on a level basis or consistent with either revenue or budget demands, or in the case of GO Bonds, consistent with conservative growth expectations for assessed valuation and taking into consideration both existing and future GO Bond issuances.
- d. <u>Call Provisions</u> The Superintendent or designee, based upon analysis from the underwriters and financial advisors of the economics of callable versus non-callable features, shall set forth redemption and/or prepayment recommendations for each debt issue.
- e. <u>Credit Enhancement</u> The District may enter into credit enhancement agreements such as municipal bond insurance, reserve sureties, and letters of credit with commercial banks, municipal bond insurance companies, or other financial entities when such enhancement results in lower borrowing costs, eliminates restrictive covenants, or has a net economic benefit to the debt issuance. The District shall use a competitive process to select providers of such credit enhancements to the extent applicable.

7. SALE OF SECURITIES

a. <u>Public Sale</u> – There are two methods of a public sale of debt, competitive and negotiated. Preference shall be given to competitive sales. However, both methods of sale shall be considered for all issuance of debt to the extent allowed by law, as each method has the potential to achieve the lowest financing cost given the right conditions.

- i. <u>Competitive Sale</u> When a competitive bidding process is deemed the most advantageous method of sale for the District, award shall be based upon, among other factors; the lowest offered True Interest Cost ("TIC").
- ii. Negotiated Sale When a negotiated sale process is deemed the most advantageous method of sale for the District, selection shall be based upon, among other factors, qualifications, experience, pricing ability, and fees.
- b. <u>Private Placement</u> While not used as frequently as negotiated or competitive public sale methods, a private placement sale may be appropriate when the financing can or must be structured for a single or limited number of purchasers.

8. CREDIT RATING AGENCIES

- a. In public issuance of debt, the District shall endeavor to attain the best possible credit rating for each debt issue (with or without credit enhancement).
- b. In private placement, the District will consider the debt issuance on its overall credit rating.
- c. The District shall endeavor to maintain effective relations with credit rating agencies.
- d. The District and its financial advisor shall meet with, make presentations to, or otherwise communicate with the credit rating agencies on a regular basis in order to keep the credit rating agencies informed concerning the District's capital project plans, debt issuance program, debt management activities, and other appropriate financial information.

9. REFUNDING AND RESTRUCTURING OUTSTANDING DEBT

- a. Whenever deemed to be in the best interest of the District, the District may consider refunding or restructuring outstanding debt. The primary considerations for refunding or restructuring outstanding debt shall be financially advantageous or beneficial structuring.
- b. The financial advantages of refunding outstanding debt shall be based upon a review of a net present value analysis of any proposed refunding in order to make a determination regarding the cost-effectiveness of the proposed refunding.

- i. Generally, the District may initiate a refunding when four (4.00%) percent net present value or greater savings as a percentage of the refunded aggregate principal amount can be achieved.
- ii. The target net present value savings as a percentage of the refunded aggregate principal amount shall be no less than three (3.00%) percent at the time of sale. The Superintendent shall have the discretion to designate a lower percentage savings if more applicable, such as for transactions with only a few years until maturity or for lease financings being defeased or redeemed from proceeds of GO Bonds.

10. INTERNAL CONTROLS

The District shall be vigilant in using bond proceeds in accordance with the stated purposes at the time such debt was incurred. In furtherance of the policy, and in connection with the issuance of all GO Bonds:

- a. As required by Government Code Section 53410, the District shall only use GO Bond proceeds for the purposes approved by the district's voters; and
- b. The Superintendent shall have the responsibility, no less often than annually, to provide to the District's Board of Education a written report which shall contain at least the following information:
 - i. The amount of the Bond proceeds received and expended during the applicable reporting period; and
 - ii. The status of the acquisition, construction or financing of the school facility projects, as identified in any applicable bond measure, with the proceeds of the GO Bonds.

These reports may be combined with other periodic reports which include the same information, including but not limited to, periodic reports made to the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission, or continuing disclosure reports or other reports made in connection with the GO Bonds. These requirements shall apply only until the earliest of the following: (i) all the GO Bonds are redeemed or defeased, but if the GO Bonds are refunded, such provisions shall apply until all such refunding bonds are redeemed or defeased, or (ii) all proceeds of the GO Bonds, or any investment earnings thereon, are fully expended.

c. The District shall post on the District website the Annual Report of the District's Independent Bond Oversight Committee which has been given the responsibility to review the expenditure of GO Bond proceeds to assure the

community that all GO Bond funds have been used for the construction, renovation, repair, furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and not used for teacher or administrator salaries or other operating expenses.

- d. The District shall hire an independent auditor to perform an annual independent financial and performance audit of the expenditure of GO Bond proceeds, and to post such audits on the District website.
- e. Written requisitions identifying the amount and purpose of a proposed draw of bond or other debt proceeds shall be signed by a District official and submitted to the appropriate officials at the County of Orange or trustee, as applicable.

11. MISCELLANEOUS

- a. The District acknowledges that the capital marketplace fluctuates, municipal finance products change from time to time, and that issuer and investor supply and demand vary. These fluctuations may produce situations that are not anticipated or covered by this policy. As such, the Board of Education may make exceptions or modifications to this policy to achieve the debt management goals outlined above. Management flexibility is appropriate and necessary in such situations, provided specific authorization is granted by the Board of Education.
- b. The Superintendent may develop additional specific elements of a debt management framework through rules and regulations, which, along with this policy, shall be reviewed periodically in consideration of changing laws, District needs and market conditions.
- c. With regard to general obligation bonds, the district shall invest new money bond proceeds in the county treasury pool as required by law. (Education Code 15146)

Risk Management/Insurance

The Board of Education supports a risk management program that protects District resources and promotes the safety of students, staff and the public.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a risk management program that uses effective safety and loss control practices. The District shall strive to keep its liability at a minimum and its insurance premiums as low as possible while maintaining adequate protection. To determine the most economical means of insuring that the District is consistent with required services, the Superintendent or designee **shall annually review the District's options for obtaining coverage**, including qualified insurance agents, a joint powers agency, self-insurance or a combination of these means.

The insurance program shall include, but not be limited to:

- 1. Fire and Damage Insurance (building and equipment)
- 2. Fire & Property Damage Insurance (buses & automotive vehicles)
- 3. Workers Compensation Insurance
- 4. Fidelity Bond Insurance
- 5. Liability Insurance

Where possible, insurance may be placed through:

- 1. Full time insurance agents who are qualified for the specific insurance program
- 2. Full time agents who qualify for other requirements which may be established by the District to meet specific situations or needs
- 3. A joint powers agency
- 4. Self insurance program

The Board of Education reserves the right to remove an insurance agent-of-record or a participating agent whenever, in the judgment of the Board, such action becomes desirable for the best interests of the District.

BP 3530(b)

Bonding

The Board recognizes that prudent trusteeship of the resources of the District dictate that employees responsible for the safekeeping of District moneys and property be bonded.

The District shall be indemnified against loss of money and property by bonding of employees holding positions which have extensive access to property and money.

Such bonds shall be subsumed under a blanket bond. The Board shall bear the cost of bonding each employee required to be bonded by this policy. (E.C. 41021)

To attempt to minimize the District's exposure to liability, the Board shall adopt clear policies related to discrimination, harassment, safety procedures and the timely handling of claims. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that these policies and related procedures are enforced fairly and consistently. Recruitment and Selection

The District shall employ the most highly qualified person available for each open position. The Board directs the Superintendent to develop recruitment and selection procedures which include:

- 1. Assessment of the District's needs to determine those areas where specific skills, knowledge and abilities are lacking.
- 2. Development of job descriptions which accurately portray the position.
- 3. Dissemination of vacancy announcements to ensure a wide range of candidates.
- 4. Screening procedures which will identify the best possible candidates for interviews.
- 5. Interview procedures which will determine the best qualified candidate for recommendation to the Board.

Staff members involved in the selection process shall recommend only those candidates who meet all qualifications established by law and the Board for a particular position. Nominations for employment shall be based upon appropriate screening devices, interviews, observations and recommendations from previous employers. All discussions and recommendations shall be confidential in accordance with law.

No inquiry shall be made with regard to the age, sex, race, color, religion, or national origin of a person seeking employment. Questions regarding handicap shall be asked only when directly related to the job.

During job interviews, applicants may be asked to describe or demonstrate how they will be able to perform the duties of the job. No inquiry shall be made with regard to any **information** category of discrimination prohibited by state or federal **nondiscrimination** laws.

The Superintendent or designee shall not inquire, orally or in writing, in regard to an applicant's salary history information, including compensation and benefits. He/she shall also not rely on salary history information as a factor in determining whether to offer employment to an applicant or the salary to offer. However, the Superintendent or designee may consider salary information that is disclosable under state or federal law or that the applicant discloses voluntarily and without prompting. Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the applicant the pay scale for the position to which he/she is applying. (Labor Code 432.3)

Except in the case of a replacement superintendent, no person shall be employed by the Board without a recommendation or endorsement of the Superintendent. The Board shall be presented

with one finalist who may be selected or rejected by the Board. If the candidate is rejected, the Superintendent shall recommend subsequent candidates until the Board selects someone to fill the position. The Board shall make the final decision on the selection of all employees.

Sexual Harassment

The Board of Education prohibits sexual harassment in the working environment of District employees, interns, volunteers, **contractors**, or applicants by any person in any form.

Any District employee who engages or participates in sexual harassment or who aids, abets, incites, compels, or coerces another to commit sexual harassment in violation of this policy is Employees who permit or engage in such harassment may be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Any employee, intern, volunteer, or applicant for employment who feels that he/she or another individual in the District is being sexually harassed should immediately contact his/her immediate supervisor, principal, other District administrator or the Superintendent or designee to obtain procedures for reporting a complaint. Complaints of sexual harassment shall be filed in accordance with AR 4030 - Nondiscrimination in Employment. An employee may bypass his/her supervisor in filing a complaint where the supervisor is the subject of the complaint.

Any supervisor, principal, or other District administrator who receives a harassment complaint shall promptly notify the Superintendent or designee, who shall ensure that the complaint is appropriately investigated.

The District prohibits retaliatory behavior or action against any person who complains, testifies, or otherwise participates complainant or any participant in the complaint process established for the purpose of this policy. All complaints and allegations of sexual harassment shall be kept confidential to the extent necessary to carry out the investigation or to take other subsequent necessary actions.

All Personnel

Employee Security

The Board desires to provide a safe, orderly working environment for all employees. As part of the District's comprehensive school safety plan, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for protecting employees from potentially dangerous persons and situations and for **providing necessary** assistanceing and support when them in the event of an emergency situations occur. (cf. 3515 - School Safety and Security) (cf. 5131.4 - Campus Disturbances)

Any employee against whom violence or any threat of violence has been directed in the workplace shall notify the Superintendent or designee immediately. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall initiate legal and security measures to protect the employee and others in the workplace.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that employees receive training in crisis prevention and intervention techniques in order to protect themselves and students. Staff development may include training in classroom management, effective communication techniques, procedures for responding to an active shooter situation, and crisis resolution.

The Superintendent or designee **also** shall ensure that employees are informed **teachers**, in accordance with law, regarding of crimes and offenses **committed** by students who may pose a danger in the classroom.

When violence is directed against an employee by any individual and the employee so notifies the District, the District shall take steps to ensure that appropriate legal measures are instituted. When the employee notifies the District of a threat of bodily harm, the District shall take appropriate measures to enable the employee to request assistance if an attempt occurs on school grounds.

Employees shall may not carry or possess pepper spray/tear gas weapons on school property or at school activities, except when authorized by the Superintendent or designee for self-defense purposes. When allowed, an employee may only possess pepper spray in accordance with administrative regulations and Penal Code 22810. On a case-by-case basis, however, the Superintendent or designee may allow the possession of an approved pepper spray/tear gas weapon that meets the requirements of Penal Code 12403.7 when justified by unusual dangerous eircumstances. Any employee who is negligent or careless in the possession or handling of pepper spray such weapon shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary measures. (cf. 4118 - Suspension/Disciplinary Action) (cf. 4218 - Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action)

The Board requires employees to take immediate action upon being made aware that any person is in possession of a weapon or unauthorized injurious object on school grounds or at a school-related or school-sponsored activity. The employee shall use his/her own judgment as to the potential danger involved and shall do one of the following:

- 1. Confiscate the object and deliver it to the principal immediately;
- 2. Immediately notify the principal, who shall take appropriate action;
- 3. Immediately call 911 and the principal.

When informing the principal about the possession or seizure of a weapon or dangerous device, the employee shall report the name(s) of persons involved, witnesses, location, and the circumstances of any seizure.

Student and Family Privacy Rights

The Board of Education respects the rights of District students and their parents/guardians with regard to the privacy of their personal beliefs and the confidentiality of their personal information.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop regulations to ensure compliance with law when the District requests, retains, discloses, or otherwise uses the personal information of its students and their families. may collect, disclose, or use students' personal information for the exclusive purpose of developing, evaluating, or providing educational products or services for or two students or educational institutions, such as the following:

The regulations shall, at a minimum, address the following:

- 1. Whether the District may collect the personal information of students for marketing or sale
- 2. How the District will administer surveys that may request information about the personal beliefs and practices of students and their families
- 3. The rights of parents/guardians to inspect:
 - a. Survey instruments requesting information about their personal beliefs and practices or those of their children
 - b. Instructional materials used as part of their children's educational curriculum
- 4. Whether the District may administer any nonemergency invasive physical examination or screening
- 5. Notifications that the District will provide to students and parents/guardians with respect to their privacy rights
- 1. College or other postsecondary education recruitment or military recruitment
- 2. Book clubs, magazines, and programs providing access to low-cost literary products
- 3. Curriculum and instructional materials used by elementary and secondary schools
- 4. Tests and assessments to provide cognitive, evaluative, diagnostic, clinical, aptitude, or achievement information about students (or to generate other statistically useful data for the purpose of securing such tests and assessments) and the subsequent analysis and public release of the aggregate data from such tests and assessments
- 5. The sale by students of products or services to raise funds for school-related or education-related activities
- 6. Student recognition programs

The Superintendent or designee is prohibited from collecting, disclosing, or using a student's individually identifiable information, including his/her name, parent/guardian's name, home or other physical address, telephone number, or social security number, for the purpose of marketing or selling that information or providing the information to others for that purpose.

Admission

The Board of Education encourages the enrollment and appropriate placement of all school-aged children in school. The Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians of students entering a District school at any grade level about admission requirements and shall assist them with enrollment procedures.

The Superintendent or designee shall announce and publicize the timeline and process for registration of students at district schools. Applications for intradistrict or interdistrict enrollment shall be subject to the timelines specified in applicable Board policies and administrative regulations.

All appropriate staff shall receive training on district admission policies and procedures, including information regarding the types of documentation that can and cannot be requested.

The district's enrollment application shall include information about the health care options and enrollment assistance available to families within the district. The district shall not discriminate against any child for not having health care coverage and shall not use any information relating to a child's health care coverage or his/her interest in learning about health care coverage in any manner that would harm the child or his/her family. (Education Code 49452.9)

Before enrolling any child in a District school, the Superintendent or designee shall verify the student's child's age, residency, immunization, and any other applicable eligibility criteria specified in law, the accompanying administrative regulation, or other applicable and in Board policyies and or administrative regulations.

The District shall not inquire into or request documentation of a student's social security number or the last four digits of the social security number or the citizenship or immigration status of the student or his/her family members. (Education Code 234.7, 49076.7)

However, such information may be collected when required by state or federal law or to comply with requirements for special state or federal programs. In any such situation, the information shall be collected separately from the school enrollment process and the Superintendent or designee shall explain the limited purpose for which the information is collected. Enrollment in a district school shall not be denied on the basis of any such information of the student or his/her parents/guardians obtained by the district, or the student's or parent/guardian's refusal to provide such information to the district.

School registration information shall list all possible means of documenting a child's age for grades K-1 as authorized by Education Code 48002 or otherwise prescribed by the Board. Any alternative document allowed by the district shall be one that all persons can obtain regardless of immigration status, citizenship status, or national origin and shall not reveal information related to citizenship or immigrant status.

Federal and state law require the **The Superintendent or designee** shall immediately enrollment of a homeless youth student, (42 USC 11432) and foster youth, (Education Code 48853.5) student who has had contact with the juvenile justice system, or a child of a military family regardless of their ability to provide the school with records normally required for enrollment. In addition, Education Code 49701 requires the District to facilitate the enrollment of children of military families is not delayed because of outstanding fees or fines owed to the child's last school, lack of clothing normally required by the school, such as school uniforms or for his/her inability to produce previous academic, medical, or other records normally required for enrollment.

In addition, no child shall be denied enrollment in a District school solely on the basis of his/her arrest, adjudication by a juvenile court, formal or informal supervision by a probation officer, detention in a juvenile facility, enrollment in a juvenile court school, or other contact with the juvenile justice system. (Education Code 48645.5)

When enrolling in any District school, including a school in their attendance area, children whose parents/guardians reside within District boundaries shall be subject to the timelines established by the Board for open enrollment. Children whose parents/guardians do not reside within the District or who are not otherwise eligible for enrollment in the District may apply for interdistrict attendance in accordance with the timelines specified in applicable Board policies and administrative regulations.

The District's enrollment application shall include information about the health care options and enrollment assistance available to families within the District. The District shall not discriminate against any child for not having health care coverage and shall not use any information relating to a child's health care coverage or his/her interest in learning about health care coverage in any manner that would harm the child or his/her family. (Education Code 49452.9)

District Residency

The Board of Education desires to admit all students who reside within district boundaries or who fulfill the district residency requirements through other means as allowed by law. The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures to facilitate the receipt and verification of students' proof of residency.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually notify parents/guardians of all existing attendance options available in the district, including, but not limited to, all options for meeting residency requirements for school attendance. (Education Code 48980)

When establishing students' residency for enrollment purposes, the Superintendent or designee shall not inquire into the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members.

A student's enrollment may be denied when the submitted documentation is insufficient to establish district residency. In any such case, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parent/guardian in writing, including specific reasons for the denial.

Investigation of Residency

When the Superintendent or designee reasonably believes that a student's parent/guardian has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency, he/she may make reasonable efforts to determine that the student meets district residency requirements. An investigation may be initiated when the Superintendent or designee is able to identify specific, articulable facts supporting the belief that the parent/guardian has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency. (Education Code 48204.1, 48204.2)

The Superintendent or designee may assign a trained district employee to conduct the investigation. The investigation may include the examination of records, including public records, and/or interviews of persons who may have knowledge of the student's residency.

If necessary, the Superintendent or designee may employ the services of a private investigator to conduct the investigation. Before hiring a private investigator, the Superintendent or designee shall make other reasonable efforts to determine whether the student resides in the district. (Education Code 48204.2)

The investigation shall not include the surreptitious collection of photographic or videographic images of persons or places subject to the investigation. However, the use of technology is not prohibited if done in open and public view. (Education Code 48204.2)

Any employee or contractor engaged in the investigation shall truthfully identify himself/herself as an investigator to individuals contacted or interviewed during the course of the investigation. (Education Code 48204.2)

Appeal of Enrollment Denial

If the Superintendent or designee, upon investigation, determines that a student does not meet district residency requirements and denies the student's enrollment in the district, he/she shall provide the student's parent/guardian an opportunity to appeal that determination. (Education Code 48204.2)

The Superintendent or designee shall send the student's parent/guardian written notice specifying the basis for the district's determination. This notice shall also inform the parent/guardian that he/she may, within 10 school days, appeal the decision and provide new evidence of residency.

The burden shall be on the parent/guardian to show why the district's determination to deny enrollment should be overruled. (Education Code 48204.2)

A student who is currently enrolled in the district shall be allowed to remain in attendance at his/her school pending the results of the appeal. A student who is not currently enrolled in the district shall not be permitted to attend any district school unless his/her appeal is successful.

In an appeal to the Superintendent of a determination that district residency requirements were not met, the Superintendent shall review any evidence provided by the parent/guardian or obtained during the district's investigation and shall make a decision within 10 school days of receipt of the parent/guardian's request for the appeal. The Superintendent's decision shall be final.

Enrollment Not Requiring District Residency

When approved by the Board and the appropriate agency, the district may enroll students from other countries who are in the United States on an F-1 visa or are participating in an international exchange program under the sponsorship of a government-approved agency.

Student Records

The Board of Education recognizes the importance of keeping accurate, comprehensive student records as required by law. The Superintendent or designee shall establish ensure that the District's administrative regulations governing the identification, collection, retention, and security of student records. These regulations shall ensure the rights of authorized persons to have timely access to student records while and school site procedures for maintaining the confidentiality of student records are consistent with state and federal law.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish regulations governing the identification, description and security of student records, as well as timely access for authorized persons. These regulations shall ensure parental rights to review, inspect, and copy student records and shall protect the student and the student's family from invasion of privacy.

The Superintendent or designee shall designate a certificated employee to serve as custodian of records, with responsibility for student records at the District level. At each school, the principal or a certificated designee shall act be designated as custodian of records for students enrolled at that school. The custodian of records shall be responsible for implementing Board policy and administrative regulation regarding student records. (5 CCR 431)

All appropriate personnel shall receive training regarding district policies and procedures for gathering and handling sensitive student information.

The district shall not collect or solicit social security numbers or the last four digits of social security numbers of students or their parents/guardians, unless otherwise required to do so by state or federal law. (Education Code 49076.7)

No information or documents regarding the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members shall be collected, except as required by state or federal law or as required to administer a state or federally supported educational program. The Superintendent or designee shall not disclose student records to a person, agency, or organization for immigration enforcement purposes without parental consent, a court order, or a judicial subpoena. If a district employee receives such a request, he/she shall immediately report the request to the Superintendent. The Superintendent shall report the request to the Board in a timely manner that ensures the confidentiality and privacy of any potentially identifying information. (Education Code 234.7)

The Superintendent or designee shall not compile a list, registry, or database based on students' national origin, ethnicity, or religious belief, practice, or affiliation, nor shall he/she disclose student information to federal government authorities for the purpose of compiling such a list, registry, or database for purposes of immigration enforcement. Such information may only be compiled or exchanged with other local, state, or federal agencies if the information is aggregated and is not personally identifiable. (Government Code 8310.3)

Student Records from Social Media

The Superintendent or designee may gather and maintain information from the social media of any district student, provided that the district first notifies students and parents/guardians about the proposed program, offers an opportunity for public comment at a regularly scheduled Board meeting, and gathers only information that directly pertains to school safety or student safety. (Education Code 49073.6)

Contract for Digital Storage, Management, and Retrieval of Student Records

The Superintendent or designee may enter into a contract with a third party for the digital storage, management, and retrieval of student records and/or to authorize a third party provider of digital software to access, store, and use student records, provided that the contract meets the requirements of Education Code 49073.1 and other applicable state and federal laws.

Bullying

The Board of Education recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No student individual or group of students shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, retaliate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any other student or school personnel.

Cyberbullying includes the electronic creation or transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images on the Internet, social media, or other technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. as defined in Education Code 48900. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for addressing bullying in District schools prevention and intervention shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders including students, parents/guardians, and staff, and may be incorporated into the in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation governing the development of comprehensive safety plans and shall be incorporated into such the local control and accountability plan, and other applicable district and school plans.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee may collaborate with law enforcement, courts, social services, mental health services, other agencies, and community organizations in the development and implementation of joint strategies to promote safety in schools and the community and to provide services for alleged victims and perpetrators of bullying.

Bullying Prevention

To the extent possible, District and schools strategies shall focus on prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and **implementing** strategies to **promote** establish a positive, collabor-ative school climate. Students shall be informed through student handbooks and other appropriate means of District and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for perpetrators of bullying.

As appropriate, T the District may shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes social-emotional learning effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

Such instruction shall also educate students about the negative impact of bullying, discrimination, intimidation, and harassment based on actual or perceived immigration status, religious beliefs and customs, or any other individual bias or prejudice.

School staff The Superintendent or designee shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective prevention and intervention strategies. provide training to teachers and other school staff to raise their awareness about the legal obligation of the district and its employees to prevent discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of district students. Such training shall be designed to provide staff with the skills to:

- 1. Discuss the diversity of the student body and school community, including their varying immigration experiences
- 2. Discuss bullying prevention strategies with students, and teach students to recognize the behavior and characteristics of bullying perpetrators and victims
- 3. Identify the signs of bullying or harassing behavior
- 4. Take immediate corrective action when bullying is observed
- 5. Report incidents to the appropriate authorities, including law enforcement in instances of criminal behavior

Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, or cafeterias.

Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. School staff who witness bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1) In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness an act of bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

As When appropriate, based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators and He/she also may involve school counselors, mental health counselors, and/or contact law enforcement.

The Superintendent, principal, or principal's designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate. (Education Code 48900.9)

Reporting and Filing of Complaints and Investigation

Students may submit to a teacher or administrator a verbal or written complaint of conduct they consider to be bullying. Complaints of bullying shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with site-level grievance procedures specified in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment.

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher, the principal, a compliance officer, or any other available school employee. Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the principal of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report his/her observation to the principal or a district compliance officer, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal shall notify the district compliance officer identified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

When a student is reported to be engaging in bullying off campus, the Superintendent or designee shall investigate and document the activity and shall identify specific facts or circumstances that explain the impact or potential impact on school activity, school attendance, or the targeted student's educational performance.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages sent to them that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. If the When a student is using a social networking site or service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee shall file a request with the networking site or service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or a district compliance officer shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be given an opportunity to describe the incident, identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

Investigation and Resolution of Complaints

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory,

resolved in accordance with law and the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3.

If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

Discipline

Any student who engages in bullying on school premises, or off campus in a manner that causes or is likely to cause a substantial disruption of a school activity or school attendance, shall be subject to discipline, which Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion, in accordance with District policies and regulations.

Nondiscrimination/Harassment

The Board of Education desires to provide a safe school environment that allows all students equal access and opportunities in the District's academic, extracurricular and other educational support programs, services, and activities. The Board prohibits, at any District school or school activity, unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, and bullying targeted of at any student by anyone, based on the student's actual race or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental or physical disability, religion, age, marital or parental status, sex, sexual orientation, gender, (including gender identity, gender expression, or gender transition genetic information, transgender status, and nonconformity with sex stereotypes); the perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

This policy shall apply to all acts related to school activity or to school attendance occurring within a District school, (Education Code 234.1) and to acts which occur off campus or outside of school-related or school-sponsored activities but which may have an impact or create a hostile environment at school.

Prohibited Unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying includes may result from physical, verbal, nonverbal, or written conduct based on one of the categories listed above. Unlawful discrimination also includes the creation of a hostile environment through prohibited conduct that is so severe, persistent, or that is so severe and pervasive that it affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity; creates an intimidating, threatening, hostile, or offensive educational environment; has the effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance; or otherwise adversely affects a student's educational opportunities.

Unlawful discrimination also includes disparate treatment of students based on one of the categories above with respect to the provision of opportunities to participate in school programs or activities or the provision or receipt of educational benefits or services.

The Board also prohibits any form of retaliation against any student individual who files a complaint or report regarding an incident reports or participates in the reporting of unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying. files or participates in the filing of a complaint, or investigates or participates in the investigation of a complaint or report alleging unlawful discrimination. Retaliation complaints shall be investigated and resolved in the same manner as a discrimination complaint.

The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate students' access to the educational program by publicizing the District's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures to students, parents/guardians, and employees. He/she shall provide training and information on the scope and use of the policy and complaint procedures and take other measures designed to increase the school community's understanding of the requirements of law related to discrimination. The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the implementation of the District's nondiscrimination policies and practices and, as necessary, shall take action to remove any identified barrier to student access to or participation in the educational program. He/she shall report his/her findings and recommendations to the Board after each review.

Regardless of whether a complainant complies with the writing, timeline, and/or other formal filing requirements, all complaints alleging unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, shall be investigated and prompt action taken to stop the discrimination, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students.

Students who engage in **unlawful** discrimination, **including discriminatory** harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, in violation of law, Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to appropriate consequence or discipline. Any employee who permits or engages in prohibited discrimination, **including discriminatory** harassment, intimidation, bullying, or retaliation, **or bullying**, shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Grievance Procedures

The following position is designated Coordinator for Nondiscrimination to handle complaints regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and to answer inquiries regarding the District's nondiscrimination policies:

Any student who feels that he/she has been subjected to discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying should immediately contact the Coordinator, the principal, or any other staff member. In addition, any student who observes any such incident should report the incident to the Coordinator or principal, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

Any school employee who observes an incident of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying shall report the incident to the Coordinator or principal, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

In addition, the employee shall immediately intervene when safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

Upon receiving a complaint of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, the Coordinator or designee shall immediately investigate the complaint in accordance with the site level grievance procedures specified in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment.

Within 30 days of receiving the District's report, the complainant may appeal to the Superintendent if he/she disagrees with the resolution of the complaint.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the student handbook clearly describes the District's nondiscrimination policy, procedures for filing a complaint regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and the resources that are available to students who feel that they have been the victim of any such behavior. The District's policy shall also be posted on the District web site or any other location that is easily accessible to students.

When required pursuant to Education Code 48985, complaint forms shall be translated into the student's primary language.

Record-Keeping

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, to enable the district to monitor, address, and prevent repetitive prohibited behavior in district schools

Parental Notifications Required by Law

The Board of Education recognizes that notifications required by law are a part of the communication essential desires to promote effective communication between the home and the school school and the home and to keep parents/guardians informed regarding educational programs, school operations, and the legal rights of students and their parents/guardians. The Superintendent or designee shall send students and parents/guardians parents/guardians and students all notifications required by law, including notifications about legal rights, and any other notifications he/she believes will promote parental understanding and involvement.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine the primary language of each student enrolled in the District. When 15 percent or more of students enrolled in a school speak a single primary language other than English, all notices and reports sent to the parents/guardians of these students shall also be written in the primary language and may be answered by the parent/guardian in either language. (E.C. 48985, 52164, 52164.1)

Notice of the rights and responsibilities of parents/guardians as specified in Education Code 48980 shall be sent at the beginning of each academic year and may be provided by regular mail, in electronic form when so requested by the parent/guardian, or by any other method normally used by the district for written communication with parents/guardians. (Education Code 48981)

No activity specified in Education Code 48980 shall be undertaken with respect to any particular student unless his/her parent/guardian has been informed of such action through the annual notification or other separate special notification. Such notice shall state the activity that will be undertaken and the approximate date on which the activity will occur. (Education Code 48983-48984)

The annual notification shall include a request that the parent/guardian sign the notice and return it to the school or, if the notice is provided in electronic format, that the parent/guardian submit a signed acknowledgment of receipt of the notice to the school. The parent/guardian's signature is an acknowledgment of receipt of the information but does not indicate that consent to participate in any particular program has been given or withheld. (Education Code 48982)

Whenever a teacher learns that a student's parent/guardian is for any reason unable to understand the District's printed notifications, the principal or designee may assist the parent/guardian in establishing other appropriate means of communication. student enrolls in a district school during the school year, his/her parents/guardians shall be given all required parental notifications at that time.

Notifications shall be presented in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, in a language that parents/guardians can understand.

Whenever 15 percent or more of the students enrolled in a district school speak a single primary language other than English, as determined from the California Department of Education census data collected pursuant to Education Code 52164, all notices sent to the parent/guardian of any such student shall, in addition to being written in English, be written in the primary language, and may be responded to either in English or the primary language. (Education Code 48981, 48985)

Whenever an employee learns that a student's parent/guardian is unable to understand the district's printed notifications for any reason, he/she shall inform the principal or designee, who shall work with the parent/guardian to establish other appropriate means of communication.

Hate-Motivated Behavior

In order to create a safe learning environment for all students, tThe Board of Education desires is committed to providing a safe learning environment that protects the right of every students to be free—from discrimination, harassment, intimidation, bullying and other hate-motivated behavior motivated by a person's hostility towards another person's real or perceived ethnicity, national origin, immigrant status, sex, gender, sexual orientation, religious belief, age, disability, or any other physical or cultural characteristic. and will promote harmonious relationships among students so as to enable them to gain a true understanding of the civil rights and social responsibilities of people in society. The District prohibits discriminatory behavior or statements that degrade an individual on the basis of his/her actual or perceived race, ethnicity, culture, heritage, gender, sex, sexual orientation, physical/mental attributes, or religious beliefs or practices.

California Association of Human Relations Organizations conducts activities designed to protect human and civil rights through networks of collaborations that reduce community tension and build intergroup relationships

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with regional programs and community organizations to promote safe environments for youth. These Such collaborative efforts shall be focused on providing ensuring an efficient use of District and community resources, developing effective prevention strategies and response plans, providing assistance to students affected by hate-motivated behavior, and/or educating students who have perpetrated hate-motivated acts. The Superintendent or designee shall design strategies to promote harmonious relationships among students, prevent incidents of hate-motivated behavior to the extent possible, and address such incidents if they occur.

The district shall provide students with age-appropriate instruction that includes the development of social-emotional learning, promotes their understanding of and respect for human rights, diversity, and acceptance in a multicultural society, and provides strategies to manage conflicts constructively.

As necessary, the district shall provide counseling, guidance, and support to students who are victims of hate-motivated behavior and to students who exhibit such behavior.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the rules prohibiting hate-motivated behavior and procedures for reporting a hate-motivated incident are provided to students and parents/guardians.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide staff with training on recognizing and preventing hate-motivated behavior and on effectively enforcing rules for appropriate student conduct.

Complaint Process

A ny student or parent/guardian who believes he/she the student is a victim of hate-motivated behavior shall immediately contact the Principal is strongly encouraged to report the incident to a teacher, the principal, or other staff member. Any staff member who is notified that hate-motivated behavior has occurred, observes such behavior, or otherwise becomes aware of an incident shall immediately contact the principal or the compliance officer responsible for coordinating the district's response to complaints and complying with state and federal civil rights laws. As appropriate, he/she shall also contact law enforcement.

Upon receiving such a complaint, the Principal shall immediately investigate the complaint in accordance with school-level complaint process/grievance procedures as described in AR 5145.7

Sexual Harassment. A student who has been found to have demonstrated hate motivated behavior shall be subject to discipline in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Any complaint of hate-motivated behavior shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, shall be resolved in accordance with law and the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures. If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory behavior, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

Staff who receive notice of hate motivated behavior or personally observe such behavior shall notify the Principal, Superintendent or designee, and/or law enforcement, as appropriate.

As necessary, the District shall provide counseling, guidance, and support to students who are victims of hate-motivated behavior and to students who exhibit such behavior.

Research on Students

Research on students of this District beyond the conventional testing program (both District wide and for the purposes of evaluation of the individual student) shall not be conducted except under at least the following circumstances.

- 1. The research design has been presented to and approved by the Superintendent.
- 2. All research instruments, included but not limited to questionnaires, surveys and interview forms, have been submitted to and approved by the Superintendent.
- 3. Adequate care has been taken to protect individual students under Policy and Regulation 5125/5125.1 Student Records; Confidentiality, and other provisions of law.
- 4. A final copy of all research reports, theses, dissertations and/or surveys, including analyses and conclusions, shall be presented to the Superintendent for the use of the District. The District shall have the right to use the research in the best interests of the students of the District.
- 5. The Board shall have the right to refuse publication rights if the Board, in its judgment, believes that the research was not carried out according to the highest standards of research, that the analysis and/or conclusion presents a biased or incorrect position, that the research was not carried out according to the approved research design, or that publication of the research study will present an immediate danger to the educational program. (cf. 6162.5—Research/Standardized Testing)

Response to Immigration Enforcement

The Governing Board is committed to the success of all students and believes that every school site should be a safe and welcoming place for all students and their families irrespective of their citizenship or immigration status.

District staff shall not solicit or collect information or documents regarding the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members or provide assistance with immigration enforcement at district schools, except as may be required by state and federal law. (Education Code 234.7)

No student shall be denied equal rights and opportunities nor be subjected to unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying in the district's programs and activities on the basis of his/her immigration status.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians regarding their children's right to a free public education regardless of immigration status or religious beliefs and their rights related to immigration enforcement. (Education Code 234.7)

Consistent with requirements of the California Office of the Attorney General, the Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures for addressing any requests by a law enforcement officer for access to district records, school sites, or students for the purpose of immigration enforcement.

Teachers, school administrators, and other school staff shall receive training regarding immigration issues, including information on responding to a request from an immigration officer to visit a school site or to have access to a student.

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board in a timely manner any requests for information or access to a school site by an officer or employee of a law enforcement agency for the purpose of enforcing the immigration laws. Such notification shall be provided in a manner that ensures the confidentiality and privacy of any potentially identifying information. (Education Code 234.7)

Instruction

Toxic Art Supplies

The Board of Education recognizes its responsibility to protect the health and safety of students in the selection of materials used for instruction.

The Superintendent shall develop procedures for the purchase, use and proper disposal of materials which insure that the health and safety of students is protected from harmful exposure to toxic substances. These procedures shall be developed in accordance with information provided in the State Department of Education and the State Department of Health Services.

In no event shall arts and crafts material be purchased for use in grades K through 6 which contain toxic substances or cause chronic illness as determined by the State Department of Health Services.

In grades 7 through 12, the purchase of arts and crafts materials containing toxic substances is permitted if the products are properly labeled to warn of potential adverse health effects in accordance with the requirements of E.C. 32065. The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures that ensure extreme care when those materials are incorporated into the classroom instruction process.

Students in grades 7-12 are considered able to read and understand product labels and to take adequate precautions to use products which are prohibited for use in grades K 6. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that arts and crafts materials purchased for use in grades 7-12 meet the requirements of Education Code 32065. The products must be properly labeled to identify toxic ingredients, warn of potential adverse health effects and describe procedures for safe use and storage.

Instruction

Student Assessment

The Board of Education recognizes that believes that the primary goal of student assessments are an important instructional and accountability tool. To obtain the most accurate evaluation of student performance, the District shall use a variety of measures, including district, state, and/or national assessments. should be to help students, parents/guardians and teachers identify individual student's academic accomplishments, progress and areas needing improvement in order to enhance teaching and learning.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that assessments are conducted for purposes of determining students' eligibility for and Assessment data shall be used to help determine individual students' progress, mastery of academic standards, appropriate placement in District programs, need for supplemental instruction and/or eligibility for graduation. In addition, summary data on student assessment results shall be used by the District to identify and review student achievement goals in the District's local control and accountability plan, evaluate District educational programs in order to identify needed improvements, and, as appropriate, evaluate staff performance.

In selecting or developing any district assessment, the Superintendent or designee shall examine evidence of its reliability, its The Board desires to use a variety of evaluation measures to reach the above state goal. To have validity for the intended purpose and for various student populations, and the extent to which it aligns with tests must correspond to the material that is being taught. and reliably measure the extent to which students meet specified standards of achievement.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that assessments are administered in accordance with law and test publisher's directions, and that test administration procedures are fair and equitable for all students.

As appropriate, assessment results shall be disaggregated by student subgroup, classroom, grade level, and/or school site to allow for critical analysis of student needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development as needed to assist administrators and teachers in interpreting and using assessment data to improve student performance and the instructional program.

The effectiveness of the schools, teachers and District shall be evaluated in part on the basis of these student assessments. When Districtwide and school-level results of student assessments are published by the state, the Superintendent or designee may provide supplementary information to assist parents/guardians and the local community in understanding interpreting test results and evaluating school performance.

Interim and Formative Assessments

State interim and formative assessments may be used in combination with other sources of information to gain timely feedback about student progress in an effort to continually adjust instruction to improve learning. Results from interim and formative assessments shall not be used for any high-stakes purpose, including, but not limited to, teacher or other school staff evaluation, accountability, student grade promotion or retention, graduation, course or class placement, identification for gifted or talented education, reclassification of English learners, or identification as an individual with special needs. (Education Code 60642.6, 60642.7)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers who administer interim and formative assessments have access to all functions and information designed for teacher use related to such assessments and student performance on the assessments. (Education Code 60642.6)

Individual Record of Accomplishment

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each student, by the end of grade 12, has an individual record of accomplishment that includes the following: (Education Code 60607)

- The results of the state achievement tests required and administered under as part of the Standardized Testing and Reporting program California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress, or any predecessor assessments, pursuant to Education Code 60640-60649-60647
- 2. The results of any end-of-course examinations taken
- 3. The results of any vocational education certification examinations taken

No individual record of accomplishment shall be released to any person, other than the student's parent/guardian or a teacher, counselor, or administrator directly involved with the student, without the written consent of the student's parent/guardian, or the student if he/she is an adult or emancipated minor. The student or his/her parent/guardian may authorize the release of the record of accomplishment to a postsecondary educational institution for the purposes of credit, placement, or admission. (Education Code 60607)

Students

Transitional Kindergarten

The Board of Education desires to offer a high-quality transitional kindergarten (TK) program for eligible children who do not yet meet the minimum age criterion for kindergarten. The TK program shall assist children in developing the academic, social, and emotional skills they need to succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

The District's transitional kindergarten shall be the first year of a two-year kindergarten program. (Education Code 48000)

The Board encourages ongoing collaboration among District preschool staff, other preschool providers, elementary teachers, administrators, and parents/guardians in program development, implementation, and evaluation of the District's TK program.

Eligibility

The District's transitional kindergarten program shall admit children whose fifth birthday is from September 2 through December 2 (Education Code 48000)

Parents/guardians of eligible children shall be notified of the availability of the TK program and the age, residency, immunization and any other enrollment requirements. Enrollment in the TK program shall be voluntary.

Upon request of a child's parents/guardians, the district may, on a case-by-case basis after the Superintendent or designee determines that it is in the child's best interest, admit into the district's TK program a child whose fifth birthday is on or before September 1 and who is therefore eligible for kindergarten.

At any time during the school year, the district may admit into the TK program a child whose fifth birthday is after December 2 of that same school year, provided that the Superintendent or designee recommends that enrollment in a TK program is in the child's best interest and the child's parents/guardians approve. Prior to such enrollment, the child's parents/guardians shall be provided information regarding the advantages and disadvantages and any other explanatory information about the effect of early admittance. (Education Code 48000)

Curriculum and Instruction

The District's TK program shall be based on a modified kindergarten curriculum that is age and developmentally appropriate. (Education Code 48000)

The program shall be aligned with the preschool learning foundations and preschool curriculum frameworks developed by the California Department of Education. It shall be designed to facilitate students' development in essential skills related to language and literacy, mathematics, physical development, health, visual and performing arts, science, history-social science, English language development, and social-emotional development.

The number of instructional minutes offered in transitional kindergarten shall be the same as that required for the District's kindergarten program.

Staffing

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers assigned to teach in TK classes possess a teaching credential or permit from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) that authorizes such instruction.

A credentialed teacher who is first assigned to a TK class after July 1, 2015, shall, by August 1, 2020, have at least 24 units in early childhood education and/or child development, comparable experience in a preschool setting, and/or a child development teacher permit issued by the CTC. (Education Code 48000)

The Superintendent or designee may provide professional development as needed to ensure that TK teachers are knowledgeable about the standards and effective instructional methods for teaching young children.

Continuation to Kindergarten

Students who complete the TK program shall continue in kindergarten the following school year. Parents/guardians of such students shall not be required to submit a signed parental permission form for kindergarten attendance.

However, whenever children who would otherwise be age-eligible for kindergarten are enrolled in TK, the Superintendent or designee shall obtain a Kindergarten Continuance Form signed by the parent/guardian near the end of the TK year consenting to the child's enrollment in kindergarten the following year. A student shall not attend more than two years in a combination of transitional kindergarten and kindergarten. (Education Code 46300)

Assessment

The Superintendent or designee shall develop or identify appropriate formal and/or informal assessments of transitional kindergarten students' development and progress. He/she shall monitor and regularly report to the Board regarding program implementation and the progress of students in meeting related academic standards.

Instruction

Title I Programs

In order to improve the academic achievement of disadvantaged students, the District shall use federal Title I funds to provide eligible students with supplementary services to reinforce the core curriculum and assist students in attaining proficiency on state academic achievement standards and assessments.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide technical assistance and support to any school participating in the Title I program, including consultation in the development and implementation of school plans and activities. (20 USC 6312)

The Superintendent or designee shall involve parents/guardians in the joint development of the District's written Parent Involvement Policy pursuant to 20 U.S.C. + 6318.

Local Educational Agency Plan

The Board of Education desires to provide a high-quality education that enables all students to meet challenging state academic standards. In schools with a large number or percentage of economically disadvantaged families, the district shall use Title I funds to provide services that strengthen the academic program and provide support to students at risk of failing to achieve academic standards.

Title I funds shall be used to supplement, not supplant, funds available from state and local sources for the education of students participating in Title I programs. (20 USC 6314, 6321)

Descriptions of how the district will address the required components of the Title I local educational agency plan, as specified in 20 USC 6312, shall be included within the district's control and accountability plan (LCAP), the LCAP Federal Addendum, or another document. School-level strategies shall be aligned with the district's plan and be tailored to the specific needs of the students at the school.

In addition, the district and each school receiving Title I funds shall develop a written parent/guardian and family engagement policy in accordance with 20 USC 6318.

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other appropriate school personnel, and parents/guardians of participating students in the development, periodic review, and, as necessary, the revision of a local educational agency (LEA) plan. The plan and any revisions shall be submitted to the Governing Board for approval. (20 USC 6312)

The plan shall address the components specified in 20 USC 6312, which describe the assessments, strategies, and services the District will use to help low achieving students meet challenging academic standards.

The initial plan shall be submitted to the California Department of Education (CDE) and approved by the State Board of Education. Subsequent revisions of the plan shall be kept on file in the District.

Comparability of Services

In schools receiving Title I funds, state and local funds shall be used by schools receiving Title I funds to provide services that, taken as a whole, are at least comparable to services in schools that are not receiving Title I funds or, if all District schools are receiving Title I funds, that are substantially comparable in each school. Comparability may be determined on a school-by-school basis or by grade-span basis.

To demonstrate comparability of services among district schools, the district shall:

- 1. Adopt and implement a districtwide salary schedule
- 2. Ensure equivalence in teachers, administrators, and other staff, as measured by either or both of the following:
 - a. The ratio of students to instructional staff at each Title I school within a grade span, which shall not exceed 110 percent of the average ratio for all non-Title I district schools within that grade span
 - b. Salary expenditures for instructional staff at each Title I school, which shall be no less than 90 percent of the average salary expenditure across non-Title I district schools.
- 3. Ensure equivalence in the provision of curriculum materials and instructional supplies, by determining whether the per-student expenditure of state and local funds for curriculum materials and instructional supplies in Title I schools is between 90 and 110 percent of the districtwide average
- 4. Determine whether the amount of state and local funds allocated per student for each grade span is between 90 and 110 percent of the per student average for each grade span in non-Title I schools

In determining comparability, the District shall not include staff salary differentials for years of employment. The District also may exclude unpredictable changes in student enrollment or personnel assignments that occur after the beginning of the school year, state and local funds expended for language instruction educational programs, state and local funds expended for the excess costs of providing services to disabled students, and supplemental state or local funds expended in any school attendance area or school for programs that specifically meet the intent and purposes of Title I. (20 USC 6321)

The Superintendent or designee shall annually assess comparability in accordance with the above criteria and maintain records documenting the district's compliance. If any instances of non-comparability are identified, the Superintendent or designee shall promptly implement adjustments as needed to ensure comparability.

Participation of Private School Students

The district shall provide or contract to provide special educational services, instructional services (including evaluations to determine the progress being made in meeting students' academic needs), counseling, mentoring, one-on-one tutoring, or other Title I benefits to eligible private school students residing in a participating school attendance area. Such services and benefits shall be provided on an equitable basis in comparison to services and other benefits for public school students. (20 USC 6320, 7881)

Program Evaluation

The Board of Education shall use state assessment results and other available measures or indicators to annually review the progress of each participating school and determine whether the school is making adequate yearly progress toward ensuring that all students meet the State's proficient level of achievement on state academic assessments. regularly monitor the progress of economically disadvantaged and low-achieving students in Title I schools. During the annual evaluation of the district's progress toward achieving each goal identified in the LCAP or other planning document addressing 20 USC 6312, the Board shall review disaggregated data on academic achievement, school attendance, and other outcomes for such students and shall ensure that strategies are revised as necessary to support continuous improvement.

Facilities

Facilities Master Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall develop and maintain a Orange Unified School District facilities master plan for district facilities. This plan shall be maintained and kept up-to-date and The plan shall reflect the short and long term educational programming needs of the students based on the district educational goals. To assist in the accurate assessment of these needs, the plan shall include an identification of social, economic and political factors in the community together with district-level housing and funding issues which will ultimately affect the success and effectiveness of the district building and renovation program.

The plan shall, at a minimum, incorporate population and enrollment projections based on a review of: (1) residential housing growth patterns; (2) kindergarten enrollments; (3) birth-rate data; and (4) student yield factors.

Concurrent with efforts to identify those demographic factors affecting school enrollment, the plan shall include an analysis of present and future design needs of the district together with an assessment of those qualitative factors which reflect the characteristics and capacity of each school facility.

The plan shall be based on an assessment of the district's short- and long-term facility needs, giving consideration to:

- 1. Current and projected school enrollments for each grade level, based on residential housing growth patterns in accordance with city/county general plans and other demographic factors.
- 2. The district's educational goals. (cf. 0200 Goals for the School District)
- 3. Current and projected educational program requirements.
- 4. Student safety and welfare.
- 5. An evaluation of existing buildings and needs for modernization and renovation. (cf. 7111 Evaluating Existing Buildings)
- 6. State planning standards and local zoning requirements.
- 7. The community's social, economic and political characteristics.
- 8. Estimated costs associated with meeting the district's facility needs.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff, parents/ guardians, students, and business and community representatives are kept informed of the need for facilities construction or modernization.

The Superintendent or designee shall also establish a facilities committee that shall meet at regular intervals in order to give community members opportunities to provide input into the planning process. (cf. 1220 - Citizen Advisory Committees)

To ensure that proposed facilities conform with all state planning standards and local zoning requirements, the Superintendent or designee shall consult architectural and engineering firms, utility companies, local governmental and planning agencies, the **Orange County Department of Education** county office of education, the California Department of Education, the Division of the State Architect and the Office of Public School Construction. Assistance from colleges and universities, planning laboratories and private consulting firms shall be authorized when necessary to augment district staff resources.

School Capacities

- 1. For elementary classrooms, "Capacity" is defined by the terms and conditions in accordance with the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) Guidelines as 30 students per elementary classroom for all available classrooms and specifically excludes Library space, Instructional Support Center space and Multi-Purpose space. If no criteria is established under the LCFF Guidelines, then a loading factor of 30 students per classroom will be utilized.
 - "As built" is defined as the original footprint of the actual building including any originally planned relocatable space.
- 2. The minimum capacity required to operate a school is 51% of as built capacity. At such time that a school reaches 50% of as built capacity, the Superintendent or designee shall direct staff to begin the capacity review process for recommendation(s) to the Board of Education.
- 3. The maximum capacity to operate a school is 95% of as built capacity. At such time that a school reaches 96% of as built capacity, the Superintendent or designee will follow subsequent administrative regulations.
- 4. It is conceivable that a campus could expand to either 120% of as built capacity or 145% of as built capacity. Should this occasion ever arise, the Superintendent or designee shall recommend to the Board of Education the school be capped for new enrollment purposes.

On May 5, 2018, staff obtained authorization to award CMAS Master Contract Nos. 4-18-51-0061A effective January 12, 2018 through April 2, 2021, and 4-18-51-0061C effective March 19, 2018 through March 19, 2022, awarded to ACCO Engineered Systems, Inc., for the purchase of electrical switchgear equipment for Measure S Program projects, and Districtwide projects as needed. Staff now needs to prepare for upgrades to the switchgear systems at El Modena High School, which is necessary for sufficient power distribution to meet current needs and allow for future growth. Staff has determined that it is in the best interest of the District to continue utilizing CMAS Master Contract Nos. 4-18-51-0061A and 4-18-51-0061C for the purchase of the upgraded switchgear equipment, from ACCO Engineered Systems. It is recommended that the Board approve use of CMAS Master Contract Nos. 4-18-51-0061A and 4-18-51-0061C, for the purchase of various power distribution switchgear equipment, to facilitate infrastructure upgrades for the Measure S Program projects at El Modena High School.

ACCEPTANCE OF ADDITIONAL FUNDS FOR CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON "TITAN EDUCATOR" PROJECT

DESCRIPTION:

The S.D. Bechtel, Jr. Foundation, as part of the Bechtel Foundation's New Generation of Educator's Initiative (NGEI), has provided funding for California State University, Fullerton (CSUF) to partner with local school districts in the preparation of new teacher candidates in the areas of K-8 math and science through the "Titan EDUCATOR" project. The NGEI funds are used to strengthen the clinical residency model of teacher preparation (i.e. student teaching experience), particularly in the areas of math and science in partnership between CSUF and selected partner school districts.

Orange Unified has participated with CSUF in this project since 2016-17. The District's partnership with CSUF works to build a comprehensive teacher development pipeline beginning with each teacher candidate's undergraduate work and extending into the teacher preparation program. This partnership is intended to benefit the District in the hiring and retention of quality educators.

Originally this program was funded for the 2016-17 and 2017-18 school years. The District has been notified that an additional \$80,000 has been allotted to extend this project into the 2018-19 school year.

FISCAL IMPACT:

An additional \$80,000 has been allotted to this program for the 2018-19 school year.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education authorize the Superintendent or designee to accept the NGEI funding in order to participate with California State University, Fullerton in the Titan EDUCATOR project for the 2018-19 school year.

Notification for the Specialized Secondary Programs – Cohort 3 – Year 2 Implementation. These funds will be for the Digital Audio Production program at Villa Park High School that supports two innovative pathway SSP courses - Career Focus: Digital Audio and Intermediate Digital Audio

Production.

The Digital Audio pathway will give students experience using industry standard software, creating high-quality audio projects, and collaborating across disciplines. It will also introduce students to the business side of music production through coursework and class visits by leaders in the music

industry.

After completing these courses, students can transfer their skills to an audio design or music production course at a 2 or 4-year college, or directly apply them in an apprenticeship or job in audio design, music production, licensing, or

management.

FISCAL IMPACT: Receipt of \$119,125 in grant funds.

HOTEL AND TOURISM MANAGEMENT (UC)

Students will apply 21st Century skills (Critical Thinking, Collaboration, Communication, Creative Thinking) as they dive deeper into the duties and responsibilities of management positions found throughout the hospitality industry. Students will learn to manage departments according to the expectations of the "Production Team" or Production Handbook and they will solve problems, use innovative ideas, and practice multiple forms of communication as they create customer-based solutions to real-world scenarios found in various branches of the Hospitality and Tourism Industry. From airlines to bed and breakfast establishments, students will be able to focus on the industry that most interests them. This course meets the UC "g" requirement.

INTERMEDIATE DIGITAL AUDIO (UC)

This course will expand students' knowledge of audio engineering and production. It places a strong emphasis on building skills of collaboration, which are key to those in the music industry. Students will become familiar with Digital Audio Workstations (DAWs) and begin working in ProTools, software that is the industry standard for audio engineers working in the film, broadcast, music, and video game industries. Students will gain a broader understanding of live recording through collaboration with the visual and performing arts departments and dance pathways to record live instruments, foley, sound effects and vocalists using DAWs. They will also collaborate with the graphic design department to create cover designs for their music projects. Students will expand their knowledge of audio design by collaborating with students in different pathways to create video games, websites, music videos, dance recitals, and short films. This course meets the UC "g" requirement.

FISCAL IMPACT: No fiscal impact. The cost of instructional materials will be addressed during the forthcoming textbook adoption process.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education authorize the Superintendent or designee to approve the courses presented.

INCOME AGREEMENT 46399: ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, ORANGE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND ORANGE COUNTY QUALITYSTART OC

DESCRIPTION:

The OUSD State and Parent Paid Preschool Program participate in the QualityStart OC Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS) developed by the Orange County Department of Education. The purpose of the QRIS is to design and implement a comprehensive quality rating system, and to support defined elements of quality improvement in early childhood educational programs in Orange County. The income agreement will consist of:

- Providing technical support to preschool staff on CLASS (Classroom Assessment and Scoring System) in order to help them understand the tool on a deeper level and increase scores
- Providing technical support to preschool teachers on the Early Childhood Environmental Rating Scale (ECERS) to enhance their classroom environments
- Providing professional development on CLASS, Differentiating for 3 Year Old's, Team Building, ECERS, Inclusion, and Creating Literacy Rich Environments

FISCAL IMPACT: Not to exceed \$10,900

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education authorize the

District to enter into the Income Agreement between Orange County Department of Education, Orange County QualtiyStart OC and the District for the 2018-19 school year.
