CSEA desires to alter or amend the following articles as indicated and presents our proposals for public discussion in accordance with Government Code §3547:

ARTICLE 9-HOLIDAY

Modify to add one (1) additional holiday.

ARTICLE 10-TRANSFERS AND PROMOTIONS

Modify to include reasonable notice prior to administrative transfers.

ARTICLE 12-COMPENSATION

Modify to adjust the longevity increments for the salary schedule.

Modify to include a fair and equitable salary schedule increase.

Modify to include fair and equitable medical benefits.

DESCRIPTION:

In order to finance the construction and installation of the Fred Kelly Stadium at El Modena High School (the "Project"), the District proposes to cause the Orange Unified School District Certificates of Participation (2018 Financing) (the "Certificates") to be executed and delivered. The proceeds of the Certificates will be used to (i) finance the Project, (ii) fund a reserve fund or finance the purchase of a reserve fund surety, and (iii) pay the costs incurred in connection with the execution and delivery of the Certificates, including the purchase of municipal bond insurance if economical or advantageous to the District.

The proposed transaction is structured as a lease between the District and the Orange Schools Financing Corporation (the "Corporation"). The District expects to lease certain land and improvements, consisting of a portion of the El Rancho Charter Middle School campus, including the gymnasium and science lab building, the physical education building and approximately half of the parking at such campus (the "Property"), to the Corporation pursuant to the Ground Lease, and to sublease the facilities back for continued use by the District, pursuant to the Lease Agreement. The Corporation will assign its rights in the Ground Lease and the Lease Agreement to U.S. Bank National Association, as Trustee, pursuant to an Assignment Agreement. The obligation to pay rent each year under the Lease Agreement will by evidenced by the Certificates, and the Certificates will be sold to investors.

If upon the review of title reports and other matters relating to the Property is shown to have an encumbrance or attribute that would affect the marketing of the Certificates or any attribute that would otherwise cause it to fail any applicable rating agency, bond insurer or reserve surety provider criteria for leased assets, additional or alternative portions of the El Rancho

Charter Middle School campus may be included in the Property to be leased under the Ground Lease and the Lease Agreement if such site or sites, or combination thereof, would aggregate a sufficient total value or alleviate any issue with such an encumbrance or attribute.

The proposed Resolution approves a not to exceed amount of \$11 million in aggregate principal for the Certificates. Resolution also approves the draft forms of legal documents necessary for this transaction including:

- 1. Ground Lease (from District to Corporation);
- 2. Lease Agreement (from Corporation to District);
- 3. Trust Agreement (governing the execution and delivery and terms of repayment of the Certificates);
- 4. Certificate Purchase Agreement (committing the District and Underwriter to final terms of sale of the Certificates);
- 5. Continuing Disclosure Certificate (committing the District to annually update financial disclosures); and
- 6. Preliminary Official Statement (describing the Certificates to investors).

All legal documents are available at the Orange Unified School District's Business Services Office located at 1401 North Handy Street, Orange, California 92867 during normal business hours.

The District has engaged Fieldman, Rolapp & Associates, Inc. to perform financial advisory services in connection with the delivery of the Certificates. The Certificates are to be purchased by RBC Capital Markets, LLC, selected by the District. The District will be represented by Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP as special counsel. The District and the Corporation will also be represented by Parker and Covert LLP, as general counsel to the District and Corporation.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The District has made improvements to the Property for the benefit and use of the El Rancho Charter Middle School, and the El Rancho Charter Middle School has agreed to pay the District for use of such improvements. Under the Lease Agreement, the District is obligated to pay the base rental payments from any source of legally available funds of the District. To meet such obligations, the District intends, as part of its internal payment plan, to apply the payments received from the El Rancho Charter Middle School toward the base rental payments evidenced by the Certificates as such payments become due.

RECOMMENDATION:

WHEREAS, the Orange Unified School District (the "District") desires to finance the construction and installation of the Fred Kelly Stadium at El Modena High School (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, in order to finance the Project, the District will lease certain real property owned by the District and the improvements thereto, consisting of a portion of the El Rancho Charter Middle School campus, including the gymnasium and science lab building, the physical education building and approximately half of the parking at such campus (the "Property"), to the Orange Schools Financing Corporation (the "Corporation") pursuant to a Ground Lease (such Ground Lease, in the form presented to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as are made pursuant to this Resolution, being referred to herein as the "Ground Lease"); and

WHEREAS, the District will sublease the Property back from the Corporation pursuant to a Lease Agreement (such Lease Agreement, in the form presented to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as are made pursuant to this Resolution, being referred to herein as the "Lease Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the District and the Corporation have determined that it would be in the best interests of the District and the Corporation to provide a portion of the funds necessary to finance the Project through the execution and delivery, pursuant to a Trust Agreement, by and among U.S. Bank National Association, as Trustee (the "Trustee"), the Corporation and the District, of the Orange Unified School District Certificates of Participation (2018 Financing) (the "Certificates"), evidencing direct, fractional undivided interests in the base rental payments to be made by the District under the Lease Agreement (such Trust Agreement, in the form presented to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as are made pursuant to this Resolution, being referred to herein as the "Trust Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the District has made improvements to the Property for the benefit and use of the El Rancho Charter Middle School (the "Charter School"), and the Charter School has agreed to pay the District for use of such improvements; and

WHEREAS, under the Lease Agreement, the District is obligated to pay the base rental payments from any source of legally available funds of the District; to meet such obligations, the District intends, as part of its internal payment plan, to apply the payments received from the Charter School toward the base rental payments evidenced by the Certificates as such payments become due; and

WHEREAS, RBC Capital Markets, LLC, as underwriter (the "Underwriter"), has submitted to the District a proposal to purchase the Certificates in the form of a Certificate Purchase Agreement (such Certificate Purchase Agreement, in the form presented to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as are made pursuant to this Resolution, being referred to herein as the "Certificate Purchase Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the District (the "Board of Education") has determined that it would be in the best interest of the District to secure the timely payment of the principal and interest evidenced by the Certificates by obtaining an insurance policy with respect thereto and that obtaining a reserve surety for the Certificates in lieu of providing a cash funded reserve therefor could be economically advantageous to the District; and

WHEREAS, Rule 15c2-12 promulgated under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 ("Rule 15c2-12") requires that, in order to be able to purchase or sell the Certificates, the underwriter thereof must have reasonably determined that the District has undertaken in a written agreement or contract for the benefit of the holders of the Certificates to provide disclosure of certain financial information and certain enumerated events on an ongoing basis; and

WHEREAS, in order to cause such requirement to be satisfied, the District desires to enter into a Continuing Disclosure Certificate (such Continuing Disclosure Certificate, in the form presented to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as are made pursuant to this Resolution, being referred to herein as the "Continuing Disclosure Certificate"); and

WHEREAS, a form of the Preliminary Official Statement (the "Preliminary Official Statement") to be distributed in connection with the public offering of the Certificates has been prepared; and

WHEREAS, there have been prepared and submitted to this meeting forms of:

- (a) the Ground Lease;
- (b) the Lease Agreement;
- (c) the Trust Agreement;
- (d) the Certificate Purchase Agreement;
- (e) the Continuing Disclosure Certificate; and
- (f) the Preliminary Official Statement; and

WHEREAS, Section 42133(a) of the California Education Code (the "Education Code") provides that a school district that has a qualified or negative certification in any fiscal year may not issue, in that fiscal year or in the next succeeding fiscal year, certificates of participation, unless the county superintendent of schools determines, pursuant to criteria established by the Superintendent of Public Instruction of the State of California, that the repayment of that indebtedness by the school district is probable; and

WHEREAS, in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017, and in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018, the District did not file and does not expect to file a qualified or negative certification and the Orange County Superintendent of Schools (the "County Superintendent") did not and is not expected to classify the District's certifications for either such fiscal year to be qualified or negative; and

WHEREAS, Section 17150.1(a) of the Education Code provides (i) that no later than 30 days before the approval by the governing board of a school district to proceed with the issuance of certificates of participation, the school district shall notify the county superintendent of schools and the county auditor, and (ii) that the superintendent of the school district shall provide information necessary to assess the anticipated effect of the debt issuance, including the repayment schedules for that debt obligation, the evidence of the ability of the school district to repay that obligation, and the issuance costs, to the county auditor, the county superintendent of schools, the governing board and the public; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Education Code Section 17150.1(a), no later than 30 days before the date hereof, the Superintendent of the District, caused notice of the proposed execution and delivery of the Certificates to be provided to the County Superintendent and the Orange County Auditor-Controller (the "County Auditor-Controller"); and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Education Code Section 17150.1(a), the Superintendent of the District provided information necessary to assess the anticipated effect of the execution and delivery of the Certificates, including the repayment schedules for the base rental payments evidenced by the Certificates, evidence of the ability of the District to repay such base rental payments, and the delivery costs of the Certificates, to the County Auditor-Controller, the County Superintendent, the Board of Education and the public; and

WHEREAS, the District has previously adopted a local debt policy (the "Debt Management Policy") that complies with Section 8855(i) of the California Government Code (the "Government Code"), and the execution and delivery of the Certificates as contemplated by this Resolution is in compliance with the Debt Management Policy; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has obtained from the Underwriter and Fieldman, Rolapp & Associates, Inc., as the District's financial advisor (the "Financial Advisor") good faith estimates of (a) the true interest cost of the Certificates, (b) the sum of all fees and charges paid to third parties with respect to the Certificates, (c) the amount of proceeds of the Certificates expected to be received net of the fees and charges paid to third parties and any reserves or capitalized interest paid or funded with proceeds of the Certificates, and (d) the sum total of all payments evidenced by the Certificates calculated to the final maturity of the Certificates plus

the fees and charges paid to third parties not paid with the proceeds of the Certificates, and such estimates are disclosed and set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to proceed to deliver the Certificates and to authorize the execution of such documents and the performance of such acts as may be necessary or desirable to effect the offering, sale and delivery of the Certificates; and

WHEREAS, all acts, conditions and things required by the laws of the State of California to exist, to have happened and to have been performed precedent to and in connection with the consummation of the actions authorized hereby do exist, have happened and have been performed in regular and due time, form and manner as required by law, and the District is now duly authorized and empowered, pursuant to each and every requirement of law, to consummate such actions for the purpose, in the manner and upon the terms herein provided;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Education of the Orange Unified School District, as follows:

Section 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct, and the Board of Education so finds and determines.

Section 2. The form of the Ground Lease, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, be and the same is hereby approved. Each of the President of the Board of Education, the Clerk of the Board of Education, and such other member of the Board of Education as the President may designate, the Superintendent of the District, the Assistant Superintendent, Facilities and Planning of the District, the Assistant Superintendent, Business Services/CBO of the District, the Administrative Director, Business Services of the District, and such other officer or employee of the District as the Superintendent may designate (the "Authorized Officers") is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to execute and deliver the Ground Lease in the form submitted to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as the Authorized Officer executing the same may require or approve, such requirement or approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Ground Lease by such Authorized Officer.

Section 3. The form of the Lease Agreement, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, be and the same is hereby approved. Each of the Authorized Officers is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to execute and deliver the Lease Agreement in the form submitted to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as the Authorized Officer executing the same may require or approve, such requirement or approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Lease Agreement by such Authorized Officer; provided, however, that the aggregate amount of the principal components of the base rental payments payable under the Lease Agreement shall not exceed \$11,000,000, the term of the Lease Agreement shall not exceed 25 years (provided that such term may be extended as provided therein) and the true interest cost applicable to the interest components of the base rental payments evidenced by the Certificates shall not exceed 5.00% per annum.

Section 4. The form of the Trust Agreement, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, be and the same is hereby approved. Each of the Authorized Officers is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to execute and deliver the Trust Agreement in the form submitted to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as the Authorized Officer executing the same may require or approve, such requirement or approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Trust Agreement by such Authorized Officer.

Section 5. The execution and delivery of the Certificates evidencing principal in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$11,000,000, payable in the years and in the amounts, and evidencing interest as specified in the Trust Agreement as finally executed, are hereby authorized and approved.

Section 6. The form of the Certificate Purchase Agreement, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, be and the same is hereby approved. Each of the Authorized Officers is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to execute and deliver the Certificate Purchase Agreement in the form submitted to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as the Authorized Officer executing the same may require or approve, such requirement or approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Certificate Purchase Agreement by such Authorized Officer; provided, however, that the underwriter's discount for the sale of the Certificates shall not exceed 1.00% of the aggregate amount of principal evidenced by such Certificates.

Section 7. The form of the Continuing Disclosure Certificate, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, be and the same is hereby approved. Each of the Authorized Officers is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to execute and deliver the Continuing Disclosure Certificate in the form submitted to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as the Authorized Officer executing the same may require or approve, such requirement or approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Continuing Disclosure Certificate by such Authorized Officer.

Section 8. The Preliminary Official Statement, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, with such changes, insertions and omissions therein as may be approved by an Authorized Officer, be and the same is hereby approved, and the use of the Preliminary Official Statement in connection with the offering and sale of the Certificates is hereby authorized and approved. Each of the Authorized Officers is hereby authorized to certify on behalf of the District that the Preliminary Official Statement is deemed final as of its date, within the meaning of Rule 15c2-12 (except for the omission of certain final pricing, rating and related information as permitted by Rule 15c2-12).

Section 9. The preparation and delivery of a final Official Statement (the "Official Statement"), and its use in connection with the offering and sale of the Certificates, is hereby authorized and approved. The Official Statement shall be in substantially the form of the Preliminary Official Statement, with such changes, insertions and omissions as may be approved

by an Authorized Officer, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof. Each of the Authorized Officers is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name of and on behalf of the Authority, to execute the final Official Statement and any amendment or supplement thereto.

Section 10. The Authorized Officers are each hereby authorized and directed (i) to apply for municipal bond insurance for the Certificates and to obtain such insurance if the present value cost of such insurance is less than the present value of the estimated savings with respect to interest evidenced by the Certificates resulting from the purchase of such insurance and/or (ii) to apply for and obtain a reserve surety or insurance policy to satisfy the reserve requirement with respect to the Certificates if economically advantageous to the District. The Authorized Officers are each hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to execute and deliver a contract for such insurance and/or for such reserve surety or policy if such contract is deemed by the Authorized Officer executing the same to be in the best interests of the District, such determination to be conclusively evidenced by such Authorized Officer's execution and delivery of such contract.

Section 11. With the passage of this Resolution, the Board of Education hereby certifies that the Debt Management Policy complies with Government Code Section 8855(i), and that the Certificates authorized to be executed and delivered pursuant to this Resolution are consistent with such policy, and instructs Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP as Special Counsel, on behalf of the District, with respect to the Certificates executed and delivered pursuant to this Resolution, (a) to cause notices of the proposed sale and final sale of the Certificates to be filed in a timely manner with the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission pursuant to Government Code Section 8855, and (b) to check, on behalf of the District, the "Yes" box relating to such certifications in the notice of proposed sale filed pursuant to Government Code Section 8855.

Section 12. If upon the review of title reports and other matters relating to the Property, the Property is shown to have an encumbrance or attribute that would affect the marketing of the Certificates or any attribute that would otherwise cause it to fail any applicable rating agency, bond insurer or reserve surety provider criteria for leased assets, the Authorized Officers are each hereby authorized and directed to approve the inclusion of additional or alternative portions of the El Rancho Charter Middle School campus in the Property to be leased under the Ground Lease and the Lease Agreement, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution of the Ground Lease and the Lease Agreement by such Authorized Officer.

Section 13. The officers of the District are, and each of them is, hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name of the District, to do any and all things and to execute and deliver any and all documents and certificates which they or any of them deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Resolution and otherwise to carry out, give effect to and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution, including, without limitation, obtaining title insurance with respect to the Property and entering into an agreement to indemnify and hold the title insurance company harmless with respect to encumbrances recorded against the Property between the last title continuation as set forth in such agreement and the recording of the documents (or notice thereof) herein approved.

Section 14. All actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the District with respect to the Certificates, or in connection with or related to any of the agreements or documents referred to herein, are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified.

Section 15. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

EXHIBIT A

GOOD FAITH ESTIMATES

The good faith estimates set forth herein are provided with respect to the Certificates. Such good faith estimates have been provided to the District by RBC Capital Markets, LLC, the underwriter of the Certificates (the "Underwriter") and Fieldman, Rolapp & Associates, Inc., the District's financial advisor (the "Financial Advisor").

Principal Amount. The Underwriter and the Financial Advisor have informed the District that, based on the District's financing plan and current market conditions, their good faith estimate of the aggregate principal amount of the Certificates to be sold is \$9,090,000 (the "Estimated Principal Amount").

True Interest Cost of the Certificates. The Underwriter and the Financial Advisor have informed the District that, assuming that the Estimated Principal Amount of the Certificates is sold, and based on market interest rates prevailing at the time of preparation of such estimate, their good faith estimate of the true interest cost of the Certificates, which means the rate necessary to discount the amounts payable on the respective principal and interest payment dates to the purchase price received for the Certificates, is 3.860%.

Finance Charge of the Certificates. The Underwriter and the Financial Advisor have informed the District that, assuming that the Estimated Principal Amount of the Certificates is sold, and based on market interest rates prevailing at the time of preparation of such estimate, their good faith estimate of the finance charge for the Certificates, which means the sum of all fees and charges paid to third parties (or costs associated with the Certificates), is \$291,209.47.

Amount of Proceeds to be Received. The Underwriter and the Financial Advisor have informed the District that, assuming that the Estimated Principal Amount of the Certificates is sold, and based on market interest rates prevailing at the time of preparation of such estimate, their good faith estimate of the amount of proceeds expected to be received by the District for sale of the Certificates, less the finance charge of the Certificates, as estimated above, and any reserves or capitalized interest paid or funded with proceeds of the Certificates, is \$10,000,000.

Total Payment Amount. The Underwriter and the Financial Advisor have informed the District that, assuming that the Estimated Principal Amount of the Certificates is sold, and based on market interest rates prevailing at the time of preparation of such estimate, their good faith estimate of the total payment amount, which means the sum total of all payments the District will make to pay the Certificates, plus the finance charge for the Certificates, as described above, not paid with the proceeds of the Certificates, calculated to the final maturity of the Certificates, is \$16,190,788,89.

REPORT ON THE STATUS OF THE OTHER POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFIT (OPEB) BOND INVESTMENT PORTFOLIO

DESCRIPTION:

The Board of Education approved the issuance and sale of Taxable Retirement Health Benefits Funding Bonds (OPEB bonds) on April 17, 2008. The amount of bonds sold totaled \$94,765,000 and was comprised of:

\$93,763,635 Actuarially Determined Liability \$ 1,001,365 Cost of Issuance \$94,765,000

Additionally, the District had previously deposited \$2,000,000 in the Futuris Public Entity Investment Trust (Trust) bringing the total funds available for investment to \$95,763,635.

The OPEB bonds were marketed as taxable instruments to allow the District to realize positive arbitrage from the investment revenue and appreciation in excess of the interest payments on the bonds. The net income is to be used for retiree health benefit obligations. The fixed income investments are performing as anticipated, and the equity investments have recently performed better than the anticipated portfolio pro forma. While the value of the portfolio was in step with the overall stock market up until December 2017, modifications were made to the Portfolio mix at the December 2017 meeting, locking in the gains in the stock market and minimizing the losses incurred in 2018.

This report will provide the Board of Education and public with an update as to the allocation and performance of the investment portfolio. The District is making retiree health and benefit payments from Fund 71 and bond service payments from the General Fund.

The District is continuing to make retiree health benefits payments on a pay-as-you-go basis from the Fund 71.

TOPIC:

MEASURE S CAPITAL FACILITIES PROGRAM – OWNER CONTROLLED INSURANCE PROGRAM

DESCRIPTION:

Program (OCIP) is An Owner Controlled Insurance an insurance policy held by a school district during the construction or renovation of a school site, which is designed to cover virtually all liability and loss arising from the construction project. The traditional method for insuring construction projects consists of each general contractor and subcontractor obtaining their own insurance policies. Under an OCIP, all construction related insurance is purchased by the district as part of a single policy from a single insurer. A district benefits from an OCIP in that all insurance costs are collected into a single policy premium. The value of the program is in the streamlining of insurance administration. In the unfortunate event that a loss should occur, the OCIP provider is singularly responsible for coverage of the loss.

The concept of implementing an OCIP for Measure S is being considered as a cost effective and efficient method of providing insurance coverage for the Measure S Capital Facilities Program.

Per Board request, information regarding an OCIP will be presented.

STATE OF CALIFORNIA, DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL SERVICES, CMAS CONTRACT NO. 4-18-51-0061A AND NO. 4-18-51-0061C Effective October 12, 1994, the State of California approved the use of California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) by local governments (i.e., city, county, district, or other local governmental body empowered to expend public funds) for a wide variety of commodities, inclusive of equipment, supplies, materials, and services. Using a CMAS contract awarded by the California Department of General Services (DGS) is a cost-effective manner of procurement for products and services that is available to school districts. Public Contract Code sections 20118, 10298, and 10299 permit school districts to utilize competitively bid contracts, inclusive of master agreements such as CMAS contracts.

On March 22, 2018, the Board approved CMAS Master Contract No. 4-18-51-0061B, awarded to ACCO Engineered Systems, Inc., for the purchase of electrical switchgear equipment for the Orange High School Science Center project. However, the State of California, Department of General Services, awarded two other CMAS contracts to ACCO Engineered Systems, Inc., which will be beneficial for the District: California Multiple Award Schedule (CMAS) Master Contract No. 4-18-51-0061A, effective January 12, 2018 through April 2, 2021, and California Multiple Award Schedule (CMAS) Master Contract No. 4-18-51-0061C, effective March 19, 2018 through March 19, 2022. The latter two contracts will allow for the purchase and warranty of upgraded equipment necessary to increase the main switchgear's system. These contracts are based on some or all of the products and/or services and prices from a GSA schedule.

Staff has determined that it is in the best interest of the District to utilize the two additional CMAS contracts for the purchase of upgraded switchgear equipment for the Measure S Program project at Orange High School from ACCO Engineered Systems, Inc.

There is an immediate need to purchase various power distribution switchgear equipment to facilitate infrastructure upgrades for the Measure S Program at Orange High School. This is an administrative approval with no financial impact; the cost of the switchgear was approved on March 22, 2018.

Each of the Licensees currently has a license agreement with the District for a one-year term with the exception of Drotter LLC., which is a month-to-month License Agreement with the District. This item, if approved, would extend the License Agreements with: Arena Soccer; Olive Crest Academy; Trombly Chiefs Baseball Club formerly known as Fullerton Chiefs Baseball Club; and Tennis Specialists, on the same terms and conditions. The License Agreement with Drotter LLC would continue on a month-to-month basis. Either party for each License Agreement can terminate the License Agreement at will.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Revenue of \$329,508/Annually

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve renewal of the License Agreements with Arena Soccer Club, Drotter LLC, Olive Crest Academy, Trombly Chiefs Baseball Club formerly known as Fullerton Chiefs Baseball Club, and The Tennis Specialists.

TOPIC:

RESOLUTION 31-17-18 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FINDING THE PROPOSED DISTRICT EDUCATION CENTER PORTABLE MODULAR BUILDING PROJECT EXEMPT FROM THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT, APPROVING THE FILING AND RECORDATION OF A NOTICE OF EXEMPTION, AND APPROVING THE PROJECT

DESCRIPTION:

In the spring of 2018, Chapman University donated a 36' x 60' (2,160 sq. ft.) portable modular building science building to the District and pledged to contribute \$50,000 toward the relocation of the building from their campus to a District site. Included in the donation is classroom service equipment and furnishings. This is a manufactured commercial modular building constructed in compliance with the California Department of Housing and Community Development regulations. The best use for the building is to place it at the District Education Center and use it as an administrative/training/ meeting room. The furnishings and science equipment will go to school sites.

Projects undertaken by public agencies are subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as outlined in Public Resources Code (PRC) Section 21000 et seq. and the State CEQA Guidelines (title 14. California Code Regulations, Section 15000 et seq.). PRC section 21065 defines a project as follows:

"Project" means an activity which may cause either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment...

The proposed District Education Center Portable Modular Building Project is a "Project" under CEQA. Staff has evaluated the Project in whole and has determined that the proposed improvements are categorically exempt from further environmental review under the provisions of Title 14. California Code Regulations, Sections 15301 and 15303.

Class 1 Exemption (§15301) – Existing Facilities (minor alterations to existing facilities involving negligible or no expansion beyond current use, including additions to existing structures of up to 2,500 square feet).

Class 3 Exemption (§15303) – New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures (installation of small structures not exceeding 2,500 square feet in area).

Staff has determined that the Project is not subject to any exceptions to the categorical exemption (CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2). Therefore, the District may file a Notice of Exemption (NOE) for the Project, which exempts the Project from further environmental review and the provisions of CEQA.

OUSD/Lebs Board Agenda May 10, 2018 Adoption of Resolution 31-17-18 provides the required acknowledgements and findings with respect to the Portable Modular Building Project to enable the District to:

- 1. Find the Proposed District Education Center Portable Modular Building Project Exempt from CEQA
- 2. Approve the Filing and Recordation of a NOE
- 3. Approve the Project
- 4. Authorize staff to file the NOE for the Project with the appropriate public agencies

Upon approval, the Notice of Exemption will be filed with the County Clerk and the State Office of Planning and Research (OPR). The filing of a Notice of Exemption with the County Clerk starts a 35-day statute of limitations period on legal challenges to the agency's decision that the project is exempt from CEQA.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact as a result of adopting Resolution 31-17-18.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution 31-17-18: (1) Finding the Project Exempt from CEQA; (2) Approving the Filing and Recordation of a NOE, (3) Approving the Project, and (4) Authorizing staff to file the NOE for the Project.

RESOLUTION NO. 31-17-08

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FINDING THE PROPOSED DISTRCIT EDUCATION CENTER MODULAR BUILDING PROJECT EXEMPT FROM THE CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT, APPROVING THE FILING AND RECORDATION OF A NOTICE OF EXEMPTION, AND APPROVING THE PROJECT

- **WHEREAS**, the Orange Unified School District ("District") owns and operates the District Education Center Administrative Offices at 1401 Handy Street, Orange, California 92867; and
- **WHEREAS**, the District proposes to install a modular building at the District Education Center ("Project"),
- WHERAS, the Project involves installation of a 36' x 60' (2,160 sq. ft.) modular building and appurtenances at the District Education Center, an increase of less than 7% (2,160 \div 33,429). The building will be used for administrative/training/meeting room purposes and will not be used as school building as defined in Education Code Sections 17283 and 81130.5 by pupils or teachers, for school purposes.
- **WHEREAS**, prior to commencement of the Project, the District must comply with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"); and
- WHEREAS, categorical exemptions to CEQA are set forth in Article 19 of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations ("CEQA Guidelines"); and
- WHEREAS, the Project is categorically exempt under CEQA Guidelines Section 15300 et seq.; and
- **WHEREAS**, The Project qualifies for Class 1 and Class 3 Categorical CEQA exemptions:
- Class 1 Exemption (§15301) Existing Facilities (minor alterations to existing facilities involving negligible or no expansion beyond current use, including additions to existing structures of up to 2,500 square feet)
- Class 3 Exemption (§15303) New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures (installation of small structures not exceeding 2,500 square feet in area); and
- WHEREAS, the Project would meet the criteria set by CEQA Guidelines Sections 15301 and 15303, as the Project would result in an increase in one building less than 2,500 square feet; and
- WHEREAS, the District has determined that the Project is not subject to any of the exceptions to categorical exemptions set forth in CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2; and
- WHEREAS, the Site is not in a sensitive environment of hazardous or critical concern; and

- WHEREAS, the Project's environmental effects when combined with the environmental effects of known successive projects of the same type in the same place at the Site, and the environmental effects caused by other District projects including at Villa Park, Canyon, and Orange high schools, over time are not environmentally significant and cumulatively considerable; and
- **WHEREAS**, the District is unaware of any unusual circumstances that would result in a reasonable possibility that the Project will have a significant effect on the environment; and
- WHEREAS, the Project will not damage scenic resources within a highway officially designated as a state scenic highway; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Project will not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource.
- **NOW, THEREFORE,** the Board of Education of the Orange Unified School District hereby finds, determines, declares and resolves as follows:
- **Section 1.** That all of the recitals set forth above are true and correct, and the Board so finds and determines.
- <u>Section 2</u>. That the District has considered whether the Project may have a significant effect on the environment.
- <u>Section 3.</u> That the District has concluded, after reviewing the Project through its own independent review and analysis, that the Project will not have a significant effect on the environment.
- **Section 4.** That the District adopts the analysis and conclusions in the Notice of Exemption (NOE) as its findings and incorporates the NOE by reference as fully set forth herein.
- <u>Section 5.</u> That the Project is subject to CEQA Guidelines Sections 15301 and 15303 and is not subject to any exception to exemptions found in CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2 and is therefore exempt from CEQA.
 - **Section 6.** That the District approves the Project.
- <u>Section 7.</u> That the District's Superintendent, or the Superintendent's designee, is instructed to file and/or record a Notice of Exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act, consistent with this Resolution, attached hereto as Exhibit "A," with any and all appropriate public agencies or entities, subject only to minor, non-substantive revisions, if necessary.
 - **Section 8.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

PLAN FOR PROVIDING EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO ALL **EXPELLED STUDENTS IN** ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT 2018-2021

General Provisions

As required by Education Code 48926, the Orange County Superintendent of Schools has developed an expulsion plan in conjunction with the Superintendents of the school districts in Orange County. The plan provides for educational services to all expelled students in the county for school years 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2020-21. A student whose behavior has resulted in an expulsion is provided a rehabilitation plan which ensures placement in an educational program and establishes the criteria for return to the Orange Unified School District. All educational alternatives provided by Orange County school districts are not available to all expelled students. The type of offense, location of offense, grade level and nature of the student's individualized needs; all have the potential to affect the educational alternatives available to the student during the period of expulsion. Students expelled for any of the offenses listed in subdivision (a) or (c) of Section 48915 of the California Education Code shall not be permitted to enroll in any district-operated program during the period of expulsion unless it is a community day school (E.C. 48915.2).

As indicated in the Orange County Expulsion plan, the options available to Orange Unified School District after an expulsion decision include, but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Expulsion, suspended order, with placement on the same school campus [E.C. 48917 (a)].
- 2. Expulsion, suspended order, with placement on a different school campus within the district [E.C.48917 (a)].
- 3. Expulsion with referral to a district alternative suspension/expulsion classroom, if available (E.C. 48660).
- 4. Expulsion with subsequent transfer to another district.
- 5. Expulsion with referral to the Orange County Department of Education, Alternative, Community and Correctional Education Schools and Services (ACCESS) (E.C. 1981).

Actual referral to a district alternative suspension/expulsion classroom or county community school is made by the Orange Unified School District governing board with recommendations from the office of Student and Community Services, district discipline review board, School Attendance Review Board (SARB), or by another established district referral process as required by statute.

TOPIC: RESOLUTION NO. 32-17-18: SIGNATURE AUTHORIZATION

DESCRIPTION: Authorization of signatures is an item which is routinely updated to reflect changes in personnel and to comply with the

requirements of the California Education Code.

As the agency which ultimately releases District payrolls and warrants, the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) must maintain on file the approved signature authorizations for all school districts. The signatures are applicable to various documents which are approved by the Board of Education and in compliance with the Education Code and other pertinent state and federal laws. The administrative/leadership employees for whom the signature authorizations are designated do not transfer that authority to any staff members.

Purchase orders are processed within the limitations of existing site/program budgets, with the P.O. listing submitted to the Board at each meeting. Non-routine expenditures for consultants, contracts, major facility additions, etc. are submitted to the Board separately for authorization. Before the preparation of a warrant, it is determined that the proper authorization and approvals exist. Warrants prepared by the District are forwarded to the OCDE for review of documentation, signature, and entry to OUSD's county ledgers before they are returned to the District for release to vendors, consultants, or contractors. Purchase orders, bid documents, warrants, payroll, federal/state/county documents, etc. are audited by the District's independent audit firm.
