



Philosophy-Goals-Objectives and Comprehensive PlansCharter Schools

~~A district with ten or fewer schools may petition the Superintendent of Public Instruction and the State Board of Education to become a charter district pursuant to E.C. 47606.~~

The Board of Education accepts responsibility for protecting the interests of the public when granting or denying charter petitions. The Board desires to support innovations which improve student learning and views charter schools as an opportunity to implement school-level reform. The District administration shall work cooperatively with parents/guardians, students, teachers and principals in their efforts to design new schools and alternatives to the existing state laws and regulations that govern public schools.

By law, petitioners are responsible for developing the charter that will govern the charter school. Unlike other alternative education programs which are under the direct control of the District, charter schools shall be governed at the school in accordance with charter provisions approved by the Board. In granting charter petitions, the Board shall give preference to schools best able to provide comprehensive learning experiences for academically low-achieving students. (Education Code 47605)

The Board shall give appropriate consideration to charter school petitions in light of the effects on the District's children and the proposed school's ability to function effectively and meet its goals. In accordance with law, the proposed charter must include descriptions of the vision, mission and goals of the charter school, the governance structure which will be used, the educational outcomes to be attained by students and the method by which progress in meeting these outcomes will be measured.

In order to be formally received by the Board, a petition for a charter school shall be in writing and is to include all components and signatures required by law and shall be submitted the Superintendent's office at least ten working days before a regularly scheduled Board meeting date for inclusion as an agenda item on the Board agenda. Any petition submitted less than ten work days before a regularly scheduled Board meeting date shall be scheduled for formal receipt by the Governing Board at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting. (Education Code 47605)

Within 30 days of formally receiving a petition to establish a charter school and accepting the petition as an agenda item at a Board meeting, the Board shall hold a public hearing to determine the level of support for the petition by teachers employed by the District, other employees of the District, and parents. (Education Code 47605)

Within 60 days of formally receiving a petition, or within 90 days with mutual consent of the petitioners and the Board of Education, the Board shall either approve or deny the request to establish the charter school. (Education Code 47605)

In its evaluation of the proposed charter, the Board shall include in its review the criteria set forth in the Education Code and the California Code of Regulations, Title 5, section 11967.5.1.

The Board shall ensure that any approved charter contains adequate processes and measures for holding the school accountable for fulfilling the terms of its charter. These shall include, but are not limited to, fiscal accountability systems, multiple measures for evaluating the educational program, including student outcomes aligned with state priorities as described in Education Code 52060, and regular reports to the Board.

The Board shall hold charter schools under its jurisdiction accountable for fulfilling the terms of their charters and may revoke a charter if deemed necessary.

The Board may approve one or more memoranda of understanding to clarify the financial and operational agreements between the District and a charter school authorized by the Board of Education.

It shall be the responsibility of the petitioners to provide written notice of the Board's approval and a copy of the charter to the County Superintendent of Schools, the CDE, and the State Board of Education (SBE). (Education Code 47605)

Community Relations

District-Sponsored Social Media

The Governing Board recognizes the value of technology such as social media platforms in promoting community involvement and collaboration. The purpose of any official district social media platform shall be to further the district's vision and mission, support student learning and staff professional development, and enhance communication with students, parents/guardians, staff, and community members.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop content guidelines and protocols for official district social media platforms to ensure the appropriate and responsible use of these resources and compliance with law, Board policy, and regulation.

Official district social media platforms shall be used only for their stated purposes and in a manner consistent with this policy and administrative regulation. By creating these official sites and allowing for public comment, the Board does not intend to create a limited public forum or otherwise guarantee an individual's right to free speech.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the limited purpose of the official district social media platforms is clearly communicated to users. Each site shall contain a statement that specifies the site's purposes along with a statement that users are expected to use the site only for those purposes. Each site shall also contain a statement that users are personally responsible for the content of their posts.

Official district social media platforms may not contain content that is obscene, libelous, or so incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on school premises, violation of school rules, or substantial disruption of the school's orderly operation.

Staff or students who post prohibited content shall be subject to discipline in accordance with district policies and administrative regulations.

Users of official district social media platforms should be aware of the public nature and accessibility of social media and that information posted may be considered a public record subject to disclosure under the Public Records Act. The Board expects users to conduct themselves in a respectful, courteous, and professional manner.

Privacy

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the privacy rights of students, parents/guardians, staff, Board members, and other individuals are protected on official district social media platforms.

Board policy pertaining to the posting of student photographs and the privacy of telephone numbers, home addresses, and email addresses, as specified in BP 1113 - District and School Web Sites, shall also apply to official district social media platforms.

Social media and networking sites and other online platforms shall not be used by district employees to transmit confidential information about students, employees, or district operations.

All Personnel

Codes of Ethics

The Board expects District employees to maintain the highest ethical standards, exhibit professional behavior, follow District policies and regulations, abide by state and federal laws, and exercise good judgment when interacting with students and other members of the school community. Employee conduct should enhance the integrity of the District, advance the goals of the District's educational programs, and contribute to a positive school climate.

The Board encourages District employees to accept as guiding principles the professional standards and codes of ethics adopted by educational or professional associations to which they may belong.

Each employee **is expected** ~~should make a commitment~~ to acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to fulfill his/her responsibilities and should focus on his/her contribution to the learning and achievement of District students.

Inappropriate employee conduct includes, but is not limited to:

1. Engaging in any conduct that endangers students, staff, or others, including, but not limited to, physical violence, threats of violence, or possession of a firearm or other weapon;
2. Engaging in harassing or discriminatory behavior towards students, parents/guardians, staff, or community members, or failing or refusing to intervene when an act of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying against a student is observed;
3. Physically abusing, sexually abusing, neglecting, or otherwise willfully harming or injuring a child;
4. Engaging in inappropriate socialization or fraternization with a student or soliciting, encouraging, or maintaining an inappropriate written, verbal, or physical relationship with a student;
5. Possessing or viewing any pornography on school grounds, or possessing or viewing child pornography or other imagery portraying children in a sexualized manner at any time;
6. Using profane, obscene, or abusive language against students, parents/guardians, staff, or community members;
7. Willfully disrupting District or school operations by loud or unreasonable noise or other action;

8. Using tobacco, alcohol, or an illegal or unauthorized substance, or possessing or distributing any controlled substance, while in the workplace, **on District property**, or at a school-sponsored activity;
9. **Being Dishonesty** with students, parents/guardians, staff, or members of the public, including, but not limited to, falsification of information in employment records or other school records;
10. Divulging confidential information about students, District employees, or District operations to persons not authorized to receive the information;
11. Using District equipment or other District resources for the employee's own commercial purposes or for political activities;
12. Using District equipment or communications devices for personal purposes while on duty, except in an emergency, during scheduled work breaks, or for personal necessity;

Employees shall be notified that computer files and all electronic communications, including, but not limited to, email and voice mail, are not private. To ensure proper use, the Superintendent or designee may monitor employee usage of District technological resources at any time without the employee's consent.

13. Causing damage to or engaging in theft of property belonging to students, staff, or the District;
14. Wearing inappropriate attire.

An employee who observes or has evidence of another employee's inappropriate conduct shall immediately report such conduct to the principal or Superintendent or designee. An employee who has knowledge of, or suspects child abuse or neglect, shall file a report pursuant to the District's child abuse reporting procedures as detailed in AR 5141.4 - Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting.

Any reports of employee misconduct shall be promptly investigated. Any employee who is found to have engaged in inappropriate conduct in violation of law or Board policy shall be subject to disciplinary action and, in the case of a certificated employee, may be subject to a report to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing. The Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate.

An employee who has knowledge of but fails to report inappropriate employee conduct may also be subject to discipline.

The District prohibits retaliation against anyone who files a complaint against an employee or reports an employee's inappropriate conduct. Any employee who retaliates against any such complainant, reporter, or other participant in the District's complaint process shall be subject to discipline.

The section(s) of the District's employee code of conduct addressing interactions with students shall be provided to parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year and shall be posted on school and/or District web sites. (Education Code 44050)

Certificated PersonnelTeacher/Administrator/Board Relationships

The Board recognizes the right of public school employees to join organizations of their own choice, to be represented by such organizations in their professional and employment relationships with the District, to select one employee organization as the exclusive representative of the employees in an appropriate unit, and to a voice in the formulation of educational policy. The Board also recognizes the following roles and responsibilities that are clearly established by law.

1. The Board has the final responsibility for establishing policies of the school system. (E.C. 35160)
2. The Superintendent and staff have the responsibility of carrying out the policies established. (E.C. 44805)
3. The certificated teaching personnel have the ultimate responsibility of providing the best possible education in the classroom.

Attainment of Goals

Attainment of the goals and objectives of the educational program conducted in the schools of the District requires mutual understanding and cooperation among the Board, the Superintendent and administrative staff, certificated personnel, classified personnel and other citizens of the community. To this end, free and open exchange of views is desirable, proper and necessary.

Employee Organizations

All employees are free to join or not to join employee organizations. Decisions affecting the individual employee shall be made without regard to membership in such organizations. Each employee is entitled to his or her individual legal and/or ethical rights and privileges. (Government Code 3543)

~~Employees shall not be interfered with, intimidated, restrained, coerced or discriminated against, either by the school District or by employee organizations, because of their membership or non-membership in employee organizations. They shall have the right to participate through representatives of their own choosing in the presentation of their views to the Board. (Government Code 3543.5)~~

The District shall not deter or discourage employees from becoming or remaining members of an employee organization, impose or threaten to impose reprisals on employees, discriminate or threaten to discriminate against employees, or otherwise interfere with, restrain, or coerce employees because of their membership or nonmembership in an employee organization. (Government Code 3543.5, 3550)

Employee organizations which meet the provisions of the law shall have the right to present their members in matters within the scope of representation provided by law and rulings of the Public Employment Relations Board. (Government Code 3542.1)

Upon written request of any employee, the District shall not disclose the employee's home address, home telephone number, personal cellular telephone number, personal email address, or birth date to an employee organization pursuant to regulations and decisions of the Public Employment Relations Board and the District shall remove the employee's home address, home telephone number, and personal cellular telephone number from any mailing list maintained by the District, except if the list is used exclusively by the District to contact the employee. (Government Code 6254.3)

Classified PersonnelClassified Personnel

The primary role of classified personnel is to support and enhance the purposes and goals of the schools as adopted by the Board. (cf. 0200 - Goals for the School District)

All personnel policies and regulations pertaining to classified personnel must be written in harmony with that primary role.

The classified service shall consist of all employees in positions not requiring certification. The following positions shall not be considered a part of the classified service: substitute or short-term employees who are employed for less than seventy-five percent (75%) of the school year, ~~campus and/or playground supervisors~~, adult education staff, full-time day students employed part-time, apprentices and professional experts employed on a temporary basis for a specific project.

StudentsAbsences and Excuses

The Board of Education believes that regular attendance plays an important role in student achievement. The Board shall work with parents/guardians and students to ensure their compliance with all state attendance laws, and may use appropriate legal means to correct problems of chronic absence or truancy.

Excused Absences

Absence from school shall be excused only for health reasons, family emergencies and justifiable personal reasons as permitted by law, Board policy and administration regulations. (Education Code 48205)

Students should not be absent from school without their parents/ guardians' knowledge or consent except in cases of medical emergency or **as authorized pursuant to Education Code 46010.1** confidential medical appointment.

The Board of Education believes that ~~excessive student absenteeism and tardiness, whether caused by excused or unexcused absences~~ **whatever the cause**, may be an early warning sign of poor academic achievement and may put students at risk of dropping out of school. The Board desires to ensure that all students attend school in accordance with the state's compulsory education law and take full advantage of educational opportunities provided by the District.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a system to accurately track student attendance in order to identify individual students who are chronic absentees and truants, as defined in law and administrative regulation, and to identify patterns of absence throughout the District. He/she shall provide the Board with data on school attendance, chronic absence, and truancy rates ~~for all District students~~ **districtwide**, for each school, and **disaggregated** for each numerically significant student subgroup as defined in Education Code 52052. Such data shall be ~~disaggregated and~~ used in the development of annual goals and specific actions for student attendance and engagement ~~and for inclusion to be included~~ in the District's local control and accountability plan and other applicable school and District plans.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies that focus on prevention of attendance problems, which may include, but are not limited to, efforts to provide a safe and positive school environment, relevant and engaging learning experiences, school activities that help develop students' feelings of connectedness with the school, school-based health services, and incentives and rewards to recognize students who achieve excellent attendance or demonstrate significant improvement in attendance. The Superintendent or designee also shall develop strategies that enable early outreach to students as soon as they show signs of poor attendance.

The Superintendent or designee shall ~~work~~ **consult** with students, parents/guardians, school staff, and community agencies, as appropriate, to identify factors contributing to chronic absence and truancy.

Interventions for students with serious attendance problems shall be designed to meet the specific needs of the student and may include, but are not limited to, health care referrals, transportation assistance, counseling for mental or emotional difficulties, academic supports, efforts to address school or community safety concerns, discussions with the student and parent/guardian about their attitudes regarding schooling, or other strategies to remove identified barriers to school attendance. The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with child welfare services, law enforcement, courts, public health care agencies, other government agencies, and/or medical, mental health, and oral health care providers to make alternative educational programs and support services available for students and families.

~~He/she also may collaborate with child welfare services, law enforcement, courts, public health care agencies, other government agencies, and/or medical, mental health, and oral health care providers to ensure that alternative educational programs and nutrition, health care, and other support services are available for students and families and to intervene as necessary when students have serious attendance problems.~~

Students who are identified as truants shall be subject to the interventions specified in law and administrative regulation.

A student's truancy, tardiness, or other absence from school shall not be the sole basis for his/her out-of-school suspension or expulsion. Alternative ~~disciplinary~~ strategies and positive reinforcement for attendance shall be used whenever possible.

The Superintendent or designee shall ~~regularly analyze data on student absence to identify patterns of absence Districtwide and by school, grade level, and~~ **periodically report to the Board regarding the district's progress in improving student attendance rates for all students and for each numerically significant student population.** Such data information shall be used to ~~identify common barriers to attendance, prioritize resources for intervention, and monitor progress over time.~~ **evaluate the effectiveness of strategies implemented to reduce chronic absence and truancy and to make changes as needed.** The Superintendent or designee shall ~~periodically report this information to the Board for purposes of evaluating the effectiveness of strategies implemented to reduce chronic absence and truancy and making changes as needed.~~

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee also shall ~~provide this information to key~~ **engage** school staff ~~and community agency partners to engage them in~~ program evaluation and improvement and in ~~identification~~ **determination** of how to best allocate available community resources.

District School Attendance Review Board

The Board of Education recognizes that poor school attendance and behavior problems negatively impact student achievement and put students at greater risk of dropping out of school. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive and integrated system for the early identification of attendance problems and shall implement strategies to encourage students' attendance. After other interventions have been exhausted, students with a pattern of unexcused absences may be referred to a school attendance review board (SARB), in accordance with applicable law, in order to receive intensive guidance and assistance.

The SARB shall maintain a continuing inventory of community resources, including alternative educational programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with the SARB and appropriate community agencies, including, but not limited to, law enforcement agencies, child welfare agencies, and health services, to provide school-based and/or community-based interventions tailored to the specific needs of the student.

The School Board shall appoint members to the district's SARB, who may include a parent/guardian as well as representatives of various agencies including, but not limited to, school districts; the county probation department; the county welfare department; the County Superintendent of Schools; law enforcement agencies; community-based youth service centers; school guidance personnel; child welfare and attendance personnel; school or county health care personnel; school, county, or community mental health personnel; the county district attorney's office; and the county public defender's office. (Education Code 48321)

The district's SARB shall provide support to improve student attendance and behavior through proactive efforts focused on building positive school environments and improved school connectedness, early identification and immediate intervention to re-engage students with poor attendance or behavior, and intensive intervention with students and families to address severe or persistent attendance or behavior issues.

The district's SARB shall operate in accordance with Education Code 48320-48325, the Brown Act (Government Code 54950-54963), and the bylaws of the SARB.

The SARB shall collect data and annually report outcomes on SARB referrals to the Governing Board, Superintendent or designee, and County Superintendent of Schools. (Education Code 48273)

A district with less than 50,000 ADA may limit the number of such transfers to three percent of its current estimated ADA and may limit the maximum number of such transfers for the duration of the program to 10 percent of the ADA for that period.~~

~~In addition, transfers out of the District may be limited during a fiscal year when the County Superintendent of Schools has given the District a negative budget certification or when the County Superintendent has determined that the District will not meet the state's standards and criteria for fiscal stability in the subsequent fiscal year exclusively as a result of student transfers from this District to a school district of choice. (Education Code 48307)~~

Transportation

The district shall not provide transportation beyond any school attendance area. Upon request of a student's parent/guardian, the Superintendent or designee may authorize transportation for an interdistrict transfer student to and from designated bus stops within the attendance area of the school that the student attends if space is available.

For students who wish to transfer into the District, the interdistrict attendance permit shall not exceed a term of one year and shall stipulate the terms and conditions under which interdistrict attendance shall be permitted or denied.

The Board of Education recognizes that school-sponsored trips ~~are an important component of a student's development and~~ supplement and enrich the classroom, learning experience, **lead to increased student achievement, and foster student engagement.** ~~School-sponsored trips may be conducted in connection with the district's course of study or school-related social, educational, cultural, athletic, school band, or other extracurricular or cocurricular activities.~~ **The Board encourages field trips to reinforce and increase learning opportunities and to enhance district programs.**

Field trips shall be conducted in connection with the district's course of study or school-related social, educational, cultural, athletic, school band, or other extracurricular or co-curricular activities. A field trip to a foreign country may be permitted to familiarize students with the language, history, geography, natural science, and other studies relative to the district's course of study. (Education Code 35330)

All trips involving out-of-state or over a 500-mile radius of Orange Unified School District and/or overnight travel shall require the prior approval of the Board. In the event a Board meeting is not timely, the Superintendent may approve/disapprove the trip and inform the Board. Other trips may be approved by the Superintendent or designee.

The principal shall establish a process for approving a staff member's request to conduct a school-sponsored trip. When planning trips, staff shall consider student safety, objectives of instruction, the most effective use of instructional time, the distance from school, District and student expense, and transportation and supervision requirements. Principals may exclude from the trip any student whose presence on the trip would pose a safety or disciplinary risk.

No field trip shall be authorized if any student would be excluded from participation because of a lack of sufficient funds. The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate with community groups to supply funds for students in need. (Education Code 35330)

The Board may approve the use of district funds for student expenses for in-state, out-of-state, or out-of-country field trips or excursions when permitted by law. In addition, expenses of instructors, chaperones, and other personnel participating in such trips, as well as incidental expenses for the use of district equipment during the trip, may be paid from district funds. StudentsTransitional Kindergarten

The Board of Education desires to offer a high-quality transitional kindergarten (TK) program for eligible children who do not yet meet the minimum age criterion for kindergarten. The TK program shall assist children in developing the academic, social, and emotional skills they need to succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

The District's transitional kindergarten shall be the first year of a two-year kindergarten program. (Education Code 48000)

The Board encourages ongoing collaboration among District preschool staff, other preschool providers, elementary teachers, administrators, and parents/guardians in program development, implementation, and evaluation **of the District's TK program.**

Eligibility

The District's transitional kindergarten program shall admit children whose fifth birthday ~~lies between:~~ **is from September 2 through December 2** (Education Code 48000)

- ~~September 2 and December 2 in the 2014-15 school year and each school year thereafter~~

Parents/guardians of eligible children shall be notified of the availability of ~~this~~ **the TK** program and the age, residency, **immunization** and any other enrollment requirements. Enrollment in the **TK** ~~transitional kindergarten~~ program shall be voluntary.

Upon request of a child's parents/guardians, the district may, on a case-by-case basis after the Superintendent or designee determines that it is in the child's best interest, admit into the district's TK program a child whose fifth birthday is on or before September 1 and who is therefore eligible for kindergarten.

Curriculum and Instruction

The District's **TK** ~~transitional kindergarten~~ program shall be based on a modified kindergarten curriculum that is age and developmentally appropriate. (Education Code 48000)

The program shall be aligned with the preschool learning foundations and preschool curriculum frameworks developed by the California Department of Education. It shall be designed to facilitate students' development in essential skills related to language and literacy, mathematics, physical development, health, visual and performing arts, science, history-social science, English language development, and social-emotional development.

The number of instructional minutes offered in transitional kindergarten shall be the same as that required for the District's kindergarten program.

Staffing

~~TK assignments are subject to assignment monitoring and reporting by the County Superintendent of Schools in accordance with Education Code 44258.9.~~

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers assigned to teach in TK classes possess a teaching credential or permit from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) that authorizes such instruction.

A credentialed teacher who is first assigned to a TK class after July 1, 2015, shall, by August 1, 2020, have at least 24 units in early childhood education and/or child development, comparable experience in a preschool setting, and/or a child development teacher permit issued by the CTC. (Education Code 48000)

The Superintendent or designee may provide professional development as needed to ensure that ~~transitional kindergarten~~ **TK** teachers are knowledgeable about ~~District~~ **the** standards and effective instructional methods for teaching young children.

Continuation to Kindergarten

Students who complete the ~~transitional kindergarten~~ **TK** program shall continue in kindergarten the following school year. Parents/guardians of such students shall not be required to submit a signed parental permission form for kindergarten attendance.

However, whenever children who would otherwise be age-eligible for kindergarten are enrolled in TK, the Superintendent or designee shall obtain a Kindergarten Continuance Form signed by the parent/guardian near the end of the TK year consenting to the child's enrollment in kindergarten the following year. A student shall not attend more than two years in a combination of transitional kindergarten and kindergarten. (Education Code 46300)

~~Program Evaluation~~ Assessment

The Superintendent or designee shall develop or identify appropriate **formal and/or informal** assessments of transitional kindergarten students' development and progress. He/she shall monitor and regularly report to the Board regarding program implementation and the progress of students in meeting related academic standards.

The Board of Education recognizes that children of military families face challenges to their academic success caused by the frequent moves or deployments of their parents/guardians in fulfillment of military service. The district shall provide such students with academic resources, services, and opportunities for extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to all district students.

The Superintendent or designee may waive district policies or rules when necessary to facilitate the enrollment, placement, advancement, eligibility for extracurricular activities, or on-time graduation of children of military families, in accordance with the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children as ratified in Education Code 49700-49704.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board and the public on the educational outcomes of children of military families. Such reports may include, but are not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention rates by grade levels, and graduation rates.

PUBLIC HEARING: RESOLUTION 22-17-18 APPROVING AN INCREASE IN STATUTORY SCHOOL FEES IMPOSED ON NEW RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSTRUCTION PURSUANT TO EDUCATION CODE SECTION 17620 AND GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 65995

DESCRIPTION:

Background

Government Code Section 65995 establishes a maximum statutory fee that may be charged against development projects within the school district and authorizes that amount to be biennially adjusted for inflation as set forth in the Statewide cost index for Class B construction as determined by the State Allocation Board (SAB) at its January meeting in even numbered years.

On January 24, 2018, the SAB acted to increase the Level I Developer Fees for both residential and commercial/industrial construction pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 and Government Code Section 65995. As amended on February 24, 2016, for unified school districts, the Level I fee for residential construction was increased from \$3.48 to \$3.79 per square foot of new residential construction. The Level I fee for commercial/industrial construction was increased from \$0.56 to \$0.61 per square foot of new commercial/industrial construction. These fees are split between the high school district and the elementary feeder districts in accordance with the approved Developer Fee Allocation Agreements.


Current Considerations

In order for a school district to assess the new Level I fees, it must prepare and adopt a school facilities fee justification study, commonly known as a Level I Developer Fee Justification Study or School Fee Justification Study. Both residential development and commercial/industrial development justification studies were prepared by Cooperative Strategies. Copies of each study are attached under separate cover. The required Notice of Public Hearing was published in the *Orange County Register* on February 2, and February 9, 2018. If approved by the Board of Education, the new Level I fees will go into effect sixty days after adoption.

Fiscal Implications

There is no direct fiscal impact to the District's general fund as a result of approving this item. Approval of this item allows the District to collect the maximum legal level of fees assessed against residential and commercial development. Fees are deposited in Fund 25 – Capital Facilities Fund (Developer Fees).



RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT TO INCREASE STATUTORY SCHOOL FEES IMPOSED ON NEW RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS PURSUANT TO EDUCATION CODE SECTION 17620

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("Board") of the Orange Unified School District ("School District") provides for the educational needs for K-12 students within portions of the cities of Anaheim, Garden Grove, Irvine, Orange, Santa Ana, Tustin, and Villa Park (collectively, "Cities") and a portion of the unincorporated County of Orange ("County"); and

WHEREAS, The State Allocation Board has taken action pursuant to Government Code Section 65995(b)(3), which authorizes school districts to increase statutory school fees to \$3.79 per square foot for assessable space of residential development and \$0.61 per square foot of chargeable covered and enclosed space for all categories of commercial/industrial development, as long as such statutory school fees are properly justified by the School District pursuant to law; and

WHEREAS, new residential and commercial/industrial development continues to generate additional students for the School District's schools and the School District is required to provide school facilities ("School Facilities") to accommodate those students; and

WHEREAS, overcrowded schools within the School District have an impact on the School District's ability to provide an adequate quality education and negatively impacts the educational opportunities for the School District's students; and

WHEREAS, the School District does not have sufficient funds available for the construction or reconstruction of the School Facilities, including acquisition of sites, construction of permanent School Facilities, and acquisition of interim School Facilities, to accommodate students from new residential and commercial/industrial development; and

WHEREAS, the Board of the School District has received and considered two studies entitled "Residential Development School Fee Justification Study for Orange Unified School District" and "Commercial/Industrial Development School Fee Justification Study for Orange Unified School District" ("Studies"), which Studies include information, documentation, and analysis of the School Facilities needs of the School District, including (a) the purpose of the Statutory School Fees, (b) the use to which the Statutory School Fees are to be put (c) the nexus (roughly proportional and reasonable relationship) between the residential and commercial/industrial development and (1) the use for Statutory School Fees, (2) the need for School Facilities, (3) the cost of School Facilities and the amount of Statutory School Fees from new residential and commercial/industrial development, (d) a determination of the impact of the increased number of employees anticipated to result from the commercial/industrial development (by category) upon the cost of providing School Facilities within the School District, (e) an evaluation and projection of the number of students that will be generated by new residential development, and (f) the new School Facilities that will be required to serve such students, and (g) the cost of such School Facilities; and

WHEREAS, said Studies pertaining to the Statutory School Fees and to the capital facilities needs of the School District were made available to the public as required by law before the Board considered at a regularly scheduled public meeting the Statutory School Fees; and

WHEREAS, all required notices of the proposed Statutory School Fees have been given; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of the School District relating to the proposed Statutory School Fees; and

WHEREAS, Education Code Section 17621 provides that the adoption, increase or imposition of any fee, charge, dedication, or other requirement, pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 shall not be subject to Division 13 (commencing with Section 21000) of the Public Resources Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE, AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Board accepts and adopts the Studies.

Section 2. That the Board finds that the purpose of the Statutory School Fees imposed upon new residential development is to fund the additional School Facilities required to serve the students generated by the new residential development upon which the Statutory School Fees are imposed.

Section 3. That the Board finds that the Statutory School Fees imposed on new residential development will be used only to finance those School Facilities described in the Study and related documents and that these School Facilities are required to serve the students generated by the new residential development within the School District; and that the use of the Statutory School Fees will include construction or acquisition of additional School Facilities, remodeling existing School Facilities to add additional classrooms, and technology, and acquiring and installing additional portable classrooms and related School Facilities, with the specific location of new schools, remodeling of existing School Facilities, and additional portables to be determined based on the residence of the students being generated by such new residential development, as well as any required central administrative and support facilities, within the School District.

Section 4. That the Board finds that there is a roughly proportional, reasonable relationship between the use of the Statutory School Fees and the new residential development within the School District because the Statutory School Fees imposed on new residential development by this Resolution, will be used to fund School Facilities which will be used to serve the students generated by such new residential development.

Section 5. That the Board finds that there is a roughly proportional, reasonable relationship between the new residential development upon which the Statutory School Fees are imposed, and the need for additional School Facilities in the School District because new students will be generated from new residential development within the School District and there is not sufficient capacity in the existing School Facilities to accommodate all additional students.

Section 6. That the Board finds that the amount of the Statutory School Fees levied on new residential development as set forth in this Resolution is roughly proportional and reasonably related to, and does not exceed the cost of, providing

the School Facilities required to serve the students generated by such new residential development within the School District.

Section 7. That the Board finds that the purpose of the Statutory School Fees imposed on new commercial/industrial development is to fund the additional School Facilities required to serve the students generated by the new commercial/industrial development upon which the Statutory School Fees are imposed.

Section 8. That the Board finds that the Statutory School Fees imposed on new commercial/ industrial development (by category) will be used only to finance those School Facilities described in the Studies and related documents and that these School Facilities are required to serve the students generated by such new commercial/industrial development; and that the use of the Statutory School Fees will include construction or acquisition of additional School Facilities, remodeling existing School Facilities to add additional classrooms and technology, and acquiring and installing additional portable classrooms and related facilities, with the specific location of new schools, remodeling of existing School Facilities, and additional portables to be determined based on the residence of the students being generated by such new commercial/industrial development, as well as any required central administrative and support facilities within the School District.

Section 9. That the Board finds that there is a roughly proportional, reasonable relationship between the use of the Statutory School Fees and new commercial/industrial development by category within the School District because the Statutory School Fees imposed on commercial/industrial development by this Resolution, will be used to fund School Facilities which will be used to serve the students generated by such new commercial/industrial development.

Section 10. That the Board finds that there is a roughly proportional, reasonable relationship between the new commercial/industrial development by category, upon which the Statutory School Fees are imposed, and the need for additional School Facilities in the School District because new students will be generated from new commercial/industrial development within the School District and the School District does not have sufficient student capacity in the existing School Facilities to accommodate these students.

Section 11. That the Board finds that the amount of the Statutory School Fees levied on new commercial/industrial development by category as set forth in this Resolution is roughly proportional and reasonably related to and does not exceed the cost of providing the School Facilities required to serve the students generated by such new commercial/industrial development within the School District.

Section 12. That the Board finds that a separate account has been established for the deposit of Statutory School Fees imposed on residential and commercial/industrial development and that said account has at all times since been separately maintained, except for temporary investments, from other funds of the School District.

Section 13. That the Board finds that the funds of the account, described in Section 12, consisting of the proceeds of Statutory School Fees have been imposed for the purposes of constructing and reconstructing those School Facilities necessitated by new residential and commercial/industrial development, and thus, these funds may be expended for those purposes. The Statutory School Fees may also be expended by the School District for the costs of performing any study or otherwise making the findings and determinations required under subdivisions (a), (b), and (d) of Section 66001 of the Government Code. In addition, the School

District may also retain, as appropriate, an amount not to exceed in any fiscal year, three percent (3%) of the fees collected in that fiscal year pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 for reimbursement of the administrative costs incurred by the School District in collecting the Statutory School Fees.

Section 14. That the Board hereby increases the Statutory School Fees as a condition of approval of new residential development projects and imposes the Statutory School Fees on such development projects in the following amounts:

- A. \$3.79 per square foot of assessable space for new single family detached residential development and \$3.79 for new multifamily attached residential development, including new residential projects, manufactured homes and mobile homes as authorized under Education Code Section 17625, and including residential construction other than new construction where such construction results in an increase of assessable space, as defined in Government Code Section 65995, in excess of 500 square feet. However, these amounts shall not be imposed on any development project used exclusively for housing senior citizens, as described in Civil Code Section 51.3, or as described in Subdivision J of Section 1569.2 of the Health and Safety Code or paragraph 9 of subdivision (d) of Section 15432 of the Government Code or any mobile home or manufactured home that is located within a mobile home park, subdivision, cooperative or condominium for mobile homes limited to older persons as defined by the Federal Fair Housing Amendments of 1988.
- B. \$0.61 per square foot of assessable space for new residential development used exclusively for the housing of senior citizens, as described in Section 51.3 of the Civil Code or as described in subdivision J of Section 1569 of the Health and Safety Code or paragraph 9 of subdivision (d) of Section 15432 of the Government Code or any mobile home or manufactured home that is located within a mobile home park, subdivision, cooperative or condominium for mobile homes limited to older persons as defined by the Federal Fair Housing Amendments of 1988.

Section 15. That this Board hereby increases the Statutory School Fees as a condition of approval of new commercial/industrial development projects and levies the Statutory School Fees on such development projects in the following amounts per square foot of chargeable covered and enclosed space for the following categories of commercial/industrial development:

Retail and Services	\$0.61
Office	\$0.61
Research and Development	\$0.61
Industrial/Warehouse/Manufacturing	\$0.61
Hospitals	\$0.61
Hotel/Motel	\$0.049
Self-Storage	

Section 16. That the proceeds of the Statutory School Fees established pursuant to this Resolution shall continue to be deposited into that account identified in Section 12 of this Resolution, the proceeds of which shall be used exclusively for the purpose for which the Statutory School Fees are to be collected, including accomplishing any study, findings or determinations required by subdivisions (a), (b) and (d) of Section 66001 of the Government Code or retaining an amount not to

exceed in any fiscal year, three percent (3%) of the fees collected in that fiscal year pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 for reimbursement of the administrative costs incurred by the School District in collecting the Statutory School Fees or in financing the described Study or in defending the imposition of Statutory School Fees.

Section 17. That the Superintendent, or his designee, is directed to cause a copy of this Resolution to be delivered to the building official of the Cities and County within the School District's boundaries and the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development ("OSHDP") along with a copy of all the supporting documentation referenced herein and a map of the School District clearly indicating the boundaries thereof, advising the Cities, County, and OSHDP that new residential and commercial/industrial development is subject to the Statutory School Fees readopted pursuant to this Resolution and requesting that no building permit or approval for occupancy be issued by any of these entities for any new residential development project, mobile home or manufactured home subject to the Statutory School Fees absent a certification from this School District of compliance of such project with the requirements of the Statutory School Fees, nor that any building permit be issued for any non-residential development absent a certification from this School District of compliance with the requirements of the applicable Statutory School Fees.

Section 18. That the Board hereby establishes a process that permits the party against whom the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are imposed, the opportunity for a hearing to appeal that imposition of Statutory School Fees for commercial/industrial development as required by Education Code Section 17621(e)(2). The appeal process is as follows:

- A. Within ten (10) calendar days of being notified, in writing, (by personal delivery or deposit in the U.S. Mail) of the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees to be imposed or paying the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees, pursuant to Education Code Section 17620, a party shall file a written request for a hearing regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees. The party shall state in the written request the grounds for opposing the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees and said written request shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail to the Superintendent of the School District.
- B. The possible grounds for that appeal include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or pupil generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.
- C. Within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the written request for a hearing regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees, the Superintendent of the School District, or his designee, shall give notice in writing of the date, place and time of the hearing to the party appealing the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees. The Superintendent, or his designee, shall schedule and conduct said hearing within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of the written request. The Superintendent, or his designee, shall render a written decision within ten (10) days following the hearing on the party's appeal and

serve it by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the party.

- D. The party against whom the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are imposed may appeal the Superintendent's, or his designee's, decision to the Board of the School District.
- E. The party appealing the Superintendent's, or his designee's decision, shall state in the written appeal the grounds for opposing the imposition of the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees and said written appeal shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail to the Superintendent of the School District.
- F. The possible grounds for that appeal to the Board of the School District include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or pupil generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.
- G. Within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the written request for a hearing regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees, the Superintendent of the School District, or his designee, shall give notice in writing of the date, place and time of the hearing to the party appealing the imposition of commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees. The Board of the School District shall schedule and conduct said hearing at the next regular meeting of the Board, provided that the party is given notice at least five (5) working days prior to the regular meeting of the Board. The Board shall render a written decision within ten (10) days following the hearing on the party's appeal and serve the decision by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the party.
- H. The party appealing the imposition of the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees shall bear the burden of establishing that the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fees are improper.

Section 19. That the Superintendent is authorized to cause a certificate of compliance to be issued for each development project, mobile home and manufactured home for which there is compliance with the requirement for payment of the Statutory School Fees in the amount specified by this Resolution. In the event a certificate of compliance is issued for the payment of Statutory School Fees for a development project, mobile home or manufactured home and it is later determined that the statement or other representation made by an authorized party concerning the development project as to square footage is untrue, then such certificate shall automatically terminate, and the appropriate City shall be so notified.

Section 20. That no statement or provision set forth in this Resolution, or referred to therein shall be construed to repeal any preexisting fee previously imposed by the School District on any residential or nonresidential development.

Section 21. That the School District's Statutory School Fees will become effective sixty (60) days from the date of this Resolution unless a separate resolution increasing the fees immediately on an urgency basis is adopted by the Board.



TOPIC:

COMMUNICATIONS / PUBLIC INFORMATION SERVICES

DESCRIPTION:

The District has a need to hire a qualified firm for communications/public information services. Staff conducted a Request for Information (RFI) in September, inviting firms to submit proposals. Results were presented during the November 9, 2017 Board meeting. The RFI was advertised in the OC Register and staff solicited ten public relations firm. The Board took action and instructed staff to proceed with a Request for Proposal (RFP) with the intent to award services to qualified firms. Staff solicited the RFP in December to the two firms that submitted a proposal during the RFI phase. For the RFP, firms were required to present a mock marketing plan presentation at the January 8, 2018 Board meeting and submit a service level cost form, which describes the products and deliverables of each firm's services.

A District Communications Committee was formed to do a comprehensive analysis reviewing the firm's performance during the presentation (including Board feedback of the marketing plan presentation), the service level costs (products and deliverables), and the overall qualification and experience of each firm. A primary focus was to ensure that with the amount of funds available, the District would get the most value and deliverable products, given a limited budget.

The initial recommendation was to award to VMA Communications the contract at maximal retainer rate of \$9,000 per month, plus direct costs. The Board asked that staff negotiate with Communications Lab to secure the same, or better, deliverable products at a comparable or better price.

Staff has worked with Communication Labs to produce a more comprehensive list of deliverable products at comparable market rates and they dropped the monthly retainer to \$8,500. It is not anticipated that the District would be able to take advantage of "tiered pricing retainer" during the recommended ten and one-half month contract, due to the number of deliverable products required over this period. Upon renewal, the District may want to negotiate the annual retainer based upon the services needed and the ability to reduce services as products are developed, which can be maintained by District staff, or as discretionary funding becomes scarce in the future.

FISCAL IMPACT:

District staff have negotiated with vendor identified marketing services ranging for \$89,250 in retainer fees, plus estimated reimbursable direct expenses, estimated at \$124,221. The total amount of this contract is \$213,471.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education hire Communication Labs for communications/public information services for a ten and one-half month period based on supporting local vendors, their experience, deliverable products, and price of retainer.

TOPIC:

**COLLEGE AND CAREER ACCESS PATHWAY
PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT**

DESCRIPTION:

Assembly Bill 288 establishes the College and Career Access Pathways (CCAP) Act to authorize California Community College Districts to enter into formal partnership agreements with local school districts to expand access to concurrent enrollment opportunities for high school students. Concurrent enrollment is defined as credit hours earned when a high school student is taking a college course for both high school and college credit, during the high school day, on the high school campus. The goals of Assembly Bill 288 encompass the following:

1. Expand access to concurrent enrollment programs for students through the authorization of college courses being offered on a high school campus exclusively to high school students
2. Increase exposure to the rigor of college coursework and environments for underserved students.
3. Accelerate learning for students by developing a framework that enables students who demonstrate competency to up to 15 units of community college coursework instead of the 11 units.
4. Build pathways that fill projected labor market needs and are relevant to the targeted student population.
5. Promote accountability for student learning by granting school districts more authority to monitor a student's progress and obtain academic records from the collaborating community college.
6. Gather data that is more consistent and reliable from the collaborating agencies to allow for better analyses of concurrent enrollment programs.

OUSD, in collaboration with Rancho Santiago Community College, will be entering into a CCAP Partnership Agreement to establish an early college academy at Orange High School. The program will start in August 2018 with an initial cohort of 35 participants. 





Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP has proposed to perform bond counsel services for a fixed fee of \$55,000 plus reimbursable expenses for a private placement. If a public offering is required, the counsel fees would be \$50,000 for bond counsel services and \$25,000 for disclosure counsel services. A private placement would entail placing the debt with a private bank/investor. A public sale would involve offering the COP in the open market. A public sale is more involved and has additional disclosure requirements.

Bond/disclosure counsel fees will be incorporated into the COP lease financing and paid from COP proceeds. There is no direct fiscal impact to the District; the COP will be repaid by El Rancho Charter School.

This Fifth Amendment ("Fifth Amendment") to the Purchase and Sale and Joint Escrow Instructions dated October 20, 2014, by and between the ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a public school district duly organized and existing under Chapter 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Education Code of the State of California ("District" or "Seller" depending on context) and WESTERN STATES HOUSING, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company ("Buyer"), as amended by that certain Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated December 11, 2014 ("First Amendment"), that certain Second Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated March 1, 2016, ("Second Amendment"), that certain Third Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated May 26, 2016 ("Third Amendment"); and that certain Fourth Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated June 8, 2017 ("Fourth Amendment") (collectively, referred to as the "Purchase Agreement"), is hereby made and entered into as of February 15, 2018 ("Effective Date") as follows:

WHEREAS, District and Buyer have entered into the Purchase Agreement for the sale by District to Buyer of that certain real property located at 541 North Lemon Street, Orange, California, known generally as the District's former Killefer Elementary School site (the "Property"), as more particularly set forth in the Purchase Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Close of Escrow is currently March 15, 2018;

WHEREAS, the Parties have agreed to extend the Close of Escrow for one hundred and twenty (120) days from March 15, 2018 to July 12, 2018; and

WHEREAS, Section 6.11 of the Purchase Agreement requires that any amendment or modification to the Purchase Agreement must be in writing and executed by both Buyer and Seller.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the Recitals set forth above, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as set forth below.

This Fifth Amendment ("Fifth Amendment") to the Purchase and Sale and Joint Escrow Instructions dated October 20, 2014, by and between the ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a public school district duly organized and existing under Chapter 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Education Code of the State of California ("District" or "Seller" depending on context) and WESTERN STATES HOUSING, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company ("Buyer"), as amended by that certain Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated December 11, 2014 ("First Amendment"), that certain Second Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated March 1, 2016, ("Second Amendment"), that certain Third Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated May 26, 2016 ("Third Amendment"); and that certain Fourth Amendment to Purchase and Sale Agreement and Joint Escrow Instructions dated June 8, 2017 ("Fourth Amendment") (collectively, referred to as the "Purchase Agreement"), is hereby made and entered into as of February 15, 2018 ("Effective Date") as follows:

WHEREAS, District and Buyer have entered into the Purchase Agreement for the sale by District to Buyer of that certain real property located at 541 North Lemon Street, Orange, California, known generally as the District's former Killefer Elementary School site (the "Property"), as more particularly set forth in the Purchase Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Close of Escrow is currently March 15, 2018;

WHEREAS, the Parties have agreed to extend the Close of Escrow for one hundred and twenty (120) days from March 15, 2018 to July 12, 2018; and

WHEREAS, Section 6.11 of the Purchase Agreement requires that any amendment or modification to the Purchase Agreement must be in writing and executed by both Buyer and Seller.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the Recitals set forth above, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as set forth below.

1. **Revise Section 3.2.1 of the Purchase Agreement in its entirety to read as follows:**

3.2 Close of Escrow; Closing Date; Escrow Extensions.

3.2.1 Closing Date. Notwithstanding any other provision in this Agreement, the Close of Escrow for the acquisition of the Property shall take place no later than July 12, 2018 ("Closing Date" or "Outside Closing Date") provided that all of the conditions of this Agreement shall have been satisfied (or waived, if applicable) and prior to or on the Closing Date.

2. **Indemnification.** In addition to and in no way limiting any warranty, representation or indemnification by Buyer in the Purchase Agreement, Buyer hereby agrees that Buyer shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless District and its officers, directors, employees, agents and representatives (collectively, the "Indemnified Parties") from and against any and all claims, actions, suits, legal or administrative orders or proceedings, demands or other liabilities resulting at any time to the extent caused by a claim by a third party that this Fifth Amendment or any modification of terms and conditions of the Purchase Agreement hereby violates the surplus property procedures set forth in California Education Code Sections 17455 through 17484 as of the date of this Fifth Amendment of thereafter ("Claim"). Such indemnification shall include, and shall not be limited to, all foreseeable and unforeseeable damages, fees, costs, losses and expenses, including any and all attorneys' fees and consultant fees and investigation costs and expenses, to the extent arising therefrom, and including fines and penalties of any nature whatsoever, assessed, levied or asserted against any Indemnified Parties, and in connection therewith:

(i) **Actions Filed.** Buyer shall defend any action or actions filed in connection with any of said claims, liens, damages, penalties, obligations or liabilities, and will pay all costs and expenses, including attorneys' fees incurred in connection therewith.

(ii) **Judgments Rendered.** Buyer shall promptly pay any judgment rendered against Buyer or Seller covering such claims, liens, damages, penalties, obligations and liabilities to the extent arising out of or in connection with any Claim and agrees to save and hold Seller harmless therefrom.

(iii) **Costs and Expenses: Attorneys' Fees.** In the event Seller is made a party to any action or proceeding filed or prosecuted against Buyer for such damages or other Claims arising out of or in connection with this Fifth Amendment or any modification of terms and conditions of the Purchase Agreement hereby, Buyer agrees to pay Seller any and all costs and expenses incurred by them in such action or proceeding together with reasonable attorneys' and expert witness fees.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, Buyer's obligations under this Section will not apply to any claims, actions, suits, legal or administrative orders or proceedings, demands or other liabilities resulting from Seller's failure to comply with procedural requirements applicable to Seller with respect this Fifth Amendment or any modification of terms and conditions of the Purchase Agreement hereby such as public notice requirements (other than the surplus property procedures described above).

If a Claim is made prior to Closing, then District will promptly notify Buyer and Buyer may elect to terminate the Purchase Agreement, in which event Buyer will have no obligations under this Section. If Buyer so terminates the Purchase Agreement, then all deposits and extension fees, including but not limited to the Initial Deposit, the Additional Deposit, the First Escrow Extension Fee, and each Additional Escrow Extension Fee, if any, shall be retained by Seller.

The provisions of this Section shall terminate upon the earlier of the termination or expiration of the Purchase Agreement or the Closing Date.

3. **Binding Effect; Partial Invalidity.** This Fifth Amendment shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns. If any provision of this Fifth Amendment shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision of this Fifth Amendment or the Purchase Agreement.

4. **Full Force and Effect.** The Purchase Agreement is hereby modified with respect to the terms set forth in this Fifth Amendment, and any other portion thereof as necessary to implement the foregoing. Except as specifically set forth in this Fifth Amendment, the Purchase Agreement shall remain unmodified and in full force and effect as executed by the Parties.

5. **Counterparts.** This Fifth Amendment may be executed and delivered in any number of counterparts, each of which so executed and delivered shall be deemed to be an original and all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument.

6. **Inconsistencies.** In the event of any inconsistency between the terms of this Fifth Amendment and those of the Purchase Agreement, the First Amendment, the Second Amendment, the Third Amendment, or the Fourth Amendment, the terms of this Fifth Amendment shall control, then the Fourth Amendment, the Third Amendment, the Second Amendment, the First Amendment and the Purchase Agreement, in that order.

DESCRIPTION:

The California Department of Education (CDE) has provided Form J-13A, "Request for Allowance of Attendance Due to Emergency Conditions", to enable the District to file an affidavit which will prevent the loss of attendance apportionment revenue as a consequence of the Canyon Fire 2 wildfire. The Governor issued an emergency proclamation for Orange County on October 9, 2017. Form J-13A may be filed per Education Code (EC) Section 41422, when schools are closed due to extraordinary conditions and per EC Section 46392, when one or more schools were kept open, but experienced a material decrease in attendance. Under a State of Emergency, the materiality threshold is waived.

On October 10–11, 2017, the Canyon Fire 2 resulted in the closure of Anaheim Hills, Canyon Rim, Chapman Hills, Linda Vista, Panorama and Running Springs Elementary Schools for both days and El Modena High School on October 10, 2017. In addition, the following schools experienced a decrease on one or both days in Average Daily Attendance (ADA) as compared to the state method of determining the "normal" October ADA for the school month beginning on October 16, 2017 and ending on November 10, 2017: California, Cambridge, Crescent, Esplanade, Fairhaven, Fletcher, Handy, Imperial, Jordan, La Veta, Lampson, Nohl Canyon, Olive, Palmyra, Prospect, Serrano, Sycamore, Taft, Villa Park and West Orange Elementary Schools; McPherson Magnet, Cerro Villa, Portola and Yorba Middle Schools; Canyon, Orange and Villa Park High Schools, Richland Continuation and Canyon Hills SDC.

School Districts are to be held harmless from revenue loss that might otherwise result from the loss of ADA or instructional time in emergencies. This form, if approved by CDE, will enable the District to a) for the school closures use a divisor of 178 and 179 days for the Elementary Schools and El Modena High School, respectively and b) use the resultant "normal" ADA figure as the material decrease credit; thereby preserving the daily attendance and the Districtwide longer-day/longer-year incentive funding.


FISCAL IMPACT:

Retention of budgeted apportionment revenue.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve and authorize staff to file Form J-13A, "Request for Allowance of Attendance Due to* Emergency Conditions," as presented.







STUDY TRIPS

DESCRIPTION:

Palmyra Elementary - 6th Grade Class – ECOS – Outdoor Science School – March 12 – 16, 2018

The sixth grade students from Palmyra Elementary School, under the supervision of Mendy MacDonald, Cynthia Thomas, as well as trained ECOS staff, will participate in the Emerald Cove Outdoor Science School program. This five-day program provides students an opportunity to explore established trails, investigate geological features, observe wildlife and compare plant adaptations. The curriculum at the camp is aligned with the California Science Content Standards and the California Science Framework. Transportation to and from program will be provided by OUSD Transportation. The cost per student is \$390, and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. There is no impact to the general fund.

Imperial Elementary - 6th Grade Class – Arrowhead Ranch – Outdoor Science School – March 26 – 30, 2018

The sixth grade students from Imperial Elementary School, under the supervision of Tracy Fessett, Steve Mueller, Erika Ostergaard, as well as trained AR camp staff, will participate in the Arrowhead Ranch Outdoor Science School program. This five-day program provides students an opportunity to explore established trails, investigate geological features, observe wildlife and compare plant adaptations. Students will study the night sky through telescopes, participate in line and folk dances, create and perform science and nature skits. The curriculum at the camp is aligned with the California Science Content Standards and the California Science Framework. Transportation to and from program will be provided by OUSD Transportation. The cost per student is \$350, and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. There is no impact to the general fund.

West Orange Elementary - 5th Grade Class – Arrowhead Ranch – Outdoor Science School – March 26 – 30, 2018


The fifth grade students from West Orange Elementary School, under the supervision of Corinne Owens, David Maxwell, as well as trained AR camp staff, will participate in the Arrowhead Ranch Outdoor Science School program. This five-day program provides students an opportunity to explore established trails, investigate geological features, observe wildlife, compare plant adaptations and study the night sky through telescopes. The curriculum at the camp is aligned with the California Science Content Standards and the

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California Science Framework. Transportation to and from program will be provided by OUSD Transportation. The cost per student is \$270, and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. There is no impact to the general fund.

El Modena High School – Wrestling – Temecula Valley – February 23 - 24, 2018

El Modena High School's Wrestling athletes, under the supervision of coach Jorge Carrizosa, will travel to Temecula Valley to participate in the CIF Masters Tournament. The qualifying student athletes will compete in the CIF Masters Tournament representing El Modena and will see the benefits of hard work and commitment. The six male students will be accompanied by one male adult chaperone. Transportation will be provided by the students own parents who will be attending this event. The students and chaperones will stay at the Extended Stay America in Temecula. There is no cost for this event. The students will miss one day of school. A substitute is required for one day.

Canyon High School – Junior State of America Club (JSA) – Woodland Hills – February 24 – 25, 2018

Canyon High Junior State of America students, under the supervision of advisor, Jennifer Heilbrun, will travel to Woodland Hills to participate in the Junior State of American Winter Congress. The students will have the opportunity to participate in a simulation of the United States congressional legislative processes alongside students throughout California. The four male and eleven female students will be accompanied by one male and one female adult chaperone. Transportation will be provided by OUSD bus. The chaperones and students will stay at the Warner Center Marriott. The cost per student is \$190 and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. The students will not miss any school and no substitute is required.

Canyon High School – Boys Wrestling Team – Bakersfield, CA – March 1 - 3, 2018

Canyon High School's Boys Wrestling Team, under the supervision of coach Richard O'Connor, will travel to Bakersfield to compete in the CIF State Wrestling Tournament. The four male students will be accompanied by four male adult chaperones. Transportation will be provided by each athlete's parent who will have an approved authorization to transport students on file with Risk Management prior to the trip. The chaperones and students will stay at the Residence Inn in Bakersfield. There is no cost per student. The students will miss two days of school. A substitute is required for two days.

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Villa Park High School – Girls Varsity Softball Team – Bullhead City, AZ – March 8-10, 2018

Villa Park High Girls' Varsity Softball Team, under the supervision of coach Terry Williams, will travel to Bullhead City to compete in the Tournament of Champions, the number one rated high school tournament in the country. The student athletes will have the opportunity to socialize and compete with high schools from out of the area and to perform before multiple collegiate coaches. The 15 female students will be accompanied by one male and three female adult chaperones. Parents will provide transportation for their student, and any parent driving a student other than their own will have an approved OUSD Driver Certification on file prior to this trip. Chaperones and students will stay at the Aquarius Resort in Laughlin. Cost per student is \$75 and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. The students will miss two days of school and a substitute is required.


Orange High School–JROTC – Yuma, AZ - March 9-11, 2018

Orange HS JROTC, under the supervision of Major Ian Santos and Edward Aguilar, will go to Yuma to compete in the Drill Meet Competition. Cadets that are competing will develop leadership, discipline, increased responsibility and confidence through the preparation required for a large-scale competition. They will gain confidence when they compete with other Cadets to secure entrance into colleges and universities, the military or work force. The 15 female students and 25 male students will be accompanied by two female and three male adult chaperones. Transportation will be provided by OUSD approved commercial bus contracted and paid for by the Marine Corps. The students will be staying at Candelwood Suites in Yuma. There is no cost for this event. The students will miss one day of school and a substitute is required.

McPherson Magnet School 7th Grade Classes – Astro Camp – Idyllwild, CA – April 9 -11, 2018

McPherson Magnet School's 7th grade classes under the supervision of teacher Lynne Palucki, as well as trained Astro Camp staff, will travel to the Desert Sun Science Center near Idyllwild to attend Astro Camp. The students will study the solar system, rocketry, electricity, magnetism and Newton's Laws of Physics through a hands-on interactive program emphasizing teamwork and cooperation. The eighty students attending will be accompanied by four female adult chaperones and two male adult chaperones. The students will travel by OUSD bus and will stay overnight at the Science Center. The cost per student is \$295 and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient

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funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. Scholarships are available. The students will miss three school days and a substitute for four of the chaperone/teachers will be needed. This cost will be reimbursed through donated funds. There is no impact to the general fund.

McPherson Magnet School – Sixth Grade Class – San Diego Wild Animal Park Roar n’ Snore– April 19-20, 2018

The McPherson Magnet School sixth grade class, under the direction of their teachers, Shannon Duncan, Jane Layton and Cathy Priest will travel to San Diego Wild Animal Park in Escondido. Students will learn about plant and animal conservation, focusing on how different animal adaptations help the animal to survive in their habitat. This program is aligned to Common Core Literacy Standards & Next Generation Science Standards. The 47 male and sixty female students will be accompanied by three female sixth grade teachers and 22 parent volunteers. The sixth grade students will travel by District bus to Wild Animal Park. The cost per student is \$175 for the Standard Tent Area. No student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331 and scholarships are available. The students will miss two school days and no substitutes will be required.

El Modena High School – Vocal Music Department – San Diego – April 20 – 22, 2018

Sixty-four El Modena High School students from the Vocal Music Department qualified to compete at the Heritage Music Festival in San Diego. Under the supervision of teacher Tracy Solis, the students will have the opportunity to perform/compete in a nationally adjudicated music festival. The students will be accompanied by four female and two male chaperones. The students and chaperones will travel by OUSD bus and will be housed at the Doubletree, San Diego. The cost is approximately \$375 per student and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of insufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. The students will miss one day of school and a substitute will be required.

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE
ORANGE COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND
THE DISTRICT**

DESCRIPTION:

OUSD would like to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) to participate in the Orange County Integrated Foster Youth Education Database (OCIFYED) maintained by OCDE. The purpose of OCIFYED is to facilitate secured electronic data sharing for foster youth under the jurisdiction of the California Juvenile Courts. The OCIFYED would allow for the real-time sharing of student data through an electronic database maintained by OCDE.

On a daily basis Foster Youth placement information is uploaded into the District's Aeries Student Information System providing the District immediate access to information regarding the foster youth. The term of the MOU with OCDE is through June 30, 2022 and is automatically renewable for five years at the end of each five-year term.

The sharing of foster youth information will improve the identification, case management, and ability to utilize data to develop programs to support foster youth, improving their academic outcomes. Both the District and OCDE will be able to generate academic reports to use to improve program planning and improve the educational outcomes of foster youth consistent with the Local Control Funding Formula



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TOPIC: **SECOND QUARTER REPORT OF UNIFORM COMPLAINTS FOR THE WILLIAMS CASE SETTLEMENT**

DESCRIPTION: As a result of the State of California's settlement of the Williams class action lawsuit, Education Code section 35186 requires school districts to do two things: 1) provide an opportunity to file formal complaints under the District's Uniform Complaint Procedures; and 2) report to the Board of Education and the public four times a year the number of complaints filed and the area of the settlement they target.

The Second Quarter Report covers the number of Uniform Complaints received by the District under the three areas governed by the Williams Case Settlement for the period of October – December 2017. The three targeted areas are:


1. Sufficient Instructional Materials
2. Emergency or urgent facilities conditions that pose a threat to the health and safety of pupils or staff
3. Teacher vacancy and/or misassignment

No Uniform Complaints for any area have been reported during the second quarter for the Williams Case Settlement.
