PUBLIC **HEARING:** CONSIDERATION OF THE **DISTRICT'S** FEE JUSTIFICATION STUDY **FOR** PURPOSES OF INCREASING THE **STATUTORY** SCHOOL FACILITIES FEES FOR NEW RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

DESCRIPTION:

The District is required to approve the justification for the increase in Level I statutory fees after each statutory increase by the State Allocation Board (SAB) for residential and commercial/industrial fees. On January 25, 2006, the SAB increased the residential statutory Level I fee from \$2.24 per square foot to \$2.63 per square foot and commercial statutory Level I fees from \$0.36 per square foot to \$0.42 per square foot.

A public hearing will be conducted pursuant to Government Code Section 66019(a) for the purposes of the adoption of Resolution No. 41-05-06, entitled "Resolution of the Board of Education of the Orange Unified School District Adopting Fee Justification Studies for Residential and Commercial/Industrial Development and Increasing Statutory Fees Imposed on New Residential and Commercial /Industrial Development," pursuant to Education Code Section 17620.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Facility fees for statutory residential and commercial /industrial Level I will increase from \$2.24 to \$2.63 per square foot and \$0.36 to \$0.42 per square foot, respectively.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education hold a public hearing to receive input on a resolution adopting a fee justification study and increasing statutory school fees imposed on new residential and commercial/industrial development.

RESOLUTION NO. 41-05-06: ADOPTING FEE JUSTIFICATION STUDIES FOR RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND INCREASING STATUTORY SCHOOL FEES IMPOSED ON NEW RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

DESCRIPTION:

This Residential Development School Fee Justification Studies is intended to determine the extent to which a nexus can be established in Orange Unified School District between residential development and (i) the need for school facilities, (ii) the cost of school facilities, and (iii) the amount of statutory school fees per residential building square foot that may be levied for schools pursuant to provisions of Section 17620 of the Education Code, as well as Sections 65995 and 66001 of the Government Code.

This Commercial/Industrial School Fee Justification Study analyzes the extent to which a "nexus" can be established in the Orange Unified School District between categories of commercial/industrial development and (i) the need for school facilities, (ii) the cost of school facilities, and (iii) the amount of statutory school fees per square foot that may be levied for schools, pursuant to the provisions of Assembly Bill ("AB") 181, Section 66001 of the Government Code and subdivision (e) of Section 17621 of the Education Code.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Increased statutory fee:

Residential: \$2.63 per square foot (\$0.39 per square

foot increase).

Commercial/Industrial: \$0.42 per square foot (\$0.16

per square foot increase).

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt the attached Resolution No. 41-05-06 adopting fee justification studies for residential and commercial/industrial development and increasing statutory school fees imposed on new residential and commercial/industrial development.

RESOLUTION NO. 41-05-06 of the BOARD OF EDUCATION of the ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

ADOPTING FEE JUSTIFICATION STUDIES FOR RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AND INCREASING STATUTORY SCHOOL FEES IMPOSED ON NEW RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL/INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("Board") of the Orange Unified School District ("District") provides for the educational services for students in grades K-12 residing within the cities of Anaheim, Garden Grove, Orange, Santa Ana, Villa Park and the County of Orange; and

WHEREAS, Education Code Section 17620 et seq. and Government Code Section 65995 authorize the governing board of any school district within the State of California ("State") to levy a fee against new residential, commercial and industrial development projects within the school district for the purpose of funding the construction and reconstruction of school facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously adopted and imposed statutory school fees for new residential and commercial/industrial development pursuant to Education Code Section 17620; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Government Code Section 65995(b)(3), the State Allocation Board, at its January 25, 2006 meeting, increased the maximum amount of the statutory school fees to \$2.63 per square foot of new residential development and \$0.42 per square foot of new commercial/industrial development; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the school facilities of the District continue to operate at overcapacity and that the educational programs are seriously impacted by the increasing student population caused by new residential, commercial and industrial development within the boundaries of District; and

WHEREAS, new development continues to generate additional students for the District's schools and the District is required to accommodate such students; and

WHEREAS, the District does not have sufficient funds available for the construction or reconstruction of school facilities, including acquisition of school sites, construction of permanent school facilities, and interim school facilities to accommodate students generated from new development; and

WHEREAS, the Board has reviewed, considered, and based its findings on the reports prepared by David Taussig & Associates, Inc., entitled Residential Development School Fee Justification Study and Commercial/Industrial Development School Fee

Justification Study, collectively referred to herein as the "Studies," which analyzes the District's current school facilities, the estimated number of students which will be generated by new residential, commercial and industrial development within the District, and the estimated costs which will be required to construct permanent school facilities to accommodate the students generated by such new development; and

WHEREAS, the findings in the Studies demonstrate that the estimated costs of providing school facilities for students generated by new development will exceed the maximum amount of revenue which will be collected from school fees levied pursuant to Education Code Sections 17620 et seq., and Government Code Section 65995 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the Studies justifies the District's imposition of school fees on residential construction as set forth in this Resolution by analyzing student generation data for residential development projects and by demonstrating that new school facilities are necessary to accommodate increased enrollment resulting from such development; and

WHEREAS, the Studies further justifies the District's imposition of school fees on new commercial and industrial construction as set forth in this Resolution by analyzing specific categories of commercial and industrial development which were determined to impact the district's school facilities based upon the square footage of the construction, the anticipated number of employees and the number of new students generated by such employees; and

WHEREAS, this Board deems it to be necessary, desirable and in the best interest of the students, teachers, parents and electorate of the District to increase the school fee amount authorized by Education Code Sections 17620, et seq. and Government Code Section 65995 et seq. to \$2.63 per square foot of new residential development and \$0.42 per square foot of new commercial/industrial development ("School Fees"); and

WHEREAS, the School Fees levied against new residential, commercial and industrial development will be used to finance school facilities necessary to accommodate students generated from such new development, including but not limited to, acquisition of new school sites, remodeling of existing school facilities, acquiring and installing additional portable classrooms and related facilities in accordance with Education Code Section 17620; and

WHEREAS, the Studies and proposed fees increase have been reviewed by the Board and District staff in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"); and

WHEREAS, no city or county may issue a building permit for any new residential, commercial or industrial development within the District absent a certification by the District of compliance by the owner/developer with the requirements regarding school facilities fees as set forth in Education Code Section 17620 et seq., and Government Code Section 65995 et seq.; and as set forth in Education Code Section 17620 et seq., and

WHEREAS, the appropriate land use jurisdictions will be notified of the adoption of the Studies and the increased School Fees levied by the District; and

WHEREAS, the Alternative School Facility Fees levied on new residential development will be used to finance school facilities necessary to accommodate students generated from such new development, including but not limited to, acquisition of new school sites, expansion of existing school facilities, acquiring and installing additional portable classrooms and related facilities in accordance with applicable law; and

WHEREAS, no city or county within the boundaries of the District may issue a building permit for any new residential development within the District absent a certification by the District of compliance with the requirements regarding school facilities fees as set forth in Education Code Section 17620 et seq., and Government Code Section 65995 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the appropriate land use jurisdictions will be notified of the adoption of the SFNA and the Alternative School Facility Fees by the District, and will be requested to continue to work with the District to assure that the school facilities fee program benefits the residents and students of the community; and

WHEREAS, the District (1) has made available to the public, ten (10) days prior to its public meeting, the Studies and data indicating the estimated cost required to provide the service for which the increased School Fees are levied and the revenue sources anticipated to provide the service as demonstrated in the Studies; (2) has mailed notice at least fourteen (14) days prior to this meeting to all interested parties who have requested in writing notice of the meeting on new or increased fees; and (3) has held a duly noticed, regularly scheduled public meeting at which oral and written testimony was received regarding the Studies and the proposed School Fees.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Section 1</u>. That the Board has reviewed the Studies and hereby adopts all of the findings contained therein.
- <u>Section 2</u>. The Board hereby increases statutory school fees levied against all new residential development and additions resulting in an increase of assessable space in excess of five hundred (500) square feet pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 et seq. and Government Code Section 65995(b)(1) to an amount of \$2.63 per square foot.
- <u>Section 3</u>. The Board hereby increases the statutory school fee levied against all new commercial and industrial development pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 et seq. and Government Code Section 65995(b)(2) to an amount of \$0.42 per square foot.
- <u>Section 4</u>. The Board has reviewed the Studies and finds, based upon the Studies, information and testimony presented in conjunction therein, as follows:
- <u>Section 4.1</u>. New residential, commercial and industrial development will result in a substantial increase in student enrollment which will require the District to provide additional school facilities to accommodate new growth, and therefore a reasonable relationship exists between the District's need for new and reconstructed school facilities, and the types of development on which the School Fees will be imposed.

- <u>Section 4.2.</u> School Fees levied on new residential, commercial, and industrial development will be used to finance school facilities necessary to serve students generated from such development.
- Section 4.3. The increase in student enrollment resulting from residential, commercial and industrial development necessitates the construction of new facilities to accommodate such growth and therefore a reasonable relationship exists between the use of the School Fees (construction and reconstruction of school facilities to accommodate such new growth) and the residential, commercial and industrial development on which the School Fees will be imposed.
- <u>Section 5.</u> The Board directs staff to ensure that the School Fees collected by the District are deposited in a separate account, and that said account shall be separately maintained, except for temporary investments, from other funds of the District.
- Section 6. The Board finds that the funds of the account, described in Section 5, consisting of the proceeds of School Fees have been imposed for the purposes of construction and reconstruction those school facilities necessitated by new residential and commercial/industrial development, and that, these funds may be expended for those purposes. The School Fees may also be expended by the District for the costs of performing any study or otherwise making the findings and determinations required under subdivisions (a), (b), and (d) of Section 66001 of the Government Code. In addition, the District may also retain, as appropriate, an amount not to exceed in any fiscal year, three percent (3%) of the School Fees collected in that fiscal year pursuant to Education Code Section 17620 for reimbursement of the administrative costs incurred by the District in collecting the School Fees.
- Section 7. That the Board hereby establishes a process that provides the party against whom the commercial/industrial School Fees are imposed an opportunity for a hearing to appeal the imposition of School Fees on a commercial/industrial development project as required by Education Code Section 17621(e)(2). The appeal process is as follows:
- Section 7.1. Within ten (10) calendar days of being notified, in writing, by personal delivery or deposit in the U.S. Mail, of the commercial/industrial School Fees to be imposed on a particular commercial/industrial project, or within ten (10) calendar days of paying the commercial/industrial School Fees pursuant to Education Code Section 17620(a)(1)(A), a party shall file a written request with the District's Director of Facilities and Planning for a hearing regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial School Fees. The party shall state in the written appeal shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail.
- <u>Section 7.2.</u> The possible grounds for an appeal include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or student generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.

- <u>Section 7.3.</u> The Director of Facilities and Planning, or his designee, shall render a written decision within thirty (30) calendar days following receipt of the written appeal and deliver it to the appealing party by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the party.
- <u>Section 7.4.</u> The party against whom the commercial/industrial School Fees are imposed may appeal the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board. Any appeal to the Board must be filed within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the written decision.
- <u>Section 7.5.</u> The party appealing the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board, shall state in the written appeal to the Board the grounds for opposing the Decision. The written appeal shall be served by personal delivery or certified or registered mail to the President of the Board at the district office (1401 N. Handy Street, Orange, CA 92867).
- Section 7.6. The possible grounds for an appeal of the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board include, but are not limited to, the inaccuracy of including the project within the category pursuant to which the commercial/industrial School Fees are to be imposed, or that the employee generation or student generation factors utilized under the applicable category are inaccurate as applied to the project.
- Section 7.7. Within ten (10) calendar days of receipt of the written appeal of the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision to the Board regarding the imposition of commercial/industrial School Fees, the Board Secretary or his designee shall give notice in writing of the date, place and time of the hearing before the Board, to the party appealing the Director of Facilities and Planning's decision. The Board shall notice and conduct said hearing at the next available regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the appealing party is given notice at lease five (5) calendar days prior to the meeting of the Board. The Board shall render a written decision on the appeal within ten (10) calendar days following the Board's hearing on the party's appeal, and serve the Board's decision by certified or registered mail to the last known address of the appealing party.
- <u>Section 7.8.</u> The party appealing the imposition of the commercial/industrial School Fees shall bear the burden of establishing that the commercial/industrial School Fees are improper.
- <u>Section 8</u>. No statement or provision set forth in this Resolution, or referred to herein shall be construed to repeal any pre-existing fee previously imposed by the District on any residential or nonresidential development.
- Section 9. The Board finds and determines that the adoption or imposition of the increased School Fees in accordance with Government Code Section 65995 is statutorily exempt from CEQA pursuant to Code Section 17621(a).
- <u>Section 10</u>. District staff is directed to file a Notice of Exemption with the Orange County Clerk's Office.

Section 11. District staff is hereby instructed to work with the appropriate land use jurisdictions to ensure compliance with Education Code Section 17620 et seq., which provides that no city or county may issue a building permit for any development project within the District without certification by the District of compliance by that development project with the school facilities fee requirements of this Resolution. The Board determines that the School Fees are not subject to Government Code Section 66007 and that a certificate of compliance is required prior to the issuance of any building permit.

<u>Section 12</u>. District staff is hereby instructed to transmit certified copies of this Resolution, accompanied by all relevant supporting documentation including the Studies and a map of the boundary area of the District subject to the School Fees, to all appropriate land use jurisdictions issuing building permits within the District, informing each of them of the District's current school facilities fee for development projects.

<u>Section 53</u>. The increased School Fees designated herein shall take effect sixty (60) days from the date of this Resolution.

SECOND INTERIM FINANCIAL REPORT AND TRANSFER, RESOLUTION NO. 40-05-06

DESCRIPTION:

In accordance with state requirements, all school districts are required to file the Second Interim Financial Report by March 15 of each year to certify positive, qualified, or negative financial status based upon the most updated information available. The Second Interim Report (Attachment A) not only reflects actual information as of January 31, 2005 (Column C), but also projects anticipated revenues and expenditures known to date (Column D). The District will file a positive certification in regard to the ability to meet its financial obligations.

Average Daily Attendance: The total budgeted attendance of 28,030.05 (not including District charter schools) reflects a total decrease of 127.12 as compared to December 2005 estimates; comprised of a 156.14 decrease in Orange Unified ADA, net with an increase of 30.02 ADA in special education and community day school for the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) pass through and 1 ADA decrease in Adult Education (Attachment B). The following chart is a summary composition of 2005/06 ADA:

Revenue Limit: The current revenue limit calculations from OCDE are based upon the most recent State Department of Education information. The effect is a net decrease of \$1,009,162 (Attachment C).

TOPIC:

PROPOSED BOARD POLICY 6146.45 – WAIVER OF THE CALIFORNIA HIGH SCHOOL EXIT EXAMINATION FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES – SECOND AND FINAL READING

DESCRIPTION:

Board Policies and Administrative Regulations are routinely reviewed and updated when changes in law occur or when a specific need arises. The Superintendent is charged with the continuous and orderly review of existing policies and regulations as well as the development of new policies when appropriate.

Board Bylaw 9311 states:

"Prior to adoption, policies shall be given two readings by the Board unless the second reading is waived by Board action. As its second reading the policy may be adopted by a majority vote of all members of the Board. The Board may waive the second reading and take action or may require additional readings."

The following proposed Board Policy is presented for a second and final reading:

 BP 6146.45 Waiver of the California High School Exit Examination for Students with Disabilities

FISCAL IMPACT: This item has no fiscal impact.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education receive the

attached new Board Policy – Waiver of the California High School Exit Examination for Students with Disabilities - for a

second reading and final approval.

Instruction

Waiver of the California High School Exit Examination for Students with Disabilities

At the parent or guardian's request, the school principal shall submit a request for a waiver of the requirement to successfully pass the high school exit examination to the Board of Education for a pupil with a disability who has taken the high school exit examination with modifications that alter what the test measures and has received the equivalent of a passing score on one or both subject matter parts of the high school exit examination.

The Board may waive the requirement to successfully pass one or both subject matter parts of the high school exit examination for a pupil with a disability if the principal certifies to the Board that the pupil has all of the following:

- 1. An Individualized Education Program (IEP) adopted pursuant to the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. 1400 et seq.) or a plan adopted pursuant to Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 794(a)) in place that requires the modifications to be provided to the pupil when taking the high school exit examination.
- 2. Sufficient high school level coursework either satisfactorily completed or in progress in a high school level curriculum sufficient to have attained the skills and knowledge otherwise needed to pass the high school exit examination.
- 3. An individual score report for the pupil showing that the pupil has received the equivalent of a passing score on the high school exit examination while using a modification that fundamentally alters what the high school exit examination measures as determined by the State Board of Education.

SECOND AMENDMENT TO THE LEASE AGREEMENT BETWEEN ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE VILLA PARK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL RESTORATION CORPORATION (VPESRC)

DESCRIPTION:

The Lease Agreement ("Lease") was originally approved in December 2003 with a five-year term through December 2008. The purpose of the Lease is to facilitate restoration of historic buildings to meet California Field Act requirements and the requirements of the Division of State Architect (DSA) so that the buildings can be used for school classroom purposes. The Lease contains certain milestone dates for completion of fundraising and commencement of construction. The First Amendment to Lease Agreement was approved April 15, 2005 to extend some of the milestone dates.

The Board of Education rejected a request for an additional extension on September 8, 2005 and issued a notice of default to VPESRC on September 9, 2005. VPESRC responded to the Notice of Default on September 26, 2005 and has worked cooperatively with the District to provide information requested and access to the buildings so an independent structural engineering study could be completed. The following activities have occurred since the Notice of Default was issued:

- VPESRC provided preliminary plans along with a structural report and a development plan for the project during October 2005.
- An independent structural engineering report was prepared for the District to determine if the buildings could be used for any purpose and to identify safety concerns.
- A meeting was held with VPESRC to discuss final plans, fundraising timelines and a grant submittal.
- VPESRC submitted a grant application to California Cultural and Historical Endowment (CCHE) on January 31, 2006.

- VPESRC provided schedules for completion of design development and construction documents for submission to DSA and for fundraising to support those activities. A copy of the grant application submitted to CCHE was also provided.
- VPESRC has also requested an extension of deadlines to complete those activities.

Clearly, the challenge of this project has been availability of resources to support the activities necessary to meet the deadlines contained in the Lease. The potential of grant funding would help with the financial challenges. Successful applicants for this grant will be notified by the end of July 2006.

The Second Amendment of the Lease will address the following:

- 1. The "Construction Commencement Deadline" amended to April 30, 2006 will be extended to June 30, 2007.
- 2. The deadline for Submission of Final Plans to DSA amended to November 10, 2005 will be extended to December 31, 2006.
- 3. Financial Security, required by various dates in the Lease Agreement, extended to December 31, 2006, will be a minimum fifty percent (50%) of the total project cost as estimated by the architect.
- 4. Language concerning placement of signs by the Tenant will be limited to the Leased Premises as originally defined in the Lease. (Ref. page 2 of the attached Second Amendment to Lease Agreement)

Approval of this amendment will allow for completion of the grant application process and an opportunity for VPESRC to complete the project within the original term of the Lease.

THIS SECOND AMENDMENT TO LEASE AGREEMENT (the "Second Amendment"), is made and entered into as of March 9, 2006, by and between Orange Unified School District, a California public school district ("Landlord" or "District") and the Villa Park Elementary School Restoration Corporation, a California non-profit corporation ("Tenant"), hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Parties", with reference to the following facts.

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into that certain Lease Agreement ("Lease"), dated as of December 10, 2003, whereby Tenant agreed to restore certain historical buildings designated as Buildings A and B of the original Villa Park Elementary School, located at 10551 Center Drive, in the City of Villa Park, California (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 4.1(c) of the Lease entitled, "Review of Preliminary Plans", no later than ninety (90) days following the expiration of the Fundraising Period which ended December 31, 2004, Tenant was required to provide to Landlord Preliminary Plans setting forth the construction specifications for the improvements to Buildings A and B, and a phasing schedule containing estimated periods of commencement and completion of the construction (collectively the "Development Plan"); and

WHEREAS, in response to the February 18, 2005 request of Tenant, the Parties on April 15, 2005, entered into the First Amendment, to extend by one hundred twenty (120) days the March 31, 2005 deadline to provide the Development Plan for the Improvements, to enable Tenant's architect sufficient time to comply with the requirements of Section 4.1(c) of the Lease; and

WHEREAS, by letter dated July 28, 2005, Tenant requested an additional one hundred eighty (180) day extension to the revised July 29, 2005 deadline to submit the Development Plan for the Improvements, in order to provide Tenant's architect/structural engineer sufficient time to perform additional testing of the Leased Premises; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education for District on September 8, 2005 rejected Tenant's July 28, 2005 extension request, and on September 9, 2005, caused a Notice of Default to be delivered to Tenant, which required that by 4:00 p.m. on Monday, September 26, 2005, either Tenant remedy the default or make arrangements satisfactory to the District for the submittal of the Development Plan, or the Lease would automatically cease and terminate; and

WHEREAS, Tenant timely delivered to the District on September 26, 2005, the proposed Development Plan for the Project in compliance with Section 4.1(c) of the Lease; and

WHEREAS, the Parties have subsequently worked cooperatively to clarify the Development Plan, along with related planning, construction and financial timelines for the Project; and

WHEREAS, by letter dated February 10, 2006, Tenant has requested an extension of various deadlines in the Lease to complete certain activities; and

WHEREAS, consistent with Section 4.1 of the Lease, the Parties may mutually agree in writing to extend the time periods of those conditions precedent to construction set forth in Section 4 of the Lease; and

WHEREAS, the Parties are authorized to amend the Lease pursuant to Section 33 and desire to amend the Lease as stated herein:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. The "Construction Commencement Deadline" set forth in Section 4.1 is extended from April 30, 2006 until June 30, 2007.
- 2. The deadline for Tenant to provide the Final Plans to the Division of the State Architect ("DSA"), as required by Section 4.1(c) of the Lease, shall be the earlier of ten (10) days of receiving Landlord's approval of the Final Plans or December 31, 2006.
 - 3. Section 4.1(1) of the Lease is amended to read:

Tenant shall certify in writing to Landlord no later than December 31, 2006, that Tenant is in possession of financial security equal to a minimum of fifty percent (50%) of the total Project cost, as estimated by the Architect, in the form of cash or in kind contribution. The amount of the aforementioned financial security, as may be required to be adjusted due to required changes in the Final Plans by DSA, shall be provided to Landlord prior to commencement of construction on the Project.

4. With the prior written approval of the District and compliance with all applicable requirements, covenants, conditions, and restrictions set forth in Section 19 of the Lease, Tenant shall be authorized to erect and maintain only on the Leased Premises one four (4) foot by eight (8) foot donation board to advise the public of the major donators of the renovation project.

- 5. Except as expressly amended by this Second Amendment, the Lease, as amended by the First Amendment, shall remain in full force and effect in accordance with its original terms.
- 6. Unless otherwise defined in this Second Amendment, all capitalized terms used herein shall have the same meanings as assigned to them in the Lease and First Amendment.
- 7. This Second Amendment may be executed in two (2) or more counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all of which shall constitute one in the same Lease.

STUDENT TEACHING AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT entered into by and between the State of California through the Trustees of The California State University on behalf of the State University, noted below, all of which are hereinafter called State or State University, and the School District, noted below, hereinafter called the District:

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the District is authorized to enter into agreements with the State, to provide teaching experience through practice teaching to students enrolled in teacher training curricula of the State University; and

WHEREAS, any such agreement may provide for the payment for the services rendered by the District of an amount not to exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined between the parties hereto that the payments to be made to the District under this agreement do not exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered by the District; and

WHEREAS, the honorarium or payment provided herein is intended to be transmitted promptly by the District to the supervising teacher as compensation for and recognition of services performed for the student teacher in the supervisory teacher's charge;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed between the State and the District as follows:

GENERAL TERMS

1. The District shall provide practice teaching in schools and classes to the State University students not to exceed the weeks of practice teaching set forth in the Special Provisions. Such practice teaching shall be provided in such schools or classes of the District and under the direct supervision and instruction of such employees of the District, as the District and the State, through their duly authorized representatives, may agree upon.

The District may, for good cause, refuse to accept for practice teaching any student of the State University assigned to practice teaching in the District, and upon request of the District, made for good cause, the State shall terminate the assignment of any student of the State University to practice teaching in the District.

"Practice teaching" as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means active participation in the duties and functions of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of the District holding valid professional clear or life credential issued by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing, other than emergency or provisional credentials, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the schools or classes in which the practice teaching is provided.

2. The State will pay the District for the performance by the District of all services required to be performed under this agreement at the amount set forth in the Special Provisions.

Each quarter of practice teaching for elementary and secondary schools shall be a full-time practice teaching experience or its equivalent. Student teaching shall normally provide for a full day's experience or its equivalent for five days per week. Any deviation from this definition of assignment must be consistent with State University policy and can be made only with the approval of the State University.

 An assignment of a student of the State University to practice teaching in schools or classes of the District shall be for approximately ten (10) weeks but a student may be given more than one assignment by the State University to practice teaching in such schools or classes.

The assignment of a student of the State University to practice teaching in the District shall be deemed to be effective for purposes of this agreement as of the date the student presents to the proper authorities of the District the placement letter or other document given the student by the State University effecting such assignment, but not earlier than the date of such assignment as shown on such letter or other document.

In the event the assignment of a student of the State University to practice teaching is terminated by the State University for any reason, the District shall receive payment on account of such student only if the Student Teaching assignment extends past a two week period. If such assignment is terminated before the end of the tenth week of the term of the assignment, the State University will pay that prorated portion of Student Teaching assignment that is completed. If a student is assigned by the State University to another teacher of the District after an assignment has become effective, this shall be considered for payment purposes as an entirely new and separate assignment.

Within a reasonable time following the close of each quarter of the State University, the District shall submit an invoice, in triplicate, to the State University for payment, at the rate provided herein, for services provided by the District under and in accordance with this agreement during said quarter. The District shall attach to the invoice a certificate, in triplicate, executed by a duly authorized representative of the District certifying that the District expended or became obligated to expend in providing such practice teaching an amount not less than the amount of the invoice. The State will pay the amount of such invoice from moneys made available for such purpose by or pursuant to the laws of the State.
- 5. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this agreement, the State shall not be obligated by this agreement to pay the District any amount in excess of the total sum set forth in the Special Provisions.
- 6. All Workers' Compensation Insurance shall be at the cost of the University unless otherwise provided herein, and all premiums therefore shall be paid by the University.
