TOPIC: HIGH SCHOOL VALEDICTORIANS – CLASS OF 2006

DESCRIPTION: As graduation season begins for the Class of 2006, students from the District's four comprehensive high schools are being recognized and honored for outstanding scholastic achievement. A key element in the ceremonies that mark graduation day has always been the naming of the class valedictorian. "Valedictorian" is Latin for "the one who delivers the farewell speech." In Orange Unified School District, the valedictorian for each school is selected from the group of students with the highest grade point averages.

This year, three of our high schools have selected valedictorians, while Canyon High School honors all of their seniors graduating Summa Cum Laude or Magna Cum Laude. The student selected to represent this group holds the highest grade point average in this year's senior class.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education congratulate the valedictorians from the District's four comprehensive high schools, recognize their outstanding scholastic achievements, and congratulate their teachers and principals for contributing to the academic achievements of these exceptional students from the Class of 2006.

ACTION ITEMS

TOPIC: **PROPOSED REVISION TO BOARD POLICY 1113 – DISTRICT AND SCHOOL WEB SITES**

DESCRIPTION: Board Policies and Administrative Regulations are routinely reviewed and updated when changes in law occur or when a specific need arises. The Superintendent is charged with the continuous and orderly review of existing policies and regulations, as well as the development of new policies when appropriate.

Board Policy 1113 is being revised to strengthen our practices pertaining to student safety. These changes will allow us to meet the needs of student athletes to facilitate recruiter access to their athletic statistics within district established safety parameters.

Board Bylaw 9311 states: "Prior to adoption, policies shall be given two readings by the Board unless the second reading is waived by Board action. At its second reading, the policy may be adopted by a majority vote of all members of the Board. The Board may waive the second reading and take action or may require additional readings."

The following Board Policy revision is presented for the first reading: BP1113 – District and School Web Sites.

FISCAL IMPACT: This item has no fiscal impact.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education receive Board Policy 1113 – District and School Web Sites – for a first reading.

Community Relations

District and School Web Sites

To enhance communication with students, parents/guardians, staff, community members and the public at large, the Board of Education encourages the development and ongoing maintenance of District and school web sites on the Internet. Web sites shall support the educational vision of the District and shall be consistent with the District's plans for communications and media relations.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop guidelines regarding the content of District and school web sites which shall include standards for the ethical and responsible use of information and technology. These guidelines shall be consistent with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

District and school web sites shall not include content which is obscene, libelous or slanderous, or which creates a clear and present danger of inciting students to commit unlawful acts on school premises, violate school rules or substantially disrupt the school's orderly operation.

Any links to external sites shall follow the same guidelines applicable to District and school web sites.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that copyright laws are not violated in the use of material on District or school web sites.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that web site content protects the privacy rights of students, parents/guardians, staff, Board members and other individuals.

~~Pictures of students, student first name, student projects, student activities and student work shall not appear on OUSD or school web pages without written parent permission.~~

~~Photographs of students shall be used only with written permission from the students' parents/guardians.~~

No student or parents/legal guardian telephone numbers, home or e-mail addresses shall be published on a District or school web page. Student directory information shall not be published if parents/legal guardian requests that it be withheld.

Students in grades 9-12 may have their individual and group photographs, first and last name, and statistical information such as batting average, height and weight posted on District and school web sites unless parents/legal guardian have requested this information not be posted.

Provided that parents/legal guardian has given written permission, students in grades K-8 may have their school work, individual and group photographs and their FIRST NAME only posted on the District and school web site.

BP 1113(b)

Home addresses or telephone numbers of staff members shall not be posted *on District or school web sites*.

District and school web sites shall not post the home address or telephone number of any elected or appointed official without the prior written permission of that individual. (Government Code 6254.21)

~~No public safety officer shall be required as a condition of employment to consent to the use on the Internet of his/her photograph or identity as a public safety officer for any purpose if that officer reasonably believes that the disclosure may result in a threat, harassment, intimidation or harm to the officer or his/her family. (Government Code 3307.5)~~

The Superintendent or designee may establish standards for the design of District and school web sites in order to maintain a consistent identity, professional appearance and ease of use.

Staff and students may submit materials for web site publication to the District or school webmaster who shall ensure that the content adheres to District guidelines and policies.

TOPIC:	PROPOSED BOARD POLICY REVISIONS - 4000 SERIES, ALL PERSONNEL – SECOND READING
DESCRIPTION:	<p>On June 8, 2004, the Board discussed the need for updating the current policy manual and various means of addressing this task. At the July 15, 2004 meeting, the Board approved the law firm, Parker & Covert, to work throughout the 2004-05 school year in conjunction with appropriate staff members to revise or redraft policies, with Parker & Covert providing recommended revisions or redrafting of the policies in question.</p> <p>Parker & Covert has submitted its recommendations in conjunction with appropriate staff members' input for Board consideration. The 4000 Series was presented for a first reading at the May 4, 2006 meeting. (Due to the volume, the 4000 series will be available under separate cover.)</p>
FISCAL IMPACT:	There is no fiscal impact.
RECOMMENDATION:	It is recommended that the Board of Education accept the proposed Board Policy revisions for the 4000 series, All Personnel, for a second and final reading.

TOPIC:	AMENDMENT TO EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND THE SUPERINTENDENT
DESCRIPTION:	As a result of the satisfactory annual evaluation of the Superintendent by the Board of Education, it is recommended that the Agreement for Employment of Superintendent between the Board of Education and Thomas A. Godley be extended to June 30, 2009, and that the Superintendent's annual salary be increased 4.75% effective January 1, 2006.
FISCAL IMPACT:	As per the terms and conditions of the contract.
RECOMMENDATION:	<p>It is recommended the Board of Education enter into a First Amendment to the Employment Agreement between the Board of Education of the Orange Unified School District and Dr. Godley with the following amendments:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. To extend Dr. Godley's contract, presently ending June 30, 2008, to June 30, 20092. That effective January 1, 2006, the District shall provide to Dr. Godley a salary increase of 4.75%3. That all of the other terms and conditions of Dr. Godley's Employment Agreement shall remain in full force and effect4. That the Board President and Clerk are authorized to sign the First Amendment on behalf of the Board of Education.

The system restricts the processing of payment amounts in excess of the issued purchase order.

It should be noted that the purchase order system allows for a one-line description of the services or items to be procured. The issued purchase order forms a contract between the District and the vendor.

Topic: **HIGH PRIORITY SCHOOLS GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION FOR PLANNING GRANT**

Description: Handy Elementary and Prospect Elementary Schools have been invited to participate in the High Priority Schools Grant Program (HPSGP). The High Priority Schools Grant Program is targeted for schools in the decile ranks of 1 – 5 based on the 2005 Base Academic Performance Index (API) who have not previously received funding through the HPSGP, the Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP), or the Comprehensive School Reform (CSR) programs.

The California Department of Education (CDE) will allocate \$50,000 for each school accepting this invitation for assistance to develop a plan designed to improve student learning and school academic performance. Acceptable expenditures of these funds include salaries and benefits for technical assistance with the development of the school plan, release days for planning meetings, substitute costs, teacher and principal training necessary for the development of the school plan, and minimal costs for supplies.

Following the planning process, the integrated HPSGP School Plan or modified SPSA must be submitted to the CDE in order to be considered for funding for the implementation process. The implementation process will provide selected schools with \$400 per student for up to four years.

TOPIC: INFORMATION SERVICES / ED TECH DEPARTMENT REORGANIZATION

The technology issues include services that support Maintenance and Support Operations installations on the network; installation and support of Voice over IP phones and intercoms; modernization projects that require services through the network; growth in state reporting; growing need for relational database management and reporting; schools that are adding new services like wireless networks, video conferencing and security cameras. Because these services run on the network, direct support is shifting from other departments to IS/Ed Tech Department. TOPIC:	SPECIAL EDUCATION NON-PUBLIC SCHOOLS & DESIGNATED INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES- <u>2005-2006</u>

TOPIC: **EXPULSION OF STUDENT: CASE NO. 05-06-51**

DESCRIPTION: Violation of California Education Code 48900 (b), (k) and 48915 (a) (2).

FISCAL IMPACT: The District will not have a loss of ADA for one semester.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education uphold the recommendation that the student be expelled from the schools of the District for one semester, however, the expulsion be conditionally suspended (June 16 2006).

A hearing panel of administrators met on Thursday, May 17, 2006, and determined that a recommendation for expulsion be presented to the Board of Education. The student will be permitted to receive homework for the remaining weeks of school. It was further recommended that the student complete 20 hours of community service validated in writing. It was further recommended that the student continue to attend and complete a counseling program (validated in writing and at no expense to the District) prior to re-enrollment in the OUSD schools in July, 2006. The student is not to have any further violations of school rules, penal codes or education codes. Student and parent/guardian are to meet with the Office of Child Welfare & Attendance prior to enrollment for the 2006-07 school year.
