Dr. Godley announced the passing of Harold Kibbey, OUSD's first superintendent and Orange High School's first principal.

A moment of silence was observed in recognition of Mr. Kibbey and in honor the victims of the Virginia Tech tragedy.

Dr. Godley announced that three out of the five District schools that had applied for Quality Education Investment Act Funds had been selected through a random drawing process. Those schools were Esplanade Elementary, Fairhaven Elementary and Portola Middle Schools.

Dr. Godley announced that Canyon High School was named a California Distinguished School. The Board of Education will officially honor the school at the May 10, 2007 meeting.

Dr. Godley announced that Annie Rice, SACBE representative from Villa Park High School, was accepted at the University of Southern California.

Item 9.1. Recognition of Students, Staff and Community in the Orange High School Attendance Area

Over the next few months, the District will recognize District schools by high school attendance area who have met one or more of the following criteria in their work to improve student academic achievement:

- Met all of their NCLB (AYP) targets.
- Reached or exceeded the state's goal of an API of 800.
- One of the three highest ranked elementary and secondary API schools in the District.
- One of the three highest growth/most improved elementary and secondary schools since the inception of the state testing program.
- One of the top three elementary and secondary schools that have the highest achieving English Learners in the District.
- School's scores reflect movement in closing the achievement gap of their English Learners in English Language Arts.
- One of the top five performing schools in the District on the new science proficiency portion of the STAR test.
- One of the top five performing schools in the District on the new History/Social Science proficiency portion of the STAR test.

Schools in the Orange High School attendance area meeting one or more of these criteria are:

California, Cambridge, Palmyra, West Orange, Portola, Yorba, and Orange High. The Board of Education recognized each school individually with a framed certificate and accompanying letter.

There will be no entry fee for the students made possible by a \$25,000 anonymous donation to the Foundation.

Jan Miller, as OUEA President congratulated the Board on the selections made for senior high school principal and Administrative Director, Special Programs. As a teacher, Mr. Miller commented on the El Rancho science Olympiad team and stated that the secret to success of the team is their head coach, Richard Walker, who retired two years ago but continues to work with the students and has "inspired the kids to greatness."

Item 12.A. Public Hearing Concerning Proposed Dedication and Conveyance of Property off the City of Orange and Resolution No. 26-06-07 Authorizing Dedication and Conveyance of Property at Linda Vista Elementary School to the City of Orange

The City of Orange requested that the District convey a portion of Linda Vista Elementary School fronting along Cannon Street to the City of Orange for the Cannon Street realignment project. The District is authorized to convey the property to the City under Education Code Section 17556. Prior to the conveyance and cording, three steps must be taken per the Code: 1) Board resolution declaring intent to grant the easement; 2) Advertise notice of and conduct a public

hearing; and 3) Second Board resolution conveying the property. The Board of Education approved the resolution of intention to grant dedication on March 29, 2007.

The Board President closed the regular meeting of the Board of Education and opened the public hearing at 8:40 p.m.

Motion No. 109

It was moved by Mr. Ortega, seconded by Mrs. Smith and carried by a vote of 5-1-1 (Abstain: Rocco; Absent: Poutsma) to approve Resolution 26-06-07 authorizing dedication and conveyance of property to the City of Orange for the Cannon Street realignment project.

Item 12.B. Proposed Board Bylaw Revisions – BB 9200, "Board Members," BB 9322, "Agenda/Meeting Materials," – Second Reading

At the March 29, 2007 meeting, Board Bylaws 9200 and 9322 were presented for a first reading. Discussion took place regarding the appeal process for placing an item on the agenda if the Board President decides to not place that item on the agenda. It was Board consensus that a vote of three Board members may grant an appeal.

Mrs. Nichols made two minor changes to the wording on page 15 of the agenda, first paragraph, second line of the italicized quote, the word, "will," should be substituted with the word, "may." On page 18, the same wording in the last paragraph and emboldened, first line, last word, the word, "will," should be changed to "may."

Motion No. 110

It was moved by Mr. Ortega, seconded by Mrs. Smith and carried by a vote of 4-2-1 (No: Ledesma, Rocco; Absent: Poutsma) to accept the proposed Board Bylaw revisions with the revision as noted above for a second and final reading.

Per direction from the Board of Education, the Educational Services staff has been working with the law firm of Parker & Covert to update and revise the 5000 Series pertaining to students. The 5000 Series was presented for a first reading at the February 8, 2007 meeting. Parker & Covert has submitted its recommendations in conjunction with appropriate staff members' input for Board consideration. Due to the volume of the 5000 series, these policies will be presented in two sections. The first section encompasses BP 5000 through BP 5131.9, excluding BP 5131.61,

which will be presented for a first reading under separate cover.

Item 12.D. Proposed Board Policy – BP 5131.61, "Drug Testing – Voluntary," – First Reading

The entire 5000 Series, Students, was presented for a first reading at the February 8, 2007 meeting, except for BP 5131.61 which was deleted for further review.

Laura Zuckovichi, 2598 Falconer Way, Orange, spoke in support of a voluntary drug testing policy for students.

Denise Bittel, 18603 Villa Drive, Villa Park, spoke in support of a voluntary drug testing policy for students.

Motion No. 112

It was moved by Mr. Ortega and seconded by Mrs. Smith to review the proposed Board Policy 5131.61, *Drug Testing – Voluntary*, for a first reading.

Discussion and Comments

Mrs. Moffat stated that she is not in favor of implementing this policy and gave six reasons why she is against it. She added that she has done quite a bit research spanning several years regarding this issue. She elaborated on each point listed below:

- 1) Random drug testing does not work.
- 2) Drug testing is not the proper domain of schools.
- 3) Drug testing costs money that could be used on programs that actually do work.
- 4) Drug testing is controversial and diverts attention from the central issue which keeping

kids safe from alcohol and drugs.

- 5) Schools can and must do their part to teach their students about the dangers of drugs.
- 6) Parents who desire to drug test their children, despite the lack of credible evidence of its effectiveness and despite warnings from professionals; can easily do so at home.

Mrs. Moffat passed out the newsletter of the American Academy of Pediatrics which is one of the national professional organizations that also warn against the dangers of drug testing.

Mrs. Smith commented that she has received community input on this item. She suggested holding a community forum that would include a debate feature with experts on either side, community opinion and all factors that need to be considered before making a decision.

With consensus from the Board, a community forum will be brought forward to include representatives from the community and suggested speakers.

Mrs. Nichols remarked that this is an issue of extreme sensitivity with polarized opinions on both sides. She noted that she would like to potentially revise some of the wording to emphasize that at no point in time can staff require this to be done as part of participation in sports, activities, etc. She added that this is not an OUSD program, but that this policy would provide the tools to communities should they so deem it necessary.

Motion No. 112 carried by a vote of 5-1-1 (No: Rocco; Absent: Poutsma) to review the proposed Board Policy 5131.61, Drug Testing – Voluntary, for a first reading.

Item 14.D. Contract Services Report – Business Services

GKK WORKS M. J. PAONE, AIA, LMA ARCHITECTS, MGPA ARCHITECTS

The District retained the architectural services of **GKK Works**, **M.J. Paone**, **LMA Architects** and **MGPA Architects** for the modernization work at Esplanade ES, Prospect ES, Portola MS and Jordan ES respectively. On August 23, 2006, the State Allocation Board (SAB) approved amendments to the school facility modernization regulations revising the excessive cost hardship grant for accessibility and fire/life safety requirements generating additional funding. Those regulations are being reviewed by the Office of Administrative Law and become effective on May 1, 2007.

As a condition of receiving the additional funding, the District must have documentation generated by the architect of each modernization project and approved by the Division of State Architect (DSA). The documentation will then be submitted to the Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) for approval by the SAB. The District will receive approximately \$1,000,000 in addition to the base modernization grants as a result of the excessive cost hardship grants. This work is in addition to the original modernization contracts and will increase those contracts by the stated amounts.

Canyon HS - Solar Auto - Temecula, CA - May 18 - 20, 2007

The Canyon High School Solar Auto under the direction of their advisor, Glen Wong, will travel to Lake Skinner in Temecula to participate in the 5th Annual Solar Cup 2007. The students will have the opportunity to compete in endurance and sprint races using solar powered boats that they have constructed. Students will learn about conservation of natural resources, electrical and mechanical engineering problem solving while competing against student teams from across California. Thirteen male and five female students will be accompanied by two male and one female adult chaperones. The students and chaperones will camp at the lake and each student will be transported by their own parent. There is no cost to the students. One school day will be missed and no substitute will be required.

McPherson Magnet School Sixth Grade Class – Ocean Institute/Sea Floor Explorer – May 15-16 and May 22-23, 2007

The McPherson Magnet School sixth grade class under the direction of teachers Patricia Marzola, Judy Denenny, and Cathy Priest will travel to the Ocean Institute in Dana Point. Half of the students will participate on the May 15 & 16. The second half will participate on the May 22 & 23. The students will participate in Sea Floor Science Research with nationally renowned science partners – Scripps, Nasa, Texas AM and JPL. They will conduct an underwater excavation of Port Royal which was sunk due to a cataclysmic earthquake. The 25 male and 23 female students will be accompanied by two male and two female adult chaperones. They will travel by District bus and will be housed on site at the Ocean Institute. The cost per student is \$85 and scholarships are available. The students will miss one school day but no substitute will be required.

Villa Park HS – Instrumental Music – San Francisco, CA – May 25 – 28, 2007

Villa Park High School Instrumental Music under the direction of their teacher, Chuck Jay, will travel to San Francisco to perform in various public venues and participate in educational tours. The students will tour a university campus/music department and attend a music clinic at the university. The 23 male and 22 female students will be accompanied by five female and three male adult chaperones. The students will travel by District approved charter buses to San Francisco and will be staying at the Comfort Suites and also the Travelodge in San Luis Obispo. Cost per student is \$350 and scholarships are available. The students will miss one day of school and a substitute will be required. The cost of the substitute will be reimbursed through student body funds.
