Mission Statement

Board Meetings

Regular Board meetings are typically scheduled the second and fourth Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Orange Unified School District Education Center, 1401 North Handy Street, Building H. The purpose of the Board meeting is to conduct business. This is done in **Open Session**. Matters dealing with students and employees are reserved for **Closed Session** to provide confidentiality as required by law. Other Closed Session topics include: pending litigation, property negotiations and collective bargaining issues with employee associations.

Special Board Meetings

Meeting notices for **special meetings** are posted 24 hours in advance of the meeting and shall indicate the business to be transacted at the meeting. No other business shall be considered at the special meeting. The public will be provided an opportunity to address the item described in the notice.

Emergency Board Meetings

When the Board determines that an emergency situation exists, it may call an **emergency meeting**. The Board may hold an emergency meeting without complying with the 24-hour notice or 24-hour posting requirement for special meetings pursuant to Government Code 54956. The Board shall comply with all other requirements for a special meeting during an emergency meeting.

Agendas

Agendas contain a brief description of each item to be discussed or transacted at the meeting. Copies of the agenda are available in the Superintendent's Office, Building B, at the District Education Center or on the web site at **www.orangeusd.k12.ca.us/board/calendar.asp.**

Consent Items are routine in nature and generally require no discussion. These items are acted upon by one motion; however, any such item may be considered separately at a Board member's re uest. Action Items are acted upon separately. Board members may ask questions or request that staff make a presentation before voting on an item. Information/ Discussion Items do not require action by the Board. The Board may take a tion only on those items listed in the printed agenda, except for emergencies.

Any member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the Board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting. The request must be in writing and submitted to the Superintendent at least ten working days before the scheduled meeting date.

Addressing the Board

Persons wishing to address the Board are requested to fill out a "Public Comment" **blue card** available at the meeting on the information table. The "Public Comment" card should be submitted to the Superintendent or the Board Clerk prior to t e start of open session.

Speakers are limited to three (3) minutes per speaker with a maximum of twenty (20) minutes per topic. With Board consent, the Board President may modify the time allowed for public presentation. **Power Point and computer presentations are <u>not</u> allowed.** A speaker may not relinquish his/her time to another. When addressing the Board, speakers are requested to state their name for the record and address the Board from the podium. If the topic has been previously addressed, it is requested that the speaker's remarks be limited to **new points only**.

Speakers will be called upon at t e appropriate time during the meeting. Agenda items may be addressed during the Board's consideration of the item. Items **not on the agenda** that are within the Board's subject matter jurisdiction may be addressed during the "Public Comment" section. Items not on the agenda may not be acted on or discussed by the Board, but will be researched and responded to in any one of the following ways: 1) by telephone after research; 2) by mail after research; or 3) at a subsequent Board meeting as an agenda item.

No boisterous conduct shall be permitted at any Board meeting. Persistent boisterous conduct shall be grounds for summary termination by the Board President of that person's privilege of address.

"Any person who willfully disturbs any public school or any public school meeting is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500)." (CEC § 32210)

Complaints against employees will normally be heard in Closed Session. The District's complaint procedure should be followed before discussion with the Board.

Requests for Information

Requests for information shall be made in writing and submitted to the Superintendent's Office. There is a nominal charge of \$.10 per page for copies of public records.

TOPIC: PROPOSED BOARD POLICY REVISIONS - BP 5116.1,

INTRADISTRICT OPEN ENROLLMENT- SECOND READING

DESCRIPTION: In order to be in compliance with the Categorical Program

requirements, it is necessary to revise and update Board Policy 5116.1 pertaining to intradistrict open enrollment procedures. The proposed Board Policy 5116.1 was presented to the Board of Education on January 15th for a first reading. Tonight it is

being brought back for a second and final reading.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the

proposed Board Policy revisions for the BP 5116.1, *Intradistrict Open Enrollment* procedures for a second and final reading.

Students

IntraDistrict Open Enrollment

The Board of Education desires to provide enrollment options that meet the diverse needs and interests of District students. The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures for the selection and transfer of students among District schools in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

The parents/guardians of any student who resides within District boundaries may apply to enroll their child in any District school, regardless of the location of residence within the District. (Education Code 35160.5)

The Board shall annually review this policy.

Enrollment Priorities

Priority for attendance outside a student's attendance area shall be given as follows:

- 1. If a District school receiving Title I funds is identified for program improvement, corrective action or restructuring, all students enrolled in that school shall be provided an option to transfer to another District school or charter school.
- 2. Beginning in the 2003-04 school year, if while on school grounds a student becomes a victim of a violent criminal offense, as defined by the State Board of Education, or attends a school designated by the California Department of Education as persistently dangerous, he/she shall be provided an option to transfer to another District school or charter school.
- 2. <u>If while on school grounds a student becomes the victim of a violent criminal offense, he/she shall be provided an option to transfer to another district school or charter school.</u>
- 3. If a student attends a school designated by the California Department of Education as "persistently dangerous," he/she shall be provided an option to transfer to another district school or charter school.
- 4. The Superintendent or designee may approve a student's transfer to a District school that is at capacity and otherwise closed to transfers upon finding that special circumstances exist that might be harmful or dangerous to the student in the current attendance area, including, but not limited to, threats of bodily harm or threats to the emotional stability of the student. To grant priority under these circumstances, the Superintendent or designee must have received either: (Education Code 35160.5)
 - a. A written statement from a representative of an appropriate state or local agency, including but not limited to a law enforcement official or social worker, or a properly licensed or registered professional, including, but not limited to, a psychiatrist, psychologist or marriage and family therapist.

- b. A court order, including a temporary restraining order and injunction.
- 5. Priority may be given to siblings of students already in attendance in that school.
- 6. Priority shall be given to students whose parent/guardian is assigned to that school as his/her primary place of employment.

For all other applications for enrollment outside a student's school attendance area, the Superintendent or designee shall use a random, unbiased selection process to determine who shall be admitted whenever a school receives admission requests that are in excess of the school's capacity.

Enrollment decisions shall not be based on a student's academic or athletic performance, except that existing entrance criteria for specialized schools or programs may be used provided that the criteria are uniformly applied to all applicants. Academic performance may be used to determine eligibility for, or placement in, programs for gifted and talented students.

No student currently residing within a school's attendance area shall be displaced by another student transferring from outside the attendance area. (Education Code 35160.5)

Transportation ·

Except as required by 20 USC 6316, for transfers out of Title I program improvement schools, the District shall not be obligated to provide transportation for students who attend school outside their attendance area. However, upon request, the Superintendent or designee may authorize transportation contingent upon available space and funds. Priority for any such transportation shall be based on demonstrated financial need.

WHEREAS, the District has adopted a plan for the purchase of standards-aligned instructional materials in accordance with the subdivision (a) but the plan indicated an alternate date for compliance that is declared in the request for additional time; and

4. Education Code or California Code of Regulations section to be waived.

EC 60422. (a) A local governing board shall use funding received pursuant to this chapter to ensure that each pupil is provided with a standards-aligned textbook or basic instructional materials, as adopted by the State Board of Education subsequent to the adoption of content standards pursuant to Section 60605 for kindergarten and grades 1 to 8, inclusive, or as adopted by the local governing board pursuant to Sections 60400 and 60411, for grades 9 to 12, inclusive. Pupils shall be provided with standards-aligned textbooks or basic instructional materials by the beginning of the first school term that commences no later than 24 months after those materials were adopted by the State Board of Education.

5. Desired outcome/rationale. Give a general description of what adoption you want to postpone and the reason: Orange Unified School District (OUSD) is requesting a one-year postponement of the adoption of new instructional materials for Elementary K-6 Mathematics and K-8 English/Language Arts. Mathematics would be extended from Fall 2009 to Fall 2010 and English/Language Arts would be extended from Fall 2010 to Fall 2011. This would extend the use of our current standards-aligned, state approved textbooks from 7 years to 8 years. This waiver would allow OUSD to address several issues.

OUSD is undergoing significant changes in staffing due to the State fiscal crisis. Class size reduction program has been removed in 3rd grade. Kindergarten has moved to option 2. Many teachers took advantage of an early retirement incentive increasing the number of new teachers being hired. Therefore many of the teachers have been reassigned to new grade levels or subjects areas that they have never previously taught or have not taught in many years. Many teachers are addressing larger class sizes thus needing new teaching strategies and additional staff development. Additionally, the district's instructional services support staff, i.e. resource teachers and instructional coaches, have had their time reallocated thus reducing staff at some schools. OUSD's steadily rising state test scores demonstrate the district's commitment to teacher quality and standards-aligned instruction. Our textbook adoption processes are comprehensive, including review of essential standards, analysis of student data, extensive review of new resources, and multi-year implementation support. The District is currently fully involved in the implementation of the Elementary K-6 Science adoption and the Middle School 6-8 Mathematics adoption in school year 2008-2009.

In 2008-2009, OUSD is focusing our limited staff development resources to support the Elementary K-6 Science adoption implementation and to support Middle School Grades 6-8 Mathematics adoption implementation activities. The State fiscal crisis and limited staff development funds and personnel make this focus impossible if OUSD must also initiate the adoption process for Elementary K-6 Mathematics. The 12-month extension in Mathematics necessitates a 12-month extension for English/Language Arts to avoid the adoption of textbooks in two curricular areas in the same year. A one year delay in the Elementary Mathematics K-6 adoption and ELA K-8 adoption would provide a much needed opportunity for the district to regroup financially and programmatically in order to be ready to successfully and fully implement the new adoptions.

McPherson Magnet School in grades K-5 is currently using Everyday Math copyright 2002. McPherson Magnet School received a waiver for the period 8/2006- 6/2008 from the California Department of Education.

Orange Unified School District has 29 K-6 elementary schools including one K-8 magnet school and 2 of OUSD's middle schools that also house a portion of the 6th grade students in that attendance area. Thus 6th grade students at the middle schools use texts that are adopted at the same time as 7-8. The chart below indicates this by including "elementary" and "middle school" as appropriate.

With the approval of this waiver, OUSD will follow the following schedule:

Attachment A: Desired Outcome/Rationale for Waiver

I. Responses to the Statutory Criteria for Waiver Approval:

EC 60422(c) The State Board of Education <u>may grant the school district additional time</u> to meet the purchasing requirements of subdivision (a) if the governing board of the school district demonstrates, to the satisfaction of the state board, that all of the following criteria apply to the district:

1. The school district has implemented a well-designed, standards-aligned basic instructional materials program.

The K-8 grades in the Orange Unified School District are divided into elementary schools and middle schools. Most elementary schools contain grades K-6, therefore textbook adoptions for the elementary division service those grade levels. Three of the four middle schools one being a K-8 school also have a small number of sixth grade students because of space limitations at a feeder elementary school. Therefore middle school adoptions also include grade 6 at those schools.

Adoption Process for Elementary K-6

- A content area specific committee of teachers is formed by the Curriculum Coordinator in the spring. Teachers submit an application and are selected based on principal recommendation, grade level experience, and subject area competence. The committee is balanced by grade level, experience level, and teaching location. Site administrators are invited to participate as well.
- The committee meets to
 - o discuss data that will impact the adoption,
 - o determine criteria for selection,
 - o establish a timeline for adoption components.
- The committee and site administrators hear presentations by each of the publishers on the state list that submitted programs for grades K-6.
- The committee meets in grade levels to peruse the submitted programs, using the criteria established by the committee.
- The publishers are narrowed to two; these two publishers are asked to allow their materials to be piloted by a cadre of teachers from the District.
- Approximately 50 teachers pilot **both** programs for approximately one quarter each, gathering comments and evidence as they use each.
- Piloting teachers conduct grade level forums for all teachers in the District, sharing their experience and evidence obtained during the pilot period relating to each program.
- Publishers deliver sample materials to each elementary school site for review by all teachers and interested parents.
- Publishers offer a presentation to teachers and administrators at a central location.
 - o An evaluation ballot, prepared by the committee, is provided to each teacher to use.
 - o Each teacher submits an individual ballot for tallying.
- The program receiving the majority of ballots is proposed to the Instructional Materials Advisory Committee and to the Board of Education for approval.
- Sufficient textbooks are purchased to meet needs of each student.

Adoption Process for Middle School 6-8

- A content area specific committee of teachers is formed by the Curriculum Coordinator in the spring comprised of the department chairs of the subject under consideration.
- The committee meets to
 - o discuss data that will impact the adoption,
 - o determine criteria for selection,
 - o establish a timeline for adoption components.
- The committee hears presentations by each of the publishers on the state list that submitted middle school programs for grades 6-8.
- Publishers deliver sample materials to each middle school site for review by all teachers.
 - An evaluation ballot, prepared by the committee, is provided to each teacher to use.

- Each teacher submits an individual ballot for tallying.
- Presentations by the publishers to all affected teachers may be scheduled as desired.
- The program receiving the majority of ballots is proposed to the Instructional Materials Advisory Committee and to the Board of Education for approval.
- Sufficient textbooks are purchased to meet needs of each student.

II. Assessment Information: STAR and local assessments in the particular subject matter

OUSD's Academic Performance Index (API) for 2007 was 783 and 2008 had a slight growth of API to 787, which demonstrates an upward movement toward the state target of 800 (Local Document #4). However, there has been a district wide longitudinal growth of 83 API points from 2002-2008 (as illustrated in Local Document #5). There are 24 out of 40 district schools that are approaching 800 API points, or have met or exceeded their 2008 API Growth Targets (see Local Document #6).

The percent of students achieving the state target of proficient or above on the California Standards Tests (CST) in the core areas of English/Language Arts and Mathematics maintained continuous growth from 2002 thru 2008 (see Local Document #7).

III Summary Rationale: Request for an Alternative Date of Compliance for EC 60422(a)

Orange Unified School District is requesting a twelve a month extension of the Elementary K-6 Mathematics adoption, which necessitates a twelve a month extension of the K-8 English/Language Arts adoption the following year. This waiver will allow OUSD to address several issues:

- Focus of limited staff development resources: OUSD's limited staff development funds and
 personnel are currently focused on the Elementary K-6 science and Middle School Grades 6-8
 Mathematics adoption implementations. With the State's fiscal crisis, limited staff development funds
 and personnel, it would be virtually impossible for OUSD to initiate the Elementary K-6 Mathematics
 adoption followed by the K-8 English/Language Arts adoption to maintain the high quality of staff
 development and support during adoption needed by the teachers.
- Significant teaching and support staff changes: As a result of the state fiscal crisis, OUSD is experiencing significant changes in staffing including instructional services support. As a result of the removal of class-size reduction in third grade classes and Option 2 in Kindergarten, and a large number of recent retirees, many teachers are facing larger classes, different grade levels or subject areas, requiring additional staff development and support. The new teachers also require additional staff development. The district's instructional services support staff, i.e. resource teachers

and instructional coaches, have had their time reallocated thus reducing staff at some schools, making it difficult to assist the teachers to meet these challenges.

- demonstrate the district's commitment to teacher quality and standards-aligned instruction. The district has State approved standards aligned textbooks for every student in all grades to use in the classroom and to use for homework. The district meets the Williams requirements in all core subject areas (Education Code 60119). Additional Mathematics and English/Language Arts textbooks will be available during the extended year of use due to declining enrollment at some schools.
- **District IMFRP:** Extending the adoption timeline by one year for Elementary K-6 Mathematics and one year for K-8 English/Language Arts will provide the necessary time for OUSD to save and carry over IMFRP funds so that OUSD will have sufficient funds to purchase the Elementary K-6 Mathematics and the K-8 English/Language Arts adoptions. Because of the purchase of newly adopted Science textbooks along with other textbook/workbook needs totaling approximately \$2.6 million, OUSD will not have sufficient IMFRP funds to purchase the Mathematics and Language Art adoptions. Postponement of one year for Mathematics adoption and one year for English/Language Arts will provide OUSD with the time needed to have sufficient IMFRP funds to purchase the adoptions on the newly proposed timeline.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Orange Unified School District adamantly opposes further cuts to education funding and urges the Legislature and Governor to immediately solve the budget crisis with a balanced approach; and

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RESOLUTION NO. 27-08-09: APPROVAL OF BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION PLANS [HUGHES BILL] MANDATED COST CLAIM SETTLEMENT AND AGREEMENT TO WAIVE FUTURE CLAIMS

DESCRIPTION:

The Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim Settlement settles the test claim CSM-4464 initiated by San Diego Unified School District, Butte County Office of Education, and San Joaquin County Office of Education, and the related Sacramento Superior Court case, case No. 03CS01432, regarding reimbursement for costs associated with behavioral intervention plans required by the Hughes Bill statute and regulations under state law. If approved, it ends a 14-year dispute with the State of California regarding funding for state behavioral intervention plan requirements that are in excess of federal law.

The settlement provides \$520 million in reimbursement for past costs associated with behavioral intervention plans and \$65 million annually for ongoing costs. The Legislature's obligation to fund the settlement is contingent on 85% of all districts, county offices of education, and special education local plan areas constituting 92% of statewide ADA waiving their rights to file additional mandated cost claims on the current Hughes Bill statute and regulations.

The Board of Education previously received a copy of the Notice to LEA's and the Settlement and Release Agreement for review.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Orange Unified School District will receive \$29,452.85 in 2009-10 plus \$10.92 per special education ADA annually under the terms of this settlement. Retroactive reimbursement for Orange Unified School District will be \$2,407,348.55, received in six equal installments of \$401,224.76 beginning in 2011-12.

RECOMMENDATION:

RESOLUTION NO. 27-08-09

GOVERNING BOARD OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT and of the ORANGE UNIFIED SPECIAL EDUCATION LOCAL PLAN AREA (Single District SELPA)

RESOLUTION FOR APPROVAL OF BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION PLANS [HUGHES BILL] MANDATED COST CLAIM SETTLEMENT AND AGREEMENT TO WAIVE FUTURE CLAIMS

WHEREAS, the Commission on State Mandates ("the Commission"), in a test claim known as the Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim, has determined that, since 1993, there are unfunded state mandates exceeding the federal requirements in the following seven (7) components of the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations (California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052): special education local plan area ("SELPA") plan requirements, development and implementation of behavioral intervention plans, functional analysis assessments, modifications and contingent behavioral intervention plans, development and implementation of emergency interventions, prohibited behavioral intervention plans, and due process hearings;

WHEREAS, these state mandates remain required components of the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations;

WHEREAS, final claiming instructions for the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim were never adopted by the Commission due to various disputes that arose with the State;

WHEREAS, the State's Department of Finance disputes that any of the identified Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim mandates qualify for state reimbursement because it contends they are required by federal law, and therefore the State has filed a lawsuit with the Sacramento Superior Court, case No. 03CS01432, to contest the Commission's decision in the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim;

WHEREAS, the Test Claimants believe that the identified mandates require new programs and increased levels of service in excess of federal law, and are therefore unfunded state mandates, and therefore the Test Claimants oppose the court action filed by the State challenging the Commission's decision:

WHEREAS, this litigation could thwart resolution of these matters for a number of years;

WHEREAS, to avoid the cost and uncertainty of further litigation, to alleviate the uncertainty regarding the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations funding, and to expedite the resolution of this long-pending mandate claim, the State and the Test Claimants ("Parties") have determined to compromise and settle the claims set forth in the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim;

WHEREAS, the Parties have negotiated a settlement agreement ("Agreement"), which provides \$520 million as general fund reimbursement for past costs associated with the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, allocated as follows:

- \$510 million to school districts based on 2007-08 P-2 average daily attendance ("ADA") (about \$14.85 per ADA annually for six years, beginning in 2011-12, or for a lesser period at the State's discretion should the State choose to accelerate payment of such reimbursement);
- \$1.5 million to county offices of education in 2009-10 based on December 2007 county special education pupil count, about \$35.06 per pupil, with no county office of education receiving less than \$5,000;
- \$6 million to SELPAs in 2009-10 based on December 2007 special education pupil count, about \$8.85 per pupil, with no SELPA receiving less than \$10,000; and
- \$2.5 million in 2009-10 for administrative costs incurred in pursuing the Claim;

WHEREAS, the settlement further provides \$65 million as a permanent increase to the AB 602 funding base for special education programs and services beginning in 2009-10, resulting in each SELPA's funding rate increasing by about \$10.92 per ADA, with this amount increasing by the cost of living adjustment and ADA growth in subsequent years;

WHEREAS, by approving this settlement the Orange Unified School District will receive approximately \$2,407,348.55 [total] in discretionary funding for retroactive reimbursement, \$401,224.76 [amount of installment] over six-years in equal installments [districts only], unless the State, in its discretion, accelerates payment of such reimbursement, and the Orange Unified SELPA will receive approximately \$29,452.85 [total] in discretionary funding for retroactive reimbursement;

WHEREAS, the Orange Unified School District and SELPA, in exchange for the foregoing financial settlement, must waive rights to file any further mandate claims arising from the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, or to benefit from any new Hughes Bill Statue and Regulations claims filed, unless the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations change;

WHEREAS, if for some reason the settlement process is not completed, the Waiver will not take effect;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Orange Unified School District also serves as the Governing Board of the Orange Unified SELPA;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Orange Unified School District and SELPA has reviewed the Notice to LEAs Re: Pending Settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim and the required Waiver; and

WHEREAS, the District and SELPA administrative staff, having reviewed the terms of the pending settlement, recommends that the Governing Board approve the settlement and agree to waive rights to file mandated cost claims arising from the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations in the future or to benefit from such claims unless the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations change;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Governing Board of the

Orange Unified School District, sitting also as the Governing Board of the SELPA, approves the terms of the pending settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim, agrees to waive its rights regarding claims as set forth in the attached Waiver both with respect to the school district and with respect to the SELPA, and authorizes the Superintendent [or Associate/Assistant Superintendent (as appropriate)] to sign the required Waiver on behalf of both entities and to deliver it as requested by no later than February 28, 2009, and to complete any other administrative task necessary to effectuate this decision.

- 2. LEA certifies that it has read the following provisions of California Civil Code Section 1542:

"A general release does not extend to claims which the creditor does not know or suspect to exist in his favor at the time of executing the release, which if known by him must have materially affected his settlement with the debtor."

- LEA understands that it is agreeing that California Civil Code section 1542 does not apply to this Waiver. LEA understands and acknowledges that the significance and consequence of this waiver of California Civil Code section 1542 is:

LEA further acknowledges and represents that, in executing this Waiver, it has not relied on any inducements, promises, or representations other than those stated in the Notice and Waiver.

E. Contingency of Waiver

LEA understands that this Waiver is binding only if the preconditions to the full implementation of the Settlement Agreement are satisfied. Those preconditions are set out in Section C of the Notice and Section II.A. of the Agreement, and are, in brief: (1) at least 85% of all LEAs sign this Waiver, including school districts and county offices of education who served student populations accounting for 92% of the P-2 2007-08 ADA; (2) the parties seek a superior court ruling that the settlement is final and binding on all LEAs; and (3) legislation is enacted appropriating the necessary funding and placing ongoing funding in statute.

APPROVAL OF E-RATE CONTINGENT NETWORK EQUIPMENT CONTRACTS - FUNDING YEAR 12: JULY 1, 2009 – JUNE 30, 2010

DESCRIPTION:

In accordance with the federally funded E-rate program, an application has been submitted for network equipment. A competitive Request for Proposal process was conducted calling for qualified vendors. The E-Rate contracts will be conditional upon Year 12 E-rate funding, and the District's willingness and continued ability to fund the discounted E-rate project costs.

Network Equipment

For E-rate Funding Year 12, it is anticipated that ten schools will participate in the program and will qualify for discounts of 89%. The schools are California, Esplanade, Fairhaven, Handy, Jordan, Lampson, Orange HS, Portola, Sycamore, and Yorba MS. E-rate discounts are applied to the full price of eligible services, and the District is responsible for paying the remaining costs after E-rate discounts are applied by the School & Libraries Division (SLD). The eligible services will provide upgraded routers, wireless access points and VOIP (Voice-Over-Internet Protocol) equipment.

The District issued a Request for Proposals on network equipment for the ten schools as listed above. The District received two responsive proposals. The proposals were evaluated by District staff and award is recommended to AT&T. The total project cost is \$182,638 with a possible E-Rate Discount of \$129,534. The total District match for all ten sites will not exceed \$54.000.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Not to exceed \$54,000.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the E-rate contracts contingent on the District's continued ability to meet the discounted match.

SECOND QUARTER REPORT OF UNIFORM COMPLAINTS FOR THE WILLIAMS CASE SETTLEMENT

DESCRIPTION:

As a result of the State of California's settlement of the Williams class action lawsuit, Education Code section 35186 requires school districts to do two things: 1) provide an opportunity to file formal complaints under the District's Uniform Complaint Procedures; and 2) report to the Board of Education and the public four times a year the number of complaints filed and the area of the settlement they target.

The Second Quarter Report covers the number of Uniform Complaints received by the District under the three areas governed by the Williams Case Settlement for the period of October – December 2007. The three targeted areas are:

- 3. Teacher vacancy and misassignment

No Uniform Complaints for any area have been reported during the second quarter for the Williams Case Settlement.

CONTRACT SERVICES REPORT - EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

DESCRIPTION:

The following is a report of contract service items for Educational Services.

SCHOLASTIC READ 180

READ 180 is a research-based, intensive reading intervention program for readers below proficient level. This program strategically addresses individual student needs through adaptive and instructional software, high interest literature and direct instruction in reading and writing skills. READ 180 includes the following key instructional components:

- A 90-minute instructional model consisting of 20 minutes of whole-group instruction, 60 minutes of small-group rotations, including READ 180 software, small-group direct instruction, and modeled and individual reading, and concludes with 10 minutes of whole-group wrap up;
- Systematic instruction in reading, writing, and vocabulary to the whole class;
- Students use the software independently, providing them with intensive, individualized skills practice;
- Students build reading comprehension skills through modeled and independent reading of READ 180 paperbacks and audio books on CD; and
- Addresses individual needs through READ 180 high-interest literature at students' reading levels.

The Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) grant will fund 30 READ 180 licenses with staff training at a cost of \$32,864 per school for the following schools: Lampson, West Orange and Jordan. The total cost is \$98,591 to be paid in two payments over two school years.

FOLLETT DESTINY LIBRARY

The District will renew the existing agreement with Follett to provide the Destiny Library and Textbook Manager, Maintenance and Support software. Follett's Destiny Library and Textbook Manager is a centralized, web based library automation system that provides school access from any computer in the District with an internet browser. The renewal agreement will be effective from March 2009 to March 2010.

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MAUREEN ALLEN

Maureen Allen, retired Orange County Department of Education Math and Science Coordinator, will provide a one-day science workshop for 5th grade teachers on March 19. The presentation will provide specific review content for teachers preparing their students for the State Science Test.

SANTIAGO CANYON COLLEGE SCHOLASTIC APTITUDE TEST (SAT) PREPARATION WORKSHOP The Santiago Canyon College will conduct Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) Preparation workshops on February 21 and 28 and on April 18 and 25. The workshops will assist up to ten students per event with SAT preparation. The students will review all subsections of the SAT (Math, Reading, and Writing) and also review test taking strategies. The workshop is being offered to students in the Title VII Native American Education Program who are preparing to apply for college and need assistance in preparing for the SAT. The cost of \$94 per student for each workshop will be funded by the Title VII Native American Education Program.

DESCRIPTION

<u>Villa Park HS - Junior Statesmen of America - Pasadena, CA - February 21-22, 2009</u>

Villa Park High School's Junior Statesmen of America (JSA) under the direction of teacher. Paul Hunt, will travel to Pasadena to participate in the annual JSA Congress Conference 2009. Students will gain first-hand experience in a mock Congress atmosphere. Legislation written and passed by students offers infinite knowledge in the academic areas of United States History, Government, Economics, Politics and Constitutional Law. Seven male and six female students will be accompanied by one male and one female adult chaperone and will stay at The Westin Hotel, Parents will provide transportation for their Pasadena. student. Parents will have a District driving permit on file prior to this trip. The cost per student is \$110, paid by JSA Students will not miss any school days and a substitute will not be required.

<u>Villa Park HS - Foreign Language Immersion Camp</u> (German) - Big Bear, CA - March 6-8, 2009

Villa Park High School's Foreign Language Department under the direction of teacher, Elizabeth Strauss, will travel to Big Bear to participate in a German Language Immersion Camp. Students will have the opportunity to converse with students from other schools, speaking German only. Five male students and five female students will be accompanied by one male and one female adult chaperones and will stay at the Presbyterian Conference Center, Big Bear. Parents will provide transportation for their student to Esperanza High School where students will board and travel by Silver State Coach, arranged by the District's Transportation Department. The cost per student is \$140, paid through ASB funds, and scholarships are available. The students will miss one day of school. A substitute will be required. The cost for the substitute will be reimbursed by ASB funds.

Villa Park HS - Foreign Language Immersion Camp (French) - Big Bear, CA - April 24-26, 2009

Villa Park High School's Foreign Language Department under the direction of teacher, Fatima Pazargadi, will travel to Big Bear to participate in a French Language Immersion Camp. Students will have the opportunity to converse with other students from outside schools, speaking French only.

Five male students and five female students will be accompanied by one male and one female adult chaperones and will stay at the Presbyterian Conference Center, Big Bear. Parents will provide transportation for their student to Esperanza High School where students will board and travel by Silver State Coach, arranged by the District's Transportation Department. The cost per student is a \$140, paid through ASB funds, and scholarships are available. The students will miss one day of school. A substitute will be required. The cost for the substitute will be reimbursed by ASB funds.

Canyon Rim ES - 5th Grade Riley's Farm March 15-16, 2009
The fifth grade students from Canyon Rim Elementary
School will travel to Riley's Farm on March 15-16. The
students will have the opportunity to participate in a "living
history adventure tour." Students will be re-enacting past
events in America's history, with special attention to the
Revolutionary War. Participation in this trip aligns to the
California Standards for 5th grade History/Social Studies.
Students attending the program are responsible for the
program cost. The student cost may be supplemented by
funds donated from individual parent organizations. The
cost is \$130 per student and scholarships are available.

<u>Prospect ES - 6th Grade Outdoor Science School</u> Creekside Site - March 16-20, 2009

The 6th grade students from Prospect Elementary will participate in the Orange County Department of Education's Outdoor Science School program. This five-day program provides students an opportunity to study science in a natural setting. The curriculum correlates to the 6th grade science standards. Students attending the program from each participating school are responsible for the program cost. The student cost may be supplemented by funds donated from individual parent organizations. The cost will not exceed \$175 per student and scholarships are available. No substitute will be required.

Imperial ES - 6th Grade Outdoor Science School -Arbolado Site - March 16-20, 2009

The 6th grade students from Imperial Elementary will participate in the Orange County Department of Education's Outdoor Science School program. This five-day program provides students an opportunity to study science in a natural setting. The curriculum correlates to the 6th grade science standards. Students attending the program from each participating school are responsible for the program cost. The student cost may be supplemented by funds

donated from individual parent organizations. The cost will not exceed \$325 per student and scholarships are available. A substitute will be required for the teacher from the special education class to teach the fourth and fifth grade students remaining at school.

<u>Villa Park HS - Boys Golf Team - Myrtle Beach, SC April 8-12, 2009</u>

Villa Park High School's Boys Golf Team under the direction of coach, Chris Salio, will travel during spring break to Myrtle Beach to participate in the Spring Palmetto High School Golf Championship. Students will compete against high school students from across the United States and Canada. Thirteen male students will be accompanied by four male adult chaperones. The group will travel by Continental Air Lines from Los Angeles and will stay at the Sea Trail Plantation, Myrtle Beach. The cost per student is \$1,100 and scholarships are available. Students will not miss any school days. No substitute will be required.

<u>Villa Park HS - Boys Tennis Team - Ojai, CA - April 22-25, 2009</u>

Villa Park High School's Boys Tennis Team under the direction of coach, Mike Lee, will travel to Ojai to participate in the Ojai Tennis Tournament. Three varsity players will compete in this PAC 10 tournament. The entire team will have the opportunity to compete against high level teams from throughout the state. Sixteen male students will be accompanied by eight male adult chaperones and will stay at the Villa Ojai. Students will travel by van. The cost per student is \$275 and scholarships are available. Students will miss two days of school. A substitute will be required and funded by boosters.

El Modena HS Choir - Hollywood, CA - May 8-9, 2009

El Modena High School's Choir, under the direction of teacher, Tracy Solis, will travel to Hollywood to participate in the Music in the Parks Festival. Students will have an opportunity to perform in a positive adjudicated national festival setting and will perform with students from around the country. Adjudication by college level music educators will provide valuable insight on performance and practices. Twenty-six female and fourteen male students will be accompanied by one male and four female adult chaperones and will stay at the Hilton, Universal City. Transportation will be provided by District bus and funded by the choir department and ASB funds. The cost per student is \$165 and scholarships are available. Students will miss a half day of school. No substitute will be required.

<u>Canyon HS - Solar Auto - Lake Skinner - Temecula, CA - May 14-17, 2009</u>

Canyon High School's Solar Auto students under the direction of teacher, Jim Donovan, will travel to Lake Skinner to participate in the 2009 Annual Solar Cup, competing with a solar electric boat built by students on campus. Twelve male and eight female students will be accompanied by three male and three female adult chaperones. The students will camp at Lake Skinner. Parents will provide transportation for their student and any parent driving a student other than their own will have an approved District driver certificate on file prior to this trip. There is no cost per student. Students will miss one school day. No substitute will be required.

<u>Lampson ES - 6th Grade Outdoor Science School - Cedar</u> Crest, Running Springs - March 16 - 20, 2009

The 6th grade students from Lampson Elementary School will participate in the Orange County Department of Education's Outdoor Science School program on March 16-20. This five-day program is an extension to the science curriculum taught in the classroom. Students attending the program from each participating school are responsible for the program cost. There is no impact to the general fund. The classroom teacher applied for and was awarded a grant from the "Inside the Outdoors Program", which funded the cost of \$320 per student to attend this program. Each student is responsible for the transportation cost of \$15 per student. This student cost may be supplemented by funds donated from individual parent organizations. No substitute will be required.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Receipt of restricted categorical fund monies and unrestricted donated funds.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the study trips as presented.

COURSE APPROVALS: ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE, INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS and SOCIETIES, TRIGONOMETRY/STATISTICS, CHINESE II, VIDEO GAME DESIGN II, JEWELRY I

DESCRIPTION:

The new course outlines described below have been reviewed by the District's Curriculum Department, site Instructional leadership teams, and site administrators and are recommended to the Board of Education for approval.

NEW COURSES

- Environmental Science is designed to emphasize the use of an ecosystem concept in the study of environmental problems. This will be accomplished by learning basic information regarding interrelations of the ecosystem and applying this information in problem solving. The importance of conservation and preservation will be discussed within the constraints dictated by human development and human needs. Environmental Science is an interdisciplinary science; it embraces a wide variety of disciplines, including geology, biology, earth science, environmental science and geography.
- International Baccalaureate (IB) **Environmental Systems and Societies** is intended to provide a coherent perspective of the interrelationships between environmental systems and societies: one that enables them to adopt an informed personal response to the wide range of pressing environmental issues that they will face. Students' attention will be drawn to their own relationship with their environment and the significance of choices and decisions that they make in their own lives. It is intended that students develop a sound understanding of the interrelationships between environmental systems and societies, rather than a pure journalistic appreciation of environmental issues.
- Trigonometry/Statistics is designed to be a rigorous mathematical elective and the next course in the sequence for students who have completed Algebra II. The first semester of the course provides a thorough study of trigonometry. The major themes will be the trigonometric functions, angles and the unit circle, equations and identities, graphs and applications.

OUSD/Reider/Stoterau Board Agenda February 12, 2009 The second semester is designed to introduce students to the important concepts of Statistics and Probability. The major themes will be exploratory analysis, graphs, random variables and distributions (including the Normal Distribution), confidence intervals and inference about the mean and proportion.

- Chinese II is designed to continue developing vocabulary, deepening the understanding of word formation and sentence structure of the Chinese language, and to further develop listening, speaking, and writing skills. Cultural topics will also be addressed.
- Video Game Design II is an advanced, comprehensive, self-contained, fully computer integrated one-year course with a final project or internship as a culminating activity. This course utilizes project-based learning to develop 2D and 3D PC, web mobile device (i.e., cell phone), and DDR (Interactive Dance, Dance Revolution) games. In addition, students will demonstrate knowledge of artificial intelligence with robotics. Students will demonstrate their practical programming skills introduced in the Video Game Design I, such as object-oriented programming using logical data structures, sequences, Boolean logic, loops, lists, arrays, functions, methods, and graphics. The class will provide a solid foundation of programming skills which will carry over into future college-level computer science courses. This course is part of Canyon High School's Digital Reality Entertainment Arts and Media (DREAM) grant requirements.
- Jewelry I is an exploratory course in three-dimensional design which develops understanding of art principles and technical skills that are necessary to create effective jewelry. Emphasis will be on original, creative design and appropriate use of materials.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Education authorize the Superintendent or designee to approve the courses presented by the District's Curriculum Council.

PARTICIPATION IN THE COUNTY-WIDE EXPULSION PLAN FOR ORANGE COUNTY

DESCRIPTION:

On June 20, 1997, the Orange County Board of Education approved the "County-Wide Expulsion Plan." This plan provides educational services for all expelled students in Orange County. The plan was developed in conjunction with the 28 school districts in Orange County.

Each district's governing board adopted an expulsion plan for their respective district to fulfill the requirements of Education Code 48926.

Education Code 48916.1 requires an update to the plan be sent to the Superintendent of Public Instruction every three years. The most recent update was submitted in February 2006.

The office of Child Welfare and Attendance processes the District's expulsions and recommends continued participation in the "County-Wide Expulsion Plan" and in the triennial update to be submitted to the Orange County Department of Education by March 20, 2009. The update is due to the California Department of Education by June 30, 2009.

Copies of the plan have been provided to the Board of Education and are available for review in the Educational Services Department.

It is recommended that the Board of Education authorize the Superintendent or designee to approve the District's participation in the county-wide expulsion plan for Orange County.
