#### **Mission Statement**

### **Board Meetings**

**Regular Board meetings** are typically scheduled the second and fourth Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Orange Unified School District Education Center, 1401 North Handy Street, Building H. The purpose of the Board meeting is to conduct business. This is done in **Open Session**. Matters dealing with students and employees are reserved for **Closed Session** to provide confidentiality as required by law. Other Closed Session topics include: pending litigation, property negotiations and collective bargaining issues with employee associations.

### **Special Board Meetings**

Meeting notices for **special meetings** are posted 24 hours in advance of the meeting and shall indicate the business to be transacted at the meeting. No other business shall be considered at the special meeting. The public will be provided an opportunity to address the item described in the notice.

### **Emergency Board Meetings**

When the Board determines that an emergency situation exists, it may call an **emergency meeting**. The Board may hold an emergency meeting without complying with the 24-hour notice or 24-hour posting requirement for special meetings pursuant to Government Code 54956. The Board shall comply with all other requirements for a special meeting during an emergency meeting.

### **Agendas**

**Agendas** contain a brief description of each item to be discussed or transacted at the meeting. Copies of the agenda are available in the Superintendent's Office, Building B, at the District Education Center or on the web site at **www.orangeusd.k12.ca.us/board/calendar.asp.** 

Consent Items are routine in nature and generally require no discussion. These items are acted upon by one motion; however, any such item may be considered separately at a Board member's request. Action Items are acted upon separately. Board members may ask questions or request that staff make a presentation before voting on an item. Information/ Discussion Items do not require action by the Board. The Board may take action only on those items listed in the printed agenda, except for emergencies.

Any member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the Board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting. The request must be in writing and submitted to the Superintendent at least ten working days before the scheduled meeting date.

### Addressing the Board

Persons wishing to address the Board are requested to fill out a "Public Comment" **blue card** available at the meeting on the information table. The "Public Comment" card should be submitted to the Superintendent or the Board Clerk prior to t e start of open session.

S eakers are limited to three (3) minutes per speaker with a m ximum of twenty (20) minutes per topic. With Board consent, the Board President may modify the time allowed for public presentation. **Power Point and computer presentations are <u>not</u> allowed.** A speaker may not relinquish his/her time to another. When addressing the Board, speakers are requested to state their name for the record and address the Board from the podium. If the topic has been previously addressed, it is requested that the speaker's remarks be limited to **new points only**.

Speakers will be called upon at t e appropriate time during the meeting. Agenda items may be addressed during the Board's consideration of the item. Items **not on the agenda** that are within the Board's subject matter jurisdiction may be addressed during the "Public Comment" section. Items not on the agenda may not be acted on or discussed by the Board, but will be researched and responded to in any one of the following ways: 1) by telephone after research; 2) by mail after research; or 3) at a subsequent Board meeting as an agenda item.

**No boisterous conduct shall be permitted at any Board meeting.** Persistent boisterous conduct shall be grounds for summary termination by the Board President of that person's privilege of address.

"Any person who willfully disturbs any public school or any public school meeting is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars (\$500)." (CEC § 32210)

Complaints against employees will normally be heard in Closed Session. The District's complaint procedure should be followed before discussion with the Board.

### **Requests for Information**

Requests for information shall be made in writing and submitted to the Superintendent's Office. There is a nominal charge of \$.10 per page for copies of public records.

WHEREAS, leadership matters for California's public education system and the more than six million students it serves;

WHEREAS, school administrators are passionate, lifelong learners who believe in the value of quality public education; and

WHEREAS, the title, "School Administrator," is a broad term used to define many education leadership posts. Superintendents, assistant superintendents, principals, assistant principals, special education and adult education leaders, curriculum and assessment leaders, school business officials, classified educational leaders, and other school district employees are considered administrators; and

WHEREAS, providing quality service for student success is paramount for the profession; and

WHEREAS, most school administrators began their careers as teachers. The average administrator has served in public education for more than a decade. Most of California's superintendents have served in education for more than 20 years. Such experience is beneficial in their work to effectively and efficiently lead public education and improve student achievement; and

WHEREAS, public schools operate with lean management systems. Across the nation, public schools employ fewer managers and supervisors than most public and private sector industries including transportation, food service, manufacturing, utilities, construction, publishing and public administration; and

WHEREAS, school leaders depend on a network of support from school communities - fellow administrators, teachers, parents, students, businesses, community members, board trustees, colleges and universities, community and faith-based organizations, elected officials and district and county staff and resources - to promote ongoing student achievement and school success; and

#### RESOLUTION NO. 30-08-09

## RESOLUTION OF THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT REGARDING LAYOFF OF CERTIFICATED EMPLOYEES DUE TO A REDUCTION OR DISCONTINUANCE OF PARTICULAR KINDS OF SERVICES

WHEREAS, the District's Governing Board, upon recommendation of the Superintendent, has determined that it is in the best interests of the District, and the students thereof, to layoff certificated employees pursuant to the provisions of Education Code section 44955 by virtue of the decision of the Board to reduce or discontinue certain particular kinds of services hereinafter enumerated.

### NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

1. Pursuant to Education Code section 44955, the following particular kinds of services shall be reduced or discontinued at the close of the 2008-09 school year. The particular kinds of services to be reduced or discontinued by full-time equivalent positions are as follows:

DECLARATION OF SURPLUS ITEMS AND AUTHORIZATION TO ENTER INTO CONTRACTS AND DISPOSE OF SURPLUS ITEMS

**DESCRIPTION:** 

District sites and programs have accumulated various pieces of equipment, vehicles, materials, and other District items that are obsolete, beyond economical repair, or are no longer required within the current curriculum or for any other school purposes. Education Code Section 17545 *et seq* and Board Policy 3270(a) provide for the sale of District items. A list of items to be declared surplus is attached and the items will be dispositioned by public or private sale. All items are subject to reallocation within the District prior to sale or disposal.

The District is planning to dispose of surplus items using the most effective public and private sale methods including utilizing the professional services of General Auction Company (GAC) and other firms as needed. Public sale of District surplus items will be conducted at the GAC located at 7015 Knott Avenue, Buena Park at regularly scheduled auctions through June 30, 2009. Private sale of items may be conducted through the District's Purchasing Department, if it is determined to be the most cost-effective sale method.

Based upon the quotations and service, staff recommends contracting with the General Auction Company for compensation of 25% of gross sales proceeds and related vehicle transfer fee expenses for most categories of items.

Similarly, on a continuing basis textbooks and library books become obsolete. Saleable units, applicable textbooks and library books may be sold (to organizations such as Independent Book Buying Services and other similar book buying organizations) and items may be donated to local charitable organizations such as Goodwill Industries, the Friendly Center, the Salvation Army, etc., in accordance with statutory and Board policy requirements.

TOPIC: TEACHER ASSIGNMENT/CONSENT - VARIABLE OR

**SHORT-TERM WAIVER** 

DESCRIPTION: The California Education Code authorizes, under the provision

of Section 44830(a), Variable Term Waivers that have to do with educator preparation and credentialing, and with the ability of employers to employ or assign persons who are not appropriately credentialed for their assignment. Requests for Variable Term Waivers may be submitted by employing agencies to solve a temporary certification or assignment problem, when the employing agency finds there are an insufficient number of certificated persons who meet the

specified employment criteria for a position.

The California Education Code authorizes, under the provision of Section 80122 employing agencies to grant a short-term waiver provided it is issued one time only for any one credentialed teacher and one time only for a given classroom.

They are valid for no more than one semester.

The teacher(s) whose name(s) is/are listed on the attached has/have met the requirements, has/have consented to the assignment, and has/have been judged by the site administrator to be competent in the subject matter. Likewise, all other means of credentialing and reassignment have been explored. The passage of this waiver will allow us to remain compliant with SB 435, which requires that all teachers be

appropriately assigned.

Canyon High School - Boys and Girls Swim Teams - Fresno, CA - March 20 - 21, 2009

Canyon High School's Boys and Girls Swim Teams under the direction of coaches. Steve Anderson and Erik Davidson. will travel to Fresno to compete in the Fresno Central Section Swim Meet. Students will have the opportunity to compete against teams from Central and Northern California to experience the level of competition. Twenty-eight male and thirty-two female students will be accompanied by four male and four female adult chaperones and will stay at the Hotel Holiday Inn Express and Suites, Transportation will be provided by OUSD. Total cost per student is \$75 and scholarships are available. Students will miss one day of school. No substitute will be required.

<u>Fletcher Elementary- 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Outdoor Science School - Creekside - March 16-20</u>

The sixth grade students from Fletcher Elementary School will participate in the Orange County Department of Education's Outdoor Science School program. The selection committee(s) submit their recommendations to the District Instructional Materials Advisory Committee (IMAC) for review and consideration. The IMAC committee is composed of principals, media specialists, and teachers whose responsibility is to recommend to the Board of Education approval of the considered texts.

It is at this juncture that the Board of Education places the texts and/or supplementary texts on "30-day review period" so members from the public may have an opportunity to review those texts, pending formal adoption. The texts are available for review in the Board Room this evening and after tonight in the Instructional Media Center. After the 30-day review period, the Board of Education may take formal action to adopt the textbooks and/or supplementary texts.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The textbooks, <u>Bon Voyage! Level 3</u> and <u>Komm Mit! Level 3</u>, when adopted will be purchased with state textbook funds. Auxiliary/ supplemental adoption texts are used to supplement the basic textbook and are purchased with funds other than the state textbook monies.

RESOLUTION NO. 29-08-09: SIGNATURE AUTHORIZATION UPDATE

DESCRIPTION:

Authorization of signatures is an item which is routinely updated to reflect changes in personnel and to comply with the requirements of the California Education Code.

As the agency which ultimately releases District payrolls and warrants, the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) must maintain on file the approved signature authorizations for all school districts. The signatures are applicable to various documents which are approved by the Board of Education and in compliance with the Education Code and other pertinent state and federal laws. The administrative/leadership employees for whom the signature authorizations are designated do not transfer that authority to any staff members.

Purchase orders are processed within the limitations of existing site/program budgets, with the P.O. listing submitted to the Board at each meeting. Non-routine expenditures for consultants, contracts, major facility additions, etc. are submitted to the Board separately for authorization. Before the preparation of a warrant, it is determined that the proper authorization and approvals exist. Warrants prepared by the District are forwarded to the OCDE for review of documentation, county signature, and entry to OUSD's county ledgers before they are returned to the District for release to vendors, consultants, or contractors. Purchase bid documents. warrants. orders. payrolls. federal/state/county documents, etc. are audited by the District's independent audit firm.

FISCAL IMPACT:

This item has no fiscal impact.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 29-08-09 granting signature authorization for specific District administrative/leadership employees as indicated on the attached document.
