PROPOSED BOARD POLICY 3470: **FUND BALANCE** POLICY - SECOND READING

DESCRIPTION:

Board Policies are routinely reviewed and updated. Updates may be triggered by changes in law, regulation, or direction from the Board of Education. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the regulatory body responsible for establishing and improving standards of state and local governmental accounting and financial reporting.

GASB has issued Statement 54 (GASB 54), Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions, which alters the categories and terminology used to describe the components that compose fund balance. These changes are intended to enhance how fund balance information is reported and to improve its usefulness by establishing new fund balance classifications that are easier for users to understand and apply. The new standard also clarifies the definitions of certain governmental funds.

The establishment of BP3470 was presented at the May 12, 2011 meeting for a first reading, and is now presented for approval.

Fund Balance Policy

Purpose

This Fund Balance Policy establishes the procedures for reporting unrestricted fund balance in the General Fund financial statements for the district's governmental funds. Certain commitments and assignments of fund balance will help ensure that there will be adequate financial resources to protect the District against unforeseen circumstances and events such as revenue shortfalls and unanticipated expenditures.

The policy also authorizes and directs the Superintendent or designee to prepare financial reports which accurately categorize fund balance as per Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions.

General Policy

Fund balance is essentially the difference between the assets and liabilities reported in a governmental fund. There are five separate components of fund balance, each of which identifies the extent to which the District is bound to honor constraints on the specific purpose for which amounts can be spent.

- Nonspendable Fund Balance consists of funds that cannot be spent due to their form (e.g. inventories and prepaids) or funds that legally or contractually must be maintained
- Restricted Fund Balance consists of funds that are mandated for a specific purpose by external parties, constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- Committed Fund Balance consists of funds that are set aside for a specific purpose by the district's highest level of decision making authority (governing board). Formal action must be taken prior to the end of the fiscal year. The same formal action must be taken to remove or change the limitations placed on the funds.
- Assigned Fund Balance consists of funds that are set aside with the intent to be used for a specific purpose by the district's highest level of decision making authority or a body or official that has been given the authority to assign funds. Assigned funds cannot cause a deficit in unassigned fund balance.
- Unassigned Fund Balance consists of excess funds that have not been classified in the previous four categories. All funds in this category are considered spendable resources. This category also provides the resources necessary to meet unexpected expenditures and revenue shortfalls.

Minimum Fund Balance Policy

The Governing Board maintains a minimum fund balance policy for the General Fund in order to protect the District against revenue shortfalls or unpredicted one-time expenditures. The policy requires a Reserve for Economic Uncertainties consisting of unassigned amounts equal to no less than three percent of General Fund expenditures and other financing uses.

Authority to Commit Funds

The Governing Board, as the District's highest level of decision-making authority, may commit fund balance for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal actions taken, such as a majority vote or resolution. These committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the Governing Board removes or changes the specific use through the same type of formal action taken to establish the commitment. Governing Board action to commit fund balance needs to occur within the fiscal reporting period, no later than June 30th; however, the amount can be determined subsequent to the release of the financial statements.

Authority to Assign Funds

Upon passage of the Fund Balance Policy, authority is given to the Superintendent or designee to assign funds for specific purposes. The Governing Board has the authority to remove or change the assignment of the funds with a simple majority vote.

The total budgeted attendance of 27,088.23 (not including District charter schools, county special education, and county community schools) reflects an anticipated gain of 11.36 in District ADA. District charter schools' ADA of 2,081.68 also reflects no growth as compared to the prior year.

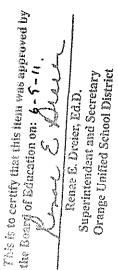
Revenues: Although the State of California has not adopted its 2011-12 budget at this time, the May Revise, proposes a 2.24% cost of living adjustment (COLA) with a 19.754% deficit. The funding increase in COLA with a corresponding increase in deficit constitutes a flat funding from the previous fiscal year. This flat funding proposal is dependent upon extension of temporary taxes. Until the state adopts its 2011-12 budget, the estimated funded Revenue Limit yields an estimated \$349 per student decrease in the revenue limit calculation for 2011-12 as compared to the prior year.

State categorical entitlements and grants known to be ongoing are projected at current levels based on 2007-08 allocations adjusted down for by 15.4%, 4.5% and .38% for 2008-09, 2009-10, and 2010-11, respectively and no funded COLA for 2011-12.

On March 10, 2011, the Board of Education held a public hearing and voted to authorize the transfer of Tier III programs into the General Fund for any educational purpose, as allowed by law, through 2014-15.

No increase is anticipated for ongoing federal programs in this adoption as the Federal Government debates its budget for an October 1 fiscal year adoption. Interest earnings are projected at .75% and lottery is estimated at \$128.50 per student (\$111.00, unrestricted, \$17.50 restricted by Proposition 20).

Certificated Staffing: Certificated staffing is based upon a ratio of 30:1 for grades K-2; 33:1 for grades 3-12. Salaries include step/column increases for certificated employees and step/range increases for classified employees as well as proposed



Statutory benefits (STRS, PERS, Workers' reorganizations. Compensation, etc.) are driven by payroll costs. Health benefits are based on 2010-11 allocations.

Expenditures: Supplies, services/operating expenses, and capital outlay are in conformity with estimated site and program budgets.

The estimated unexpended entitlements have been included in components of the 2010-11 ending fund balance and added to the 2011-12 budget expenditure lines. The estimated unexpended entitlements include: Medi-Cal Billing Option, English Language Acquisition, EIA and QEIA of approximately \$3.2 million.

Other unexpended/remaining components of the 2010-11 ending fund balance are El Rancho Charter School, site/department donations and non-resident tuition of approximately \$3.9 million; these estimated unexpended items have been included in the 2011-12 budget expenditure lines.

Ending Balance: The projected ending balance of \$34,337,320 is comprised of the following:

The ending balance meets the State-required three-percent reserve. and the 2011-12 budget complies with the AB1200 accountability guidelines as set forth by the State of California. Unaudited actuals for 2010-11 and budget revisions for 2011-12 which result from carryover and the actual adoption of the State of California budget will be presented to the Board of Education at its September 15, 2011 meeting.

The First Interim Report will occur on December 8, 2011, with the Second Interim to be presented in March 2012.

The Orange County Department of Education requested that local boards of education include the following statement in the 2011-12 budget adoption action:

"In submitting the 2011-12 Adopted Budget, the Board understands its fiduciary responsibility to maintain fiscal solvency for the current and subsequent two fiscal years. It is recognized that if the temporary tax extension proposed in the Governor's May 2011 Revision fails, or if the fiscal condition further deteriorates, the District will implement \$9,100,000 in ongoing budget reductions in 2012-13 to maintain fiscal solvency.

The fiscal impact to the various funds is shown in the State

budget documents.

It is recommended that the Board of Education hold a public hearing and subsequently adopt the 2010-11 Estimated Actuals and the 2011-12 Budget.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE ORANGE UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DUE TO THE STATE'S BUDGET CRISIS

Resolution No. 28-10-11

WHEREAS, the Orange Unified School District's ("District") General Fund is substantially dependent upon revenue from the State of California; and

WHEREAS, the State of California continues to face a budgetary crisis that is clearly one of the worst in the State's history; and

WHEREAS, the State of California is projecting a State budget shortfall for the 2011-2012 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the State of California has not determined the level of State support for K-12 public schools in the 2011-2012 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, as a result of this uncertainty in State funding, the Orange Unified School District may be required to reduce its 2011-2012 budget; and

WHEREAS, employee compensation constitutes over 80% of the Orange Unified School District budget, and

WHEREAS, due to the uncertainty of the law, the governing Board of the Orange Unified School District wishes to reserve its right to make adjustments to the salary and work year/annual compensation for administrative, supervisory, confidential, and unrepresented employees for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, and to reserve its right to seek to negotiate salary and work year/annual compensation reductions for certificated and classified employees for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Based upon the foregoing, as a precautionary measure, it is declared that the Orange Unified School District work year, compensation, and benefits, including all salary schedules for all employees and other respective daily rates of pay, are declared indefinite for the 2011–2012 fiscal year.
- 2. The Superintendent or designee is directed to notify all administrative, supervisory, confidential, and unrepresented employees before July 1, 2011, of the indefinite nature of the 2011–2012 work year, compensation and benefits, with the possibility that significant adjustments may be made with respect to work year, compensation and benefits and other cost containment matters.

- 3. The Orange Unified School District reserves its right to seek to initiate negotiations under the State's collective bargaining laws, the District's collective bargaining agreements, and Government Code section 3540 et seq., to reduce salaries and work year/annual compensation for certificated and classified employees for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. The District is currently in the process of reopening negotiations with the classified and certificated bargaining units pursuant to the respective collective bargaining agreements.
- 4. The exclusive representatives of the certificated and classified bargaining units are hereby notified of this precautionary measure, and of the indefinite nature of the 2011-2012 work year, compensation and benefits.

EDUCATIONAL SERVICES AND SUPPORT SERVICES REORGANIZATION

DESCRIPTION:

This is to certify that this item was approved by Orange Unified School District Superintendent and Secretary the Board of Education on:

Board Policy 2100 requires that the Superintendent organize the District administrative staff in a manner that best supports the educational program through efficient operations, effective communications and direct assistance to schools. Based upon this responsibility, the Superintendent recommends that the Educational Services and Support Services Divisions be reorganized as described below, effective June 30, 2011, with new position assignments to be effective July 1, 2011, or as soon as is permitted by statute, policy, and/or Collective Bargaining Agreement.

Certificated reassignments connected with this item are subject to the provisions of the Education Code. Noncertificated position elimination recommendations connected with this process may result in layoff. The Education Code, Board Policy, and Collective Bargaining Agreement stipulate the provisions and timelines for lavoff due to lack of work/lack offunds. Under the Education Code, affected employees shall be given notice of layoff not less than 45 days prior to the effective date.

FISCAL IMPACT:

It is estimated that there will be a savings to the unrestricted general fund of approximately \$200,000 based upon the substance and funding of the reorganization.

INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

LEGAL SERVICES/FEES

DESCRIPTION:

Trustees have requested information on the process used to procure and account for legal services/fees.

The District arranges for legal services from attorneys based on the firm and/or attorney specialization. In order to conduct business efficiently and timely, District departments estimate the potential legal service expenditures during the budget development process annually prior to the beginning of the fiscal year, usually in May or June. It is necessary to have these Purchase Orders in place on July 1, as some legal cases carry over fiscal years. Unused encumbrances are reversed at the end of the year and funding is made available for allocation the following year. The process is repeated annually.

It is necessary for the District to have prior approval for legal services as the lack of adequate legal representation severely limits the District when required to respond within legally mandated time frames. Often, staff is able to get free legal counsel from the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE), however, they cannot represent us apart from cases we are jointly involved in.

CANINE DETECTION SERVICES UPDATE

DESCRIPTION:

On August 26, 2010, staff presented an information item to the Board of Education titled, Safe and Drug-free High School Campuses. Per the Strategic Plan goal of Safe and Welcoming Schools, the report focused on providing the community with information on student drug/alcohol abuse during the 2009-2010 school year. On September 23, 2010, the Board of Education approved a contract for services for Interquest Canine Detection Services to provide random drug detection canine visits to OUSD's four comprehensive high schools, continuation school and Community Day School. The canine searches commenced in January 2011. Since that time, suspension and expulsion data has been gathered on the effects of the program.

Staff will provide an update on the Canine Detection program provided by Interquest Canine Detection Services, including the data on the effectiveness of this program.

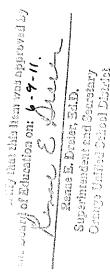

The Title I Program provides funds to school districts and private schools to help close the achievement gap between high and low poverty schools by targeting additional resources based on numbers of poor school-age children.

The Title II Program (formerly Eisenhower and Federal Class Size Reduction) provides grants to LEAs to: 1) increase student academic achievement through strategies such as improving teacher and principal quality, increasing the number of highly qualified teachers in the classrooms and highly qualified principals in the schools; and 2) holds LEAs and schools accountable for improvement in student academic achievement.

Allocations are based on CBEDS enrollment and Title I funding.

Estimated Allocation: \$ 1,179.870

Title III

The Title III Program is a source of federal funding to be used for improving instruction for all English Learners enrolled in the district. It is part of the President's legislation "No Child Left Behind".

Economic Impact Aid (EIA)

The EIA/LEP Program provides state supplementary funding to support the development of English language fluency and academic achievement of 7,255 limited English students district wide. ENHANCING EDUCATION THROUGH TECHNOLOGY -- EETT **ROUND 9 COMPETITIVE GRANT**

OUSD was awarded an Enhancing Education Through Technology (EETT) Competitive Grant Round 9 for \$232,700 for Cerro Villa Middle School. Cerro Villa's grant entitled, Project COOL (Creating Opportunities for Orange Learners), is a program for grades 7 and 8 language arts that utilizes technology to enhance teaching and promote learning by providing students with 21st Century skills to better meet grade-level reading and writing standards.

Project COOL includes the following key components:

- Improving reading and writing skills for all target students through increasing technology literacy, including integration of the research-based Step Up to Writing process with technology tools, Blackboard, ePortfolios and Safe Assign
- Developing reading and writing skills in struggling readers with READ 180 lab and tutoring sessions (Project COOL will be used with CV's successful reading program, READ 180 Next Generation)
- Reducing the student-to-computer ratio from the present 10.5:1 average to 5:1 through the purchase of wireless class sets of laptops. Teachers will use laptops, LCD projectors (available at the school) and SMART Response Systems
- Providing teachers with access to student achievement data through analysis of common assessments in Data Director as well as SMART Response Systems to inform teaching immediately remediate student learning gaps and increase their understanding
- Providing students with access to the California Gallery Walk, which showcases students' multimedia projects with still images, music, narratives, video, and text
- Students will write research projects filled with rich visual detail and aligned to their language arts program while
- Featuring the online, digitized resources of the Prentice Hall adopted texts and teacher-created learning units within a password-protected environment to enrich and extend student work and enable teachers to provide assessment and immediate feedback

Monies will be used to provide for professional development, purchasing Data Scanning Centers, portable laptop labs, desktop computers for Read 180, response systems (clickers), and teacher laptops at Cerro Villa Middle School.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Receipt of grant funding totaling \$232,700
