### 9. ANNOUNCEMENTS AND ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

### Item 9.A. Superintendent's Report

Dr. Dreier noted that next Tuesday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, students and staff will officially begin a new era at Yorba. Over the upcoming four-day holiday weekend, staff will be moving into its new school. This state-of-the-art campus provides a technology rich learning environment for students to learn and teachers to teach. Yorba will host a public open house on May 19<sup>th</sup>.

Competing in the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Safe Online Surfing (FBI-SOS) national online competition for students all over the United States, McPherson Magnet School's 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> graders won the national award by producing the highest scores in the nation. McPherson is only the second school in California to win such an award and the first to win it twice. McPherson 7<sup>th</sup> graders were honored with a similar award earlier this school year. FBI representatives from the Los Angeles bureau presented the national trophy to McPherson earlier this month in a morning assembly. Congratulations to Principal Jeanne Bentley and Teacher Librarian Glen Warren.

On Friday, March 4<sup>th</sup>, Santiago Canyon College will host hands-on activities in the new science building. This event gives parents a firsthand look at the use of inquiry-centered science kits and how they are used in the classroom with their children. This is a true community event and just another component of our outstanding science program here in OUSD.

Orange Unified School District is proud to join EPA's list of Energy Star Leaders, an elite group of organizations that have improved energy efficiency across all of the buildings in a portfolio. OUSD is the first school district in the State of California to earn the 30% Energy Star Leader recognition for improving its energy efficiency by more than 30 percent throughout the district. Dr. Dreier thanked everyone for the work that has gone into creating this kind of savings for our District.

Dr. Dreier commented that this evening the Board has a contract for Cal STAT services for technical assistance to a school district for staff development. Dr. Dreier thanked the Educational Services Division for going after the staff development money and expertise. The resources come to the District through the State Department of Education at no cost to the District.

### Item 9.C. Board Recognition of Students, Staff and Community

### (i) Outstanding Employee of the Month

The Board of Education recognized Cathy Sadler, Accounting Technician II in Accounts Payable, as the recipient of the Outstanding Customer Service Award for the month of February. On behalf of the Board of Education, Mr. Ledesma presented a Certificate of Recognition to Mrs. Sadler and expressed appreciation for her dedication to the Orange Unified School District.

(ii) Leukemia & Lymphoma Society Award Presentation to Orange High School Vicki Sullivan, School and Youth Campaign Chairman of the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, presented the Orange County/Inland Empire Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's 2010 School & Youth Award to Orange High School. With over 500 schools participating, Orange High School is the number one school that stands out from all the rest. Orange High has raised \$364,916 since 1999. In 2010, they raised \$17,554. Year after year, Orange High School is consistently ranked as one of the top fundraising schools across the country.

Dr. Deligianni recognized and commended Canyon High School for their outstanding efforts in their recent canned food drive. Canyon High School was awarded the Top Provider for 2010 from the Second Harvest Food Bank of Orange County. This is the second year that the Canyon High community has donated the most food to Second Harvest. Canyon High School provided over 10,300 pounds of donated food.

Mrs. Moffat recognized Megan Messerly, a senior at Villa Park High School, who won the Gold Key Award in the Portfolio Category at the state level of the Scholastic Arts & Writing Competition. Her award was presented to her at a special ceremony in Sacramento. Her portfolio was the only one honored with the Gold Key. She now moves on to national competition in New York.

Mrs. Moffat noted that today is Founders Day for PTA, which was founded began 114 years ago on February 17. She noted that PTA is the largest and oldest child advocacy organization in the world. Mrs. Moffat encouraged everyone to join PTA.

Mrs. Moffat paid tribute to Sylvia Mendez who advanced the cause of civil rights in the 1940s and received the nation's highest civilian honor, the Presidential Medal of Freedom, for her courageous efforts. The *Mendez v. Westminster School District* case made California the first state in the nation to end school segregation paving the way for *Brown v. Board of Education*. Mrs. Moffat acknowledged not only Sylvia Mendez, but all the courageous families that took part in this historic law suit that opened the way for education equality for all of our students.

Item 12.B. Resolution No. 19-10-11: Mental Health Services for Special Education Students State law mandates that county mental health departments provide mental health services to special education students pursuant to Government Code section 7570 (AB 3632). The Governor appropriated \$76 million to be used exclusively to support mental health services provided during the 2010-11 fiscal year by county mental health agencies pursuant to AB3632. The Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) has received in excess of \$12 million on behalf of school districts and SELPAs in Orange County to support mental health services that are provided during the 2010-2011. OCDE will pass through that money to the Orange County Health Care Agency (OCHCA) as per the requirements of the OCDE/OCHCA Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).

On November 12, 2010, the OCHCA stated that they will only provide AB3632 services if school districts and SELPAs provide additional funding to the OCHCA beyond the funds received from the state and beyond what is required under the (MOU). OCDE has requested/demanded that OCHCA fulfill its obligations under the MOU by providing mental health services through June 30, 2011.

The California School Boards Association (CSBA) has filed a lawsuit to require county mental health departments to provide these mental health services. It may also be necessary for school districts in Orange County to file a lawsuit requiring the OCHCA to comply with the MOU between the OCDE and the OCHCA.

### Motion No. 49

It was moved by Dr. Deligianni, seconded by Mrs. Singer and carried by a vote of 7-0 to approve Resolution No. 19-10-11 authorizing the superintendent or designee to work with the OCDE and other school districts in Orange County and the Orange County Special Education Alliance in pursuing all legal remedies against the Orange County Health Care Agency.

### 13. INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

### Item 13.A. Board Policy Review: Naming of Facilities

On August 26, 2010, the Board received a request from Robert Torres, Chairman of the Committee

for Ramirez, to rename Esplanade Elementary School or another elementary school for Lorenzo Ramirez in recognition of his efforts to end segregation in the El Modena school system during the 1940s. The Board directed staff to bring back information on the current policies, bylaws and practices for naming District facilities. Staff provided presentations at the October 14, and November 18, 2010 Board meetings.

The initial presentation provided foundational information regarding school district policies and bylaws as well as a review of the current policies and bylaws concerning the naming of District facilities. In summary, the presentation stated that: 1) Board policies and bylaws are the rules which govern the Board of Education, the staff, and the school district; 2) Board policies and bylaws are subject to review and amendment; 3) Board policy provides direction in the naming of schools and school facilities; 4) Board policy provides an avenue for requests to rename school facilities other than school names; and 5) Board policy provides a one-year minimum waiting time for requests to rename facilities.

The second presentation focused on a review of Board policies and practice as these relate to the naming of school facilities. The presentation included information that: (1) All current OUSD schools are named consistent with Board policy, i.e. all elementary schools are named for a street adjacent to or near the location of the site, all middle schools including the two charter schools are named in accordance with a historical Spanish theme appropriate to the history of the area, and all senior high schools are named for the general community of their location; (2) No OUSD schools are named in honor of past or present OUSD community members; and (3) Several OUSD facilities, but not schools, are named in honor of OUSD community members.

Mr. Ed Kissee provided a follow-up presentation concerning the requested information relating to the naming of facilities.

Following the presentation, the Board members discussed honoring the Rameriz family with a resolution and conducting a community survey to receive input regarding the renaming of a District school. The Board would receive a draft of the survey prior to its implementation.

### Item 14.I. Contract Services Report – Educational Services

The following contract services for Educational Services were approved:

### CAL STAT (California Services for Technical Assistance and Training)

Cal STAT Grant: The Technical Assistance Grant will be utilized to provide Response to Intervention technical trainings to (K-12) administrators, teachers, instructional coaches, counselors, and support staff in the areas of: collaboration, family partnerships, literacy, behavior, Individual with Disabilities Education Act, least restrictive environment, and transition support as required by Cal STAT/Napa Grant. The primary focus of the Orange USD training will be on Response to Intervention (RtI), a reform strategy for ensuring each student receives the necessary academic and social support to be successful in school and reduce referrals to special education. Bill Tollestrup, Elk Grove USD Special Education/SELPA Director, is being requested as the RtI presenter. Elk Grove is a Cal STAT Model Leadership district.

Orange Unified is a Program Improvement Year 2 district and qualifies for technical support funding. The Cal STAT program provides districts with grants to implement the RtI reform strategy to ensure referrals to special education are reduced and that IDEA is fully implemented. Funds for this project come in part from federal funds awarded as a State Program Improvement Grant to California (CFDA 84.323 A) allowed in Part D of Public Law 108-447, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), as amended in 2004. These dollars are considered local assistance funds and will assist individuals serving children birth to 22 years of age and their families. Technical assistance is provided by Cal STAT through Elk Grove USD, considered the model Cal STAT district for RtI. Bill Tollestrup is the person behind the success in that district. Technical Assistance Grant – Income to District - \$4000 to be used for professional development

### **ON-POINT TECHNOLOGIES**

School Districts are required to provide an equitable share of federal monies to the private schools within their attendance boundaries. On-Point Technologies will conduct a series of grade level small group teacher training sessions on Mimeo Technology, for teachers at La Purisima School. These sessions will focus on the integration and specific use of interactive tools and resources in the classroom environment, using Mimeo Technology. Sessions are March through May 2011 and September through November 2011. All fees and materials to be included. Fiscal impact will be the expenditure of restricted categorical fund monies.

### PARENT INSTITUTE FOR QUALITY EDUCATION (PIQE)

### (Esplanade and Sycamore Elementary)

The Parent Institute for Quality Education (PIQE) will provide parent training for the parents of students enrolled at Esplanade and Sycamore Elementary Schools. The trainings will take place March 3, 2011 through June 14, 2011. The training is designed to develop skills and techniques which will enable parents to address the educational needs of their school-aged children. The cost for this training is approximately \$80 per parent graduate.

### PARENT INSTITUTE FOR QUALITY EDUCATION (PIQE) (Yorba Middle)

Originally approved on November 18, 2010, Yorba Middle School saw an overwhelming response to the training provided on February 3, 2011 by The Parent Institute for Quality Education (PIQE). To accommodate as many parents as possible, Yorba would like to add an additional 80 participants for the PIQE training series for the parents of students enrolled at Yorba Middle School. The remaining trainings take place at Yorba Middle School through March 31, 2011. Trainings are designed to encourage and support low-income ethnically-diverse parents of middle school students to take a participatory role in their child's education by learning the following: (a) create a home learning environment, (b) navigate the school system, (c) collaborate with parents, (d) encourage college attendance and (e) support the social and emotional development of a child. The training provides techniques which will enable parents to address the educational needs of their school-aged children to improve student achievement. There will be 80 parent participants and the cost for this training is \$80 per parent graduate.

Fiscal impact: Expenditure of restricted categorical fund monies is as follows:

### SANTIAGO CANYON COLLEGE SAT PREPARATION WORKSHOPS

The Santiago Canyon College will conduct two SAT Preparation Workshops on February 26, 2011, and April 9, 2011. Each workshop will consist of two consecutive Saturdays. The workshops will assist up to ten students per workshop with SAT test preparation. The students will review all subsections of the SAT (Math, Reading, and Writing) and also review test taking strategies. The workshops are being offered to students in the Title VII Native American Education Program who are preparing to apply for college and need assistance in preparing for the SAT. The cost of \$94 per student for each workshop will be funded by the Title VII Native American Education Program. Fiscal impact will be the expenditure of restricted categorical fund monies.

### El Modena High School - Boys' Wrestling Team - Temecula, CA, February 25-26, 2011

El Modena High School Boys' Wrestling Team, under the direction of Corey Schuld and Roger Martinez, will travel to Temecula for the CIF Masters Wrestling Tournament. The qualifying students will gain valuable wrestling experience to prepare for the State Meet. Up to three male wrestling team members will attend and be accompanied by three male and three female adult chaperones. Chaperones and students will stay at the Motel 6. Transportation will be provided by parents of individual students and will have an approved OUSD Driver Certification form completed and approved prior to this trip. All costs will be funded by the Wrestling Boosters. No substitute is required and students will miss one day of school.

# <u>Cambridge Elementary- 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Class-Calvary-Running Springs-Outdoor Science School - February 28-March 4, 2011</u>

The sixth grade students from Cambridge Elementary School, under the supervision of Richard Torres and Nicole Wyckoff, as well as trained Orange County Department of Education camp staff, will participate in the Orange County Department of Education's Outdoor Science School program.

This five-day program provides students an opportunity to study science in a natural setting. Students will have the opportunity to explore established trails, investigate geological features, observe wildlife and compare plant adaptations. Students will study the night sky through telescopes, participate in line and folk dances, create and perform science and nature skits. The curriculum at the camp is aligned with the California Science Content Standards and the California Science Framework. Transportation to and from event will be provided through District transportation. The student cost may be supplemented by funds donated by individual parent organizations. The cost will not exceed \$215 per student, and scholarships are available. There is no impact to the general fund.

### El Modena High School – Boys' Wrestling Team – Bakersfield, CA, March 3-6, 2011

El Modena High School Boys' Wrestling Team, under the direction of Corey Schuld and Roger Martinez, will travel to Bakersfield for the CIF State Wrestling Tournament. Qualifying students will gain valuable wrestling experience and insight for future tournament preparation. Up to five male wrestling team members will attend and will be accompanied by three male adult chaperones. Chaperones and students will stay at the Bakersfield Inn Hotel. Transportation will be provided by parents and coaches who will have an approved OUSD Driver Certification form completed and approved prior to this trip. All costs will be funded by the Wrestling Boosters. No substitute is required and students will miss two days of school.

### El Modena High School – Girls' Varsity Softball Team – Bullhead City, AZ – March 10-12, 2011

El Modena High School Girls' Varsity Softball Team, under the direction of Steve Harrington, will travel to Arizona to participate in the prestigious Tournament of Champions Softball Tournament. El Modena High School is one of 40 state-ranked and/or nationally ranked teams invited to participate. Many college coaches attend to evaluate talent, recruit for their respective schools and offer athletic scholarships to selected student-athletes. The eighteen female students will be accompanied by eight male and thirteen female adult chaperones. Chaperones and students will stay at the Tropicana Express. Any parent driving a student other than their own will have an approved OUSD Driver Certification form on file and approved prior to this trip. No substitute is required and students will miss two days of school.

### El Modena High School – Frosh/Soph Wrestling Team – Fresno, CA – March 11-13, 2011

El Modena High School's Frosh/Soph Wrestling Team, under the direction of Corey Schuld, will travel to Fresno for the CIF State Frosh/Soph Wrestling Tournament. The qualifying wrestlers will gain valuable wrestling experience that will help them excel in the future. Up to twelve male wrestling team members will attend and will be accompanied by three adult male chaperones. Chaperones and students will stay at the Motel 6. Transportation will be provided by parents and coaches who will have an approved OUSD Driver Certification form completed and approved prior to this trip. All costs will be funded by the Wrestling Boosters. No substitute is required and students will miss one day of school.

### Canyon High School – Boys' and Girls' Swim Team – Fresno, CA – March 18-19, 2011

Canyon High School's Boys' and Girls' Swim Team, under the direction of Steve Anderson and Erik Davidson, will travel to Fresno to compete in the Fresno Central Section Swim Relays. The students will have the opportunity to compete against teams from Central and Northern California and experience a higher level of competition at an outstanding facility. The 24 students will be accompanied by four male and four female adult chaperones. The chaperones and students will stay at The Holiday Inn Express Hotel and Suites. Transportation will be provided by OUSD Transportation. The cost per student is \$100 and scholarships are available. No substitute is

required and students will miss one day of school.

### <u>Panorama Elementary – 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Class – Catalina Island – Toyon Bay – Catalina Island Marine</u> <u>Institute – March 23-25, 2011</u>

The fifth grade students from Panorama Elementary School, under the supervision of Richard Ireland and Robert Lund, will travel to Catalina Island Marine Institute. The students will be accompanied by four female and four male adult chaperones. The program focuses on hands on experiences in Science. This includes a combination of labs, aquariums and touch tanks on land as well as snorkeling, kayaking and collecting data in the field. Students and teachers will learn about the many ecosystems of the island and ocean and get to see and touch a whole range of fish, algae, sharks and rays. Transportation to and from event will be provided through District transportation. Students attending the program are responsible for the program cost. The student cost may be supplemented by funds donated from individual parent organizations. The cost will not exceed \$350 per student, and scholarships are available. There is no impact to the general fund.

# <u>Handy Elementary - 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Class - Forest Center - Forest Falls - Outdoor Science School - March 28 - April 1, 2011</u>

The sixth grade students from Handy Elementary School, under the supervision of John McCarthy and Amber Cooper, as well as trained Orange County Department of Education camp staff, will participate in the Orange County Department of Education's Outdoor Science School program. This five-day program provides students an opportunity to study science in a natural setting. Students will have the opportunity to explore established trails, investigate geological features, observe wildlife and compare plant adaptations. Students will study the night sky through telescopes, participate in line and folk dances, create and perform science and nature skits. The curriculum at the camp is aligned with the California Science Content Standards and the California Science Framework. Transportation to and from event will be provided through District transportation. Student program fees will be paid directly to the Orange County Department of Education through a donor program. There is no impact to the general fund.

### Villa Park High School – Boy's Tennis Team – Ojai, CA – April 27 – 30, 2011

Villa Park High School's Boy's Tennis Team, under the direction of Mike Lee, will travel to Ojai to participate in the Ojai Tennis Tournament. Students will have an opportunity to play alongside PAC 10 college tennis players. They will also be observed by college coaches for scholarship opportunities. VPHS has two students in the top 50 in Southern California and two in the top 100. The fifteen students will be accompanied by five male and four female adult chaperones. The chaperones and students will be housed at a vacation rental home in Ojai, CA. The group will travel by private vehicles. Any parent driving a student other than their own will have an approved OUSD Driver Certification form on file and approved prior to this trip. The cost per student is \$200 and scholarships are available. A substitute is required and students will miss two days of school.

### <u>Crescent Elementary – 4<sup>th</sup> Grade G.A.T.E Class – Catalina Island – Toyon Bay – Catalina Island</u> Marine Institute – May 16-18, 2011

The fourth grade GATE students from Crescent Elementary School, under the supervision of Richard O'Connor and Robin Nelson, as well as trained Marine Institute staff, will travel to Catalina Island Marine Institute. The students will be accompanied by six female and four male adult chaperones. The program focuses on hands on experiences in Science. This includes a combination of labs, aquariums and touch tanks on land as well as snorkeling, kayaking and collecting data in the field.

Students and teachers will learn about the many ecosystems of the island and ocean and get to see and touch a whole range of fish, algae, sharks and rays. Transportation to and from event will be provided through District transportation. Students attending the program are responsible for the program cost. The student cost may be supplemented by funds donated from individual parent organizations. The cost will not exceed \$240 per student, and scholarships are available. There is no impact to the general fund.

### Canyon Rim Elementary - 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Class - Riley's Farm - Oak Glen - May 19-20, 2011

The fifth grade students from Canyon Rim Elementary School, under direction of Aleshia Sacks and Dorielle Davidson, will travel to Riley's Farm May 19-20. The students will be accompanied by five female and four male adult chaperones. The students will have the opportunity to participate in a "living history adventure tour." Students will be re-enacting past events in America's history, with special attention to the Revolutionary War. Participation in this trip aligns with the California Standards for 5<sup>th</sup> grade History/Social Studies. Students attending the program are responsible for the program cost. The student cost may be supplemented by funds donated from individual parent organizations. The cost will not exceed \$140 per student, and scholarships are available. There is no impact to the general fund.

A web-based "iSchool" credit recovery program will be available for <u>all</u> secondary students who need additional credits. Extended School Year for K-12 and Adult Transition Special Education students will also be provided. The Board of Education authorize the superintendent or designee to approve the 2011 Summer School Program.
